House Resolution No. 199.

A resolution to declare May 1, 2012, as Law Day in the state of Michigan.

Whereas, The American justice system is charged with upholding and protecting the rights, as well as the freedom and justice of all Americans; and

Whereas, In 1961, Congress issued a joint resolution declaring May 1 as Law Day, which is a national day to recognize and celebrate our justice system and the rule of law; and

Whereas, The Law Day 2012 theme, “No Courts, No Justice, No Freedom,” provides an opportunity to highlight the crucial role of our courts and to foster a better understanding of the judiciary; and

Whereas, We urge all community residents, school administrators, teachers and students, business and civic leaders, legal professionals and law students to support this national day by participating in Law Day activities; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the House of Representatives, That the members of this legislative body declare May 1, 2012, as Law Day in the state of Michigan. We urge acknowledgement of the importance of our legal and judicial systems with appropriate ceremonies and activities, and to display the flag of the United States and the state of Michigan in support of this educational observance; and be it further

Resolved, That the citizens, schools, businesses, media, religious institutions, civic, and service organizations of the state of Michigan are encouraged to use this occasion to commemorate Law Day.

Whereas, Throughout the course of American history, courageous men and women have taken up arms to secure, defend, and maintain the principles on which our nation’s freedoms depend; and

Whereas, The willingness of our veterans to give freely and unselfishly of themselves, even their lives, to defend our democratic principles and safeguard our liberty, gives this great nation continued strength and vitality; and

Whereas, On this special day, our hearts and thoughts also turn to those who have been paralyzed. Their sacrifices and hardships endure daily and earn the honor and compassion of a grateful nation; and

Whereas, The members of the House of Representatives, seeking to convey a gratitude to those brave men and women on behalf of an appreciative state, do recognize the challenges that these individuals endure on a daily basis. In expression of that gratitude, we see the need to specially recognize these individuals; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the House of Representatives, That the members of this legislative body declare March 21, 2012, as Paralyzed Veterans Awareness Day in the state of Michigan. We urge citizens to use this opportunity to recognize the service and sacrifice of our paralyzed veterans and their future challenges.

House Resolution No. 201.

Resolved by the House of Representatives, That Rule 33 of the Standing Rules of the House of Representatives be amended to read as follows:

(3) Statutory Standing Committees:

(b) House Fiscal Agency Governing Committee (6)

(c) Legislative Council (6)

(d) Michigan Legislative Retirement System (4)

(e) Michigan Capitol Committee (4)

(4) The House Journal shall report the roll call on all motions to report bills, resolutions and reorganization orders. (See Const 1963, Art 4 § 17)

(5) Committees shall adopt a meeting schedule at the commencement of each term which shall be printed in the House Journal. Additional meetings may be called by the Chair or by a majority of the Members in writing to the Clerk. The Chair may cancel any scheduled meeting, except one called by a majority of the Members, by notice to the Members.”.

Rep. Stamas moved that Rule 69 be suspended and the resolution be considered at this time.

The resolution was adopted.

Reps. Liss, Haines, Barnett, Constan, Darany, Durhal, Kowall, Segal, Slavens and Talabi offered the following resolution:

House Resolution No. 202.

A resolution to declare March 2012 as Vitamin D Awareness Month in the state of Michigan.

Whereas, The nutrient and pre-hormone vitamin D is manufactured in the skin during exposure to ultraviolet B light from high-angle sunshine; and

Whereas, The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) recommends in a 2008 clinical report, “Prevention of Rickets and Vitamin D Deficiency in Infants, Children, and Adolescents”, that all children receive 400 IU of vitamin D a day, beginning in the first few days of life; and

Whereas, A 2010 article published in the American Journal of Clinical Nutrition reported that a study of a group of Japanese school children who received 1,200 IU of vitamin D a day showed a 50 percent reduction in the incidence of influenza compared to other school children; and

Whereas, A 2010 article published in the Journal of Alternative and Complementary Medicine reported that a study in Egypt found that children without autism had blood serum levels of vitamin D averaging 40.1 ng/ml, and children with autism had significantly lower blood serum levels of vitamin D, averaging 28.5 ng/ml; and

Whereas, Sara B. Arnaud, M.D., found that infants and children with blood serum levels of vitamin D of at least 18 ng/ml have a 99 percent prevention rate of the bone disease rickets; and

Whereas, A 2001 study published in The Lancet found that children in Finland who received 2,000 IU a day of vitamin D for the first year of life were 80 percent less likely to develop type 1 diabetes by age 30 compared to children receiving 400 IU of vitamin D a day; and

Whereas, A 2007 study published in The Journal of Clinical Endocrinology and Metabolism found that females who received regular vitamin D supplementation during the first year of life are 50 percent less likely to develop preeclampsia in their first pregnancy; and

Whereas, A 2009 article published in The Journal of Clinical Endocrinology and Metabolism found that pregnant women with low blood serum levels of vitamin D were nearly four times more likely to deliver by cesarean section than women with blood serum levels of vitamin D of at least 15 ng/ml; and

Whereas, A 2009 study at the Medical University of South Carolina found that pregnant women who took 4,000 IU of vitamin D a day during pregnancy had a 50 percent reduction in the rate of premature births and delivered fewer babies with low birth weight than women who took 400 IU of vitamin D a day; and

Whereas, A 2007 article published in the American Journal of Clinical Nutrition reported that a study which compared cancer rates of a group of postmenopausal women taking 1,100 IU of vitamin D supplements in combination with calcium to cancer rates of a group taking a placebo, found the risk of developing any cancer after four years was 60 percent lower in the group taking vitamin D supplements; and

Whereas, A study presented at the 2008 annual meeting of the American Association for Cancer Research found that blood serum levels of vitamin D of at least 50 ng/ml were associated with an 83 percent reduction in the incidence of breast cancer compared to blood serum levels of vitamin D of 25 ng/ml; and

Whereas, A 2007 article published in the American Journal of Preventative Medicine reported that a study found that a group with blood serum levels of vitamin D of at least 42 ng/ml had a 60 percent reduction in the incidence of colorectal cancer compared to a group with blood serum levels of vitamin D of 25 ng/ml; and

Whereas, A study referenced by Michael F. Holick, Ph.D., M.D., in The Vitamin D Solution found that men with prostate cancer who received 2,000 IU of vitamin D a day for two years had a 50 percent reduction in the rise of prostate-specific antigen, an indicator of prostate cancer activity; and

Whereas, A 2001 study published in The Lancet found that a group with blood serum levels of vitamin D of 52 ng/ml had a 66 percent reduction in the incidence of type 1 diabetes compared to a group with blood serum levels of vitamin D of 25 ng/ml; and

Whereas, A 2006 study published in Diabetes Care found that taking 800 IU of vitamin D in combination with calcium resulted in a 33 percent reduction in the risk of type 2 diabetes; and

Whereas, A 2010 article in The Lancet reported that the risk of multiple sclerosis increases with latitude and with low blood serum levels of vitamin D; and

Whereas, Elderly persons are at high risk for vitamin D deficiency because of indoor lifestyle and the reduced ability of aging skin to manufacture vitamin D; and

Whereas, A 2005 article published in the Journal of the American Medical Association reported that elderly persons who had blood serum levels of vitamin D of at least 45 ng/ml experienced a 50 percent reduction of fractures and a 2007 article published in the Journal of the American Geriatrics Society reported that elderly persons who had blood serum levels of vitamin D of at least 30 ng/ml experienced a 72 percent reduction in falls compared to those who had blood serum levels of vitamin D below 25 ng/ml; and

Whereas, A 2009 article published in the Journal of Alzheimer's Disease reported that vitamin D reduces the risk of several types of diseases that have been identified as risk factors for or precursors to dementia; and

Whereas, A 2007 article published in the Journal of Photochemistry and Photobiology estimated that the United States economic burden due to vitamin D deficiency from inadequate exposure to ultraviolet B light, inadequate diet, and lack of supplements was estimated between 40 and 56 billion dollars in 2004; and

Whereas, A 2010 article published in Molecular Nutrition and Food Research regarding the rate of premature death and the economic burden in Canada found that annual deaths could be reduced by 37,000 and the economic burden reduced by 6.9 percent or 14.4 billion dollars blood serum levels of vitamin D of the population were adequate; and

Whereas, Part of the budget of each state is used to treat illnesses that could potentially be prevented with adequate blood serum levels of vitamin D; and

Whereas, The above-referenced studies and findings taken in aggregate provide significant evidence for the benefits of vitamin D supplements and vitamin D supplementation is relatively inexpensive and cost-beneficial; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the House of Representatives, That the members of this legislative body declare March 2012 as Vitamin D Awareness Month in the state of Michigan. We encourage states to increase awareness of vitamin D deficiency and blood testing, and to promote awareness of the potential long-term health benefits of and increased chances of cancer survival with sufficient levels of vitamin D; and be it further

Resolved, That we encourage vitamin D supplementation for pregnant women and infants to prevent pregnancy complications, preterm births, type 1 diabetes, and rickets; and be it further

Resolved, That we encourage vitamin D supplements for elderly persons potentially to prevent bone loss, falls, fractures, and other age-related health problems.

The resolution was referred to the Committee on Health Policy.

Reps. Callton, Durhal, Kowall, Kurtz and LeBlanc offered the following resolution:

House Resolution No. 203.

A resolution to urge the Federal Emergency Management Agency to give communities the option of continuing to use older flood maps.

Whereas, The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) is updating flood insurance rate maps throughout Michigan. These new maps expand the number of properties considered to be in the floodplain. Communities must adopt these updated maps in order to be eligible for federal disaster assistance and for residents to be eligible for national flood insurance; and

Whereas, The updated flood maps will force homeowners who have never needed flood insurance in the past to obtain flood insurance. Homeowners within the floodplain who do not purchase flood insurance risk losing their mortgage or other home loans; and

Whereas, It is unfair for FEMA essentially to change the rules midstream and require homeowners to take on the additional financial burden of purchasing flood insurance. Whether someone bought their home two years ago or 20 years ago, homeowners budgeted, bought, and financed their homes without the expectation of paying for flood insurance; and

Whereas, It is inconsistent for the federal government on the one hand to create programs attempting to keep people in their homes while on the other hand creating additional financial burdens on homeowners; and

Whereas, Homeowners affected by the updated maps would still have the option of purchasing flood insurance if FEMA allows the old maps to be retained. These homeowners could then make an informed decision based on their means and the level of risk with which they are comfortable; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the House of Representatives, That we urge the Federal Emergency Management Agency to give communities the option of continuing to use older flood maps; and be it further

Resolved, That copies of this resolution be transmitted to the Administrator of the Federal Emergency Management Agency and the members of the Michigan congressional delegation.
