

The Secretary of the Senate is elected by the senate as a statutory officer at the beginning of the 4-year senate term. The Secretary's most visible role is the work on the podium during session — reading in bills, recording votes, serving as a parliamentary adviser, and, occasionally, presiding in the absence of designated presiding officers. The Secretary also has many statutory record-keeping responsibilities such as the “care and preservation” of bills and senate records, including the recording and validating of official senate actions; the enrolling of bills; the preparation of the journal of each day's proceedings; and the dissemination of bills, resolutions, and amendments to senators. The Secretary also serves as the senate's chief administrative officer, responsible for a broad range of administrative functions, from the administration of the senate budget to supervisory authority for the care and control of the senate's physical plant. Senate Fiscal Agency

The Senate Fiscal Agency provides nonpartisan analytical services to the senate. The staff provides technical, analytical, and preparatory support for all appropriations and retirement bills. The agency also prepares an objective written analysis of all bills and administrative rules under consideration by the senate.

Fiscal analysts of the Senate Fiscal Agency review and evaluate state programs, proposed policies, proposed rules, budgetary requests, and the fiscal impact of all bills before the senate. The agency also provides economic and revenue analysis and forecasting, analyzes the impact of federal budget decisions on the state, monitors the state's long-term and short-term debt, and monitors the state's compliance with constitutional and statutory fiscal requirements.

Legislative analysts of the Senate Fiscal Agency are responsible for providing objective bill analysis for members. Analysts prepare summaries of bills in committee to provide a straightforward explanation of the changes a bill would make to present law. Once a bill is reported out of committee, a full analysis is prepared describing the changes a bill would make in present law, the reason for the bill's introduction, supporting and opposing arguments, and fiscal implications. Analyses are updated as bills are amended throughout the course of the legislative process. The Senate Fiscal Agency is located in the Victor Center, 8th Floor, 201 N. The Office of the Clerk of the House of Representatives is the parliamentary office for this chamber of the Michigan legislature.

The Clerk of the House performs a wide range of operations in the House of Representatives. These responsibilities include direct supervision of the preparation of various legislative documents, including the house journal and the daily calendar, which specifies the order of pending business; the printing and reproduction of bills, acts, or other documents; and the responsibility for the care and preservation of each bill introduced in the house or received from the senate.

The Clerk of the House, whose duties are stipulated in statute, house rule, joint senate and house rules and at the direction of the membership, is elected by the members of the house of representatives. The clerk has an active parliamentary role during legislative sessions. The clerk calls the roll, announces the proceedings of the house, records votes, and serves as parliamentarian and presides in the absence of a designated presiding officer. Assisting the clerk at the podium during session is the assistant clerk and the clerks responsible for bill amendments, bills and resolutions, and the journal. House Fiscal Agency

The House Fiscal Agency operates under a governing board and acts as the staff of the House Appropriations Committee, analyzing the budget as recommended by the governor along with alternate proposals submitted by the departments and by members of the Michigan Legislature. The agency's fiscal analysts are assigned particular areas of state governmental activity, working on the particular area's appropriation bills.

In addition to working on the budget through the appropriations process, fiscal analysts study all bills introduced in the legislature with respect to impact on state revenues and/or expenditures. Although the staff of the House Fiscal Agency is geared to serving and providing information for the House Appropriations Committee, both the House Fiscal Agency and the Senate Fiscal Agency will provide information or assistance to any member of the legislature upon request. The Senate Sergeant-at-Arms is the chief security officer of the Senate. Under the direction of the Senate Majority Leader, the Secretary of the Senate supervises and directs the work of the Sergeant-at-Arms, Assistant Sergeants-at-Arms, messengers, and pages.

The Sergeant-at-Arms attends the Senate during its sessions and maintains order under the direction of the presiding officer. The Sergeant-at-Arms executes the commands of the presiding officer and of the Senate, and all processes issued by their authority.

The Sergeant-at-Arms has general charge of, and maintains order in, the gallery, chamber, and committee rooms of the Senate. The Sergeant-at-Arms ensures that all staff and visitors are seated.

The House Sergeant-at-Arms is the chief police officer of the House of Representatives. The Sergeant-at-Arms has charge, under the direction of the Speaker of the House, of the Assistant Sergeants-at-Arms and pages, and control of all police regulations. The Sergeant-at-Arms has authority to serve subpoenas and warrants issued by the house or any duly authorized officer or committee, or cause the same to be done by one of the Assistant Sergeants-at-Arms, or a duly authorized agent. The Sergeant-at-Arms ensures that all visitors are seated and at no time are standing on the floor or balconies of the House.

Office of the Auditor General

Thomas H. McTavish, Auditor General

The audit function in Michigan is vested in the legislative branch of government, and the auditor general is appointed to serve an eight-year term by a majority vote of members of the house and senate.

The auditor general is the principal executive responsible for Office of the Auditor General policies and practices, day-to-day audit operations, and liaison with the legislature. The Office of the Auditor General conducts post-financial and performance audits of state government operations. These include financial audits of the State of Michigan Comprehensive Annual Financial Report, federal funds subject to the Federal Single Audit Act of 1984, and individual departments and agencies. Additionally, performance audits are conducted of selected state programs and operations, and individual projects and reports are completed in response to legislative requests.



THOMAS H. MCTAVISH
Auditor General

Thomas H. McTavish, C.P.A., C.G.F.M., has served as auditor general of the State of Michigan since 1989. Prior to his appointment as Auditor General of Michigan, Mr. McTavish was Deputy Auditor General for Audit Quality and Operations in the Pennsylvania Auditor General's office; and previous to entering public service was an audit manager at Stockton Bates & Co., a C.P.A. firm in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

Mr. McTavish is active in professional organizations and is a member of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, where he has served on the Government Accounting and Auditing and the Members in Government Committees. He also chaired the AICPA's Performance Audit Task Force which produced a report that serves as a resource and provides guidance for the auditing profession on conducting performance audits. Mr. McTavish is also a member of the Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants and serves on the Accounting and Auditing Procedures and the Current Accounting Issues Committees; the Association of Government Accountants, where he chaired the Financial Standards Management Committee; The National State Auditors Association, where he was elected Secretary Treasurer of NSAA for 1997-98, chairs the Strategic Planning Committee and serves on the Emerging Issues and Information Technology Committees; the National Association of State Auditors, Comptrollers and Treasurers; the Midwestern Intergovernmental Audit Forum; and the Government Finance Officers Association.

Mr. McTavish is a retired Captain, U.S. Naval Reserve. He last served as Commanding Officer of the Naval Audit Service Headquarters Naval Reserve unit in Arlington, Virginia.

Mr. McTavish is a graduate of Pennsylvania State University, and for 16 years he was an associate lecturer teaching business courses on a part-time basis at two community colleges and Pennsylvania State University.

The Legislative Council Administrator, a position created by 1995 PA 189, is responsible for supervisory oversight for all Legislative Council offices. The Council Administrator acts as Secretary to the Legislative Council. The Council Administrator, who may be assigned other duties as determined by the Council, has overall budgetary and personnel supervision for staff operations of the various agencies under the authority of the Council. These agencies include the Legislative Service Bureau, the Legislative Council Facilities Agency, the Legislative Corrections Ombudsman, the Michigan Law Revision Commission, the Michigan Commission on Uniform State Laws, the Joint Committee on Administrative Rules, the Sentencing Commission, and the Trial Court Assessment Commission. In addition, the Council Administrator, a member of the Library of Michigan Board of Trustees and Library of Michigan Foundation Board of Directors, works with the State Librarian to coordinate the activities of the Library of Michigan with the Legislative Council. LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL AGENCIES

LEGISLATIVE SERVICE BUREAU

The Legislative Service Bureau was formally created in 1941 as a nonpartisan legislative information and service agency. With the adoption of the Michigan Constitution of 1963, a bipartisan Legislative Council was established, and with the subsequent passage of Act 412 of 1965, being §§ 4.311 to 4.327 of the Michigan Compiled Laws (since superseded by Act 268 of 1986), the council became the governing body for the Legislative Service Bureau. The council is charged with maintaining bill drafting, research, and other services in the bureau for utilization by all members of the Michigan Legislature. LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL FACILITIES AGENCY

The Legislative Council Facilities Agency was established by the Legislative Council in 1995 as a nonpartisan legislative service agency. The agency provides tours of the Capitol Building, manages the legislative parking system and manages and maintains the Capitol and Michigan Library and Historical Center facilities. LEGISLATIVE CORRECTIONS OMBUDSMAN

Act 46 of 1975, being §§ 4.351 to 4.364 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, provides for the creation of a corrections ombudsman within the structure of the legislative branch. The ombudsman, who is appointed by the Legislative Council, is authorized to investigate an administrative action by the Department of Corrections which is alleged to be contrary to law, contrary to departmental policy, unaccompanied by an adequate statement of reason, or based on irrelevant, immaterial, or erroneous grounds. The Legislative Council is responsible for approving the budget and expenditures of the office, the employment of personnel, and approving complaint and investigation procedures. JOINT COMMITTEE ON ADMINISTRATIVE RULES

The Joint Committee on Administrative Rules is a statutorily created bipartisan legislative committee, comprised of 5 house and 5 senate members, which is responsible for the legislative oversight of administrative rules proposed by state agencies. The committee maintains a nonpartisan staff, which is located in the Capitol Hall Building at 115 West Allegan in downtown Lansing (telephone number: 517/373-6476), that is responsible for processing rules transmitted to the committee by state agencies, scheduling committee hearings at the direction of the committee chair, providing members with the background and legal analysis of the rules, and reviewing proposed legislation to determine whether rulemaking authority is, or should be, necessary to carry out the legislative intent of proposed legislation. LIBRARY OF MICHIGAN

The Library of Michigan, formerly known as the State Library, became part of the legislative branch in 1983. It is governed for policy purposes by the Legislative Council. The library is primarily charged with providing reference services to the legislative branch of state government, but also provides services to the executive and judicial branches of state government as well as to the general public. Its main location is at 717 W. Allegan in Lansing (373-5400). The Law Library (373-0630) is located on the first floor of the Law Building, west of the Capitol, and also operates an Upper Peninsula branch at Escanaba. The state librarian, who is appointed by the Legislative Council, in consultation with the 15-member Board of Trustees of the Library of Michigan, is the chief administrator of the Library of Michigan. Two members appointed by the senate majority leader, 2 members appointed by the speaker of the house, the director of the Legislative Service Bureau or the director's designee, and 3 members appointed by the Legislative Council serve as Michigan's delegation to the National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws pursuant to Act 268 of 1986.

Michigan's delegation meets and confers with commissioners from other states to bring about uniformity of state law in instances where wide variations in state law could tend to complicate the resolution of interstate problems. In addition to "uniform acts" such as the Uniform Commercial Code, which every state is urged to adopt, the National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws also drafts "model acts" to guide legislatures dealing with issues that need not be treated uniformly by all states. Some models, such as the Model State Administrative Procedures Act, have been adopted for use by most states. Pursuant to the provisions of Act 277 of 1966, being §§ 445.821 to 445.829 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, the Michigan Consumers Council was established to "formulate and direct a program for the protection of individual consumers from harmful products and merchandise, false advertising, and deceptive sales practices."

The council is composed of 3 nonlegislators appointed by the Legislative Council, 3 members appointed by the governor, as well as the secretary of state, the attorney general, and the director of the Department of Consumer and Industry Services. The agency is currently unstaffed for budgetary reasons.

The Trial Court Assessment Commission was created within the legislative council by Act 374 of 1996. The commission is directed by statute to "study and classify the civil and criminal cases filed in the district, circuit, and probate courts and recorder's court of the city of Detroit and develop a set of criteria for determining the relative complexity of the various types of cases filed." The commission is to apply these criteria to the caseloads of the various courts and recommend to the legislature by July 15, 1997, a funding formula for the money appropriated annually by the state for the operation of those courts. For each county and district funding unit, the funding formula must take into account both the total caseload and the relative complexity of the cases that comprise that caseload.

Members of the commission serve, without compensation, for 2-year terms or until a successor is appointed, whichever is later. The governor appoints the chairperson from among the four public members. The commission office is located in Suite 632, Michigan National Tower, Lansing, MI. Established by Act 123 of 1987, this bipartisan, bicameral legislative executive committee is composed of equal membership from the senate, house of representatives, and the executive office. Four members are appointed by the senate majority leader, four by the speaker of the house of representatives, and four by the governor. Members serve two-year terms and may be reappointed.

The Michigan Capitol Committee was created to advise and make recommendations to the governor, senate majority leader, and speaker regarding the restoration and preservation of the State Capitol, and the management, operation, development, construction, renovation, maintenance, and repair of the building and its grounds. Committee recommendations take effect fifteen days after their submission to the governor, senate majority leader, and speaker of the house, unless rejected in writing by one of the them.
