SUBSTITUTE FOR SENATE BILL NO. 340

A bill to amend 1978 PA 368, entitled "Public health code,"

by amending sections 17707, 17708, 17709, 17722, 17726, 17739, 17741, 17742, 17748, 17751, and 17752 (MCL 333.17707, 333.17708, 333.17709, 333.17722, 333.17726, 333.17739, 333.17741, 333.17742, 333.17748, 333.17751, and 333.17752), section 17707 as amended by 2016 PA 528, section 17708 as amended by 2016 PA 499, sections 17709 and 17742 as amended by 2014 PA 280, section 17739 as added by 2014 PA 285, section 17748 as amended by 2015 PA 169, section 17751 as amended by 2017 PA 165, and section 17752 as amended by 2005 PA 73, and by adding sections 17742a and 17742b.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

1 Sec. 17707. (1) "Parent pharmacy" means a pharmacy that



operates a remote pharmacy through a telepharmacy system.

- (2) "Personal charge" means the immediate physical presence of a pharmacist or dispensing prescriber.
- (3) (2)—"Pharmacist" means an individual licensed under this article to engage in the practice of pharmacy.
- (4) (3)—"Pharmacist in charge" or "PIC" means the pharmacist who is designated by a pharmacy, manufacturer, or wholesale distributor as its pharmacist in charge under section 17748(2).
- (5) (4)—"Pharmacist intern" or "intern" means an individual who satisfactorily completes the requirements set forth in rules promulgated by the department in consultation with the board and is licensed by the board for the purpose of obtaining instruction in the practice of pharmacy from a preceptor approved by the board.
- (6) (5) "Pharmacy" means a facility or part of a facility that is licensed under this part to dispense prescription drugs or prepare prescription drugs for delivery or distribution. Pharmacy does not include the office of a dispensing prescriber or an automated device. For the purpose of a duty placed on a pharmacy under this part, "pharmacy" means the person to which the pharmacy license is issued, unless otherwise specifically provided.
- (7) (6)—"Pharmacy technician" means an individual who is required to hold a health profession subfield license under this part to serve as a pharmacy technician.
- (8) (7)—"Practice of pharmacy" means a health service, the clinical application of which includes the encouragement of safety and efficacy in the prescribing, dispensing, administering, and use of drugs and related articles for the prevention of illness, and the maintenance and management of health. Practice of pharmacy includes the direct or indirect provision of professional functions

- 2 functions associated with the practice of pharmacy include the

- 4 (a) The interpretation and evaluation of the prescription.
- 5 (b) Drug product selection.
- 6 (c) The compounding, dispensing, safe storage, and7 distribution of drugs and devices.
 - (d) The maintenance of legally required records.
- 9 (e) Advising the prescriber and the patient as required as to
 10 contents, therapeutic action, utilization, and possible adverse
 11 reactions or interactions of drugs.
- Sec. 17708. (1) "Preceptor" means a pharmacist approved by the board to direct the training of an intern in an approved pharmacy.
 - (2) "Prescriber" means a licensed dentist, a licensed doctor of medicine, a licensed doctor of osteopathic medicine and surgery, a licensed doctor of podiatric medicine and surgery, a licensed physician's assistant, a licensed optometrist certified under part 174 to administer and prescribe therapeutic pharmaceutical agents, an advanced practice registered nurse as that term is defined in section 17201 who meets the requirements of section 17211a, a licensed veterinarian, or another licensed health professional acting under the delegation and using, recording, or otherwise indicating the name of the delegating licensed doctor of medicine or licensed doctor of osteopathic medicine and surgery.
 - (3) "Prescription" means an order by a prescriber to fill, compound, or dispense a drug or device written and signed; written or created in an electronic format, signed, and transmitted by facsimile; or transmitted electronically or by other means of communication. An order transmitted in other than written or hard-

- 1 copy form must be electronically recorded, printed, or written and
- 2 immediately dated by the pharmacist, and that record is considered
- 3 the original prescription. In a health facility or agency licensed
- 4 under article 17 or other medical institution, an order for a drug
- 5 or device in the patient's chart is considered for the purposes of
- 6 this definition the original prescription. For purposes of this
- 7 part, prescription also includes a standing order issued under
- 8 section 17744e. Subject to section 17751(2) and (5), prescription
- 9 includes, but is not limited to, an order for a drug, not including
- 10 a controlled substance except under circumstances described in
- 11 section 17763(e), written and signed; written or created in an
- 12 electronic format, signed, and transmitted by facsimile; or
- 13 transmitted electronically or by other means of communication by a
- 14 physician prescriber, dentist prescriber, or veterinarian
- 15 prescriber who is licensed to practice dentistry, medicine,
- 16 osteopathic medicine and surgery, or veterinary medicine in another
- 17 state.
- 18 (4) "Prescription drug" means a drug to which 1 or more of the
- 19 following apply:
- 20 (a) The drug is dispensed pursuant to a prescription.
- 21 (b) The drug bears the federal legend "CAUTION: federal law
- 22 prohibits dispensing without prescription" or "Rx only".
- (c) The drug is designated by the board as a drug that may
- 24 only be dispensed pursuant to a prescription.
- 25 (5) "Remote pharmacy" means a pharmacy described in sections
- 26 17742a and 17742b.
- Sec. 17709. (1) "Sign" means to affix one's signature manually
- 28 to a document or to use an electronic signature when transmitting a
- 29 prescription electronically.



- 1 (2) "Sterile pharmaceutical" means a dosage form of a drug
 2 that is essentially free from living microbes and chemical or
 3 physical contamination to the point at which it poses no present
 4 risk to the patient, in accordance with USP standards. As used in
 5 this subsection, "dosage form" includes, but is not limited to,
 6 parenteral, injectable, and ophthalmic dosage forms.
 - (3) "Substitute" means to dispense, without the prescriber's authorization, a different drug in place of the drug prescribed.
 - (4) "Telepharmacy system" means an interoperable computer system that meets all of the following requirements:
 - (a) Shares real-time data and uses a real-time audio and video link to connect a pharmacist at a parent pharmacy with a remote pharmacy operated by the parent pharmacy.
 - (b) Uses a camera that is of sufficient quality and resolution to allow a pharmacist at a parent pharmacy who is reviewing a prescription to visually identify the markings on tablets and capsules at the remote pharmacy.
 - (c) Maintains a continuous video recording that is periodically reviewed.
 - (5) (4)—"USP standards" means the pharmacopeial standards for drug substances, dosage forms, and compounded preparations based on designated levels of risk as published in the official compendium.
 - (6) (5)—"Wholesale distributor" means a person, other than a manufacturer, who supplies, distributes, sells, offers for sale, barters, or otherwise disposes of, to other persons for resale, compounding, or dispensing, a drug or device salable on prescription only that the distributor has not prepared, produced, derived, propagated, compounded, processed, packaged, or repackaged, or otherwise changed the container or the labeling of

- 1 the drug or device.
- 2 Sec. 17722. In addition to the functions set forth in part
- 3 161, except as otherwise provided in this part, the board shall:
- 4 (a) Regulate, control, and inspect the character and standard
- 5 of pharmacy practice and of drugs and devices manufactured,
- 6 distributed, prescribed, dispensed, administered, or issued in this
- 7 state and procure samples and limit or prevent the sale of drugs
- 8 and devices that do not comply with this part.
- 9 (b) Prescribe minimum criteria for the use of professional and
- 10 technical equipment and references in the compounding and
- 11 dispensing of drugs and devices.
- 12 (c) Grant a pharmacy license for each separate place of
- 13 practice in which the compounding or dispensing of prescription
- 14 drugs or devices, or both, or the receiving of prescription orders
- 15 in this state is to be conducted.
- 16 (d) Grant a drug control license for the place of practice of
- 17 a dispensing prescriber who meets the requirements for the license.
- (e) Grant a license to a manufacturer or a wholesale

- 21 Sec. 17726. The department shall issue a license certificate
- 22 of licensure to an applicant who is granted a license by the
- 23 board.under this part.
- Sec. 17739. (1) An individual who performs any of the
- 25 following functions is considered to be serving as a pharmacy
- 26 technician and, except as otherwise provided in this part, is
- 27 required to be licensed under this part as a pharmacy technician:
- 28 (a) Assisting in the dispensing process.
- 29 (b) Handling transfer of prescriptions, except controlled

- 2 (c) Compounding drugs.
- 3 (d) Preparing or mixing intravenous drugs for injection into a4 human patient.
- (e) Contacting prescribers concerning prescription drug order
 clarification, which does not include drug regimen review or
 clinical or therapeutic interpretation.
 - (f) Receiving verbal orders for prescription drugs, except orders for controlled substances.
- 10 (g) Subject to section 16215, performing any other functions
 11 authorized under rules promulgated by the department in
 12 consultation with the board.
- 13 (2) A pharmacy or dispensing prescriber that utilizes the 14 services of a pharmacy technician shall ensure that all of the 15 following requirements, as applicable, are met:
- (a) The pharmacy technician is licensed or otherwiseauthorized to serve as a pharmacy technician under this part.
 - (b) The pharmacy technician only performs the activities or functions that he or she is licensed or otherwise authorized to perform under this part or rules promulgated under this part.
- (c) Except for a remote pharmacy or as otherwise provided by rule promulgated by the department in consultation with the board, the pharmacy technician only performs the activities or functions described in subdivision (b) under the supervision and personal charge of the pharmacist or dispensing prescriber.
- 26 Sec. 17741. (1) A pharmacy shall not be operated unless 27 licensed by this part.
- 28 (2) A—Except for a remote pharmacy, a pharmacy open for
 29 business shall must be under the personal charge of a pharmacist. A

- pharmacist shall not simultaneously have personal charge of more
 than 1 pharmacy.
- 3 (3) The person to whom a pharmacy license is issued and the
 4 pharmacists on duty are responsible for compliance with federal and
 5 state laws regulating the distribution of drugs and the practice of
 6 pharmacy. Pharmacy Except for a remote pharmacy, pharmacy services
 7 shall must be conducted under the control and personal charge of a
 8 pharmacist.
 - (4) (3)—A penalty sanction for violation of this part does not affect only affects the pharmacy license of other than the place of business where the violation occurred.
- Sec. 17742. (1) The board may require an applicant or the holder of a pharmacy, manufacturer's, or wholesale distributor's license to fully disclose the identity of each partner, stockholder, officer, or member of the board of directors of the pharmacy, manufacturer, or wholesale distributor, as applicable.
 - (2) As used in this section and sections 17742a, 17748, 17748a, and 17768, "applicant" means a person applying for a pharmacy, manufacturer's, or wholesale distributor's license under this article. Applicant includes only 1 or more of the following:
 - (a) An individual, if the person applying is an individual.
 - (b) All partners, including limited partners, if the person applying is a partnership.
- (c) All stockholders, officers, and members of the board ofdirectors, if the person applying is a privately held corporation.
 - Sec. 17742a. (1) A parent pharmacy shall not operate a remote pharmacy in this state unless the parent pharmacy and the remote pharmacy are each located in this state and licensed as a pharmacy under this part.

- 1 (2) The department shall grant a pharmacy license to an 2 applicant seeking to operate a remote pharmacy if the applicant 3 meets all of the following:
- 4 (a) Submits a completed application and pays the applicable 5 fee under section 16333.
- 6 (b) Demonstrates to the satisfaction of the department that
 7 the parent pharmacy and the proposed remote pharmacy share common
 8 ownership.
- 9 (c) Subject to subsection (3), demonstrates to the
 10 satisfaction of the department that, at the time of the
 11 application, the location of the proposed remote pharmacy is not
 12 within 10 miles of another pharmacy. This subdivision does not
 13 apply if the remote pharmacy is located at a hospital, clinic, or

In considering whether to grant a waiver under this subsection, the department shall consider each of the following, as applicable, based on the evidence submitted by the applicant:
- 27 (a) Whether the pharmacy that is located within 10 miles from 28 the proposed remote pharmacy is open for business for limited hours 29 or fewer hours than the proposed remote pharmacy.

- 1 (b) Whether services will be provided at the proposed remote 2 pharmacy that are not available from the pharmacy that is located 3 within 10 miles from the proposed remote pharmacy.
- 4 (c) Whether access to the pharmacy that is located within 10 miles from the proposed remote pharmacy is limited and whether the proposed remote pharmacy will improve patient access to pharmacy services.
- 8 (d) Whether there are transportation barriers to receiving
 9 services from the pharmacy that is located within 10 miles from the
 10 proposed remote pharmacy.
 - (e) Whether the pharmacy that is located within 10 miles from the proposed remote pharmacy is closing.
 - (4) If a pharmacy license is granted to a pharmacy that is located within 10 miles of a remote pharmacy after the remote pharmacy's license is granted or renewed, the remote pharmacy may continue to operate.
 - Sec. 17742b. (1) If a remote pharmacy open for business is not under the personal charge of a pharmacist, the pharmacist in charge of the parent pharmacy shall ensure that the remote pharmacy is staffed by a qualified pharmacy technician who, while assisting in the dispensing process, is overseen through the use of a telepharmacy system by a pharmacist who meets the requirements described in subsection (2).
 - (2) A pharmacist who is located at a parent pharmacy may only oversee the activities at a remote pharmacy if the pharmacist has access to all relevant patient information that is maintained by the parent pharmacy and he or she is employed by or under contract with the parent pharmacy or a pharmacy that has contracted with the parent pharmacy.

- 1 (3) For purposes of this act, a prescription dispensed under 2 this section, including a prescription for a controlled substance, 3 is considered dispensed at the remote pharmacy by the pharmacist 4 described in subsection (2).
- 5 (4) The pharmacist in charge of the parent pharmacy shall 6 establish and maintain a written policy and procedure manual that 7 must be made available to the department for inspection upon 8 request and that contains each of the following, subject to this 9 section:
- 10 (a) A description of how the remote pharmacy will comply with 11 federal and state laws, rules, and regulations.
 - (b) The procedure by which a pharmacist described in subsection (2) oversees a qualified pharmacy technician at the remote pharmacy who is assisting in the dispensing process and the procedure by which the pharmacist provides counseling to patients at the remote pharmacy.
 - (c) The procedure for reviewing each of the following:
- 18 (i) Subject to section 7321, prescription drug inventory at the 19 remote pharmacy.
- 20 (ii) Prescriptions or equivalent records approved by the board 21 that are on file at the remote pharmacy.
- 22 (d) The policy and procedure for providing adequate security 23 to protect the confidentiality and integrity of a patient's 24 protected health information.
 - (e) The procedure for recovering from an event that interrupts or prevents a pharmacist described in subsection (2) from overseeing the operations of the remote pharmacy through the telepharmacy system. The procedure shall require that the remote pharmacy be closed to the public during a time period in which any

- 4 (f) The procedure for ensuring that a pharmacist described in 5 subsection (2) complies with the electronic system for monitoring 6 schedule 2, 3, 4, and 5 controlled substances established under 7 section 7333a before a controlled substance is dispensed under this

- 9 (g) The specific acts, tasks, and functions that a qualified 10 pharmacy technician may perform at the remote pharmacy. However, a 11 qualified pharmacy technician shall not do any of the following at 12 the remote pharmacy:
 - (i) Receive oral orders for prescription drugs.
- (ii) Provide consultation regarding a prescription or regarding medical information contained in a patient medication record or patient chart.

 - (i) A policy that requires the pharmacist described in subsection (2) to retain audio and video recordings from the telepharmacy system for at least 45 calendar days.
- 27 (5) The pharmacist in charge of the parent pharmacy shall 28 display at the remote pharmacy in a conspicuous location, visible 29 to the public, a notice that provides all of the following

- 4 (b) That if patient counseling is provided, it may be provided 5 by a pharmacist using audio and video communication.
 - (c) The address of the parent pharmacy.
- 7 (6) A pharmacist described in subsection (2) shall review a 8 prescription as required by state and federal law, rules, and 9 regulations before the drug or device that is the subject of the 10 prescription is dispensed under this section. The pharmacist shall 11 ensure that the pharmacist's and the qualified pharmacy technician's initials or other means of identifying the pharmacist 12 13 and the qualified pharmacy technician involved in the dispensing 14 process are recorded on the prescription and that the specific 15 acts, tasks, or functions performed by the pharmacist or qualified pharmacy technician during the dispensing process are recorded in 16 17 the pharmacy management system.  - (7) If a remote pharmacy open for business is not under the personal charge of a pharmacist, any patient counseling that is required by rule must be provided before the drug or device is dispensed at the remote pharmacy and must be provided by a pharmacist described in subsection (2) through the telepharmacy system in a manner that complies with the health insurance portability and accountability act of 1996, Public Law 101-191, or regulations promulgated under that act, 45 CFR parts 160 and 164.

- 1 (8) If a pharmacist described in subsection (2) is not present 2 at the parent pharmacy, the remote pharmacy must be closed for 3 business unless a pharmacist is present at the remote pharmacy.
 - (9) A remote pharmacy shall not dispense more than 225 prescriptions per day.
- 6 (10) As used in this section, "qualified pharmacy technician"
 7 means a pharmacy technician who has at least 1,000 hours of
 8 experience working in a pharmacy and who holds a license other than
 9 a temporary license under section 17739b or limited license under
 10 section 17739c.
- 11 Sec. 17748. (1) To do business in this state, a pharmacy, manufacturer, or wholesale distributor, whether or not located in 12 13 this state, must be licensed under this part. To do business in 14 this state, a person that provides compounding services must be 15 licensed as a pharmacy or manufacturer under this part and, if a pharmacy, authorized to provide compounding services under this 16 section and sections 17748a and 17748b. To do business in this 17 18 state, an outsourcing facility must be licensed as a pharmacy under 19 this part. Licenses are renewable biennially.
 - a pharmacist licensed in this state as the pharmacist in charge for the pharmacist in charge of the pharmacist in charge of the pharmacist in charge of the parent pharmacy shall also serve as the pharmacist in charge of the remote pharmacy.  18 safekeeping of drugs and devices.
 - (e) Establishment of policies and procedures for individuals who are delegated responsibilities for any of the tasks described in this subsection by the PIC.
 - (6) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (8), fingerprints for the following individuals shall be submitted with an application for a new pharmacy, manufacturer, or wholesale distributor license in the same manner as required in section 16174 for the purpose of a criminal history check:
- (a) If the application is from an individual, who is not a
 health professional licensed or otherwise authorized to engage in a
 health profession under this article or who is a health

- (9) If, as authorized or required under this article, the department inspects or investigates an applicant for a new pharmacy license for a pharmacy that will provide compounding services or a compounding pharmacy, and the applicant or compounding pharmacy is located outside of this state, the applicant or compounding pharmacy shall reimburse the department for its expenses incurred in carrying out its authority or duty to inspect or investigate the applicant or licensee under this article.
 - Sec. 17751. (1) A pharmacist shall not dispense a drug requiring a prescription under the federal act or a law of this state except under authority of an original prescription or an equivalent record of an original prescription approved by the board. A pharmacist described in section 17742b(2) may dispense a drug pursuant to an original prescription received at a remote pharmacy if the pharmacist receives, reviews, and verifies an exact digital image of the prescription received at the remote pharmacy before the drug is dispensed at the remote pharmacy.
 - (2) Subject to subsection subsections (1) and (5), a pharmacist may dispense a prescription written and signed; written or created in an electronic format, signed, and transmitted by facsimile; or transmitted electronically or by other means of communication by a physician prescriber, dentist prescriber, or veterinarian prescriber in another state, but not including a prescription for a controlled substance except under circumstances described in section 17763(e), only if the pharmacist in the

- 1 exercise of his or her professional judgment determines all of the
 2 following:
- 3 (a) Except as otherwise authorized under section 5110, 17744a,
 4 or 17744b, if the prescriber is a physician or dentist, that the
 5 prescription was issued pursuant to an existing physician-patient
 6 or dentist-patient relationship.
 - (b) That the prescription is authentic.
- 8 (c) That the prescribed drug is appropriate and necessary for9 the treatment of an acute, chronic, or recurrent condition.
- 10 (3) A pharmacist or a prescriber shall dispense a prescription
 11 only if the prescription falls within the scope of practice of the
 12 prescriber.
- 13 (4) A pharmacist shall not knowingly dispense a prescription14 after the death of the prescriber or patient.
- 15 (5) A pharmacist shall not dispense a drug or device under a
 16 prescription transmitted by facsimile or created in electronic
 17 format and printed out for use by the patient unless the document
 18 is manually signed by the prescriber. This subsection does not
 19 apply to a any of the following:
 - (a) A prescription that is transmitted by a computer to a facsimile machine if that prescription complies with section 17754.
 - (b) A prescription that is received by a remote pharmacy and made available to a pharmacist described in section 17742b(2) for review and verification in the manner required under subsection (1).
- 26 (6) After consultation with and agreement from the prescriber,
 27 a pharmacist may add or change a patient's address, a dosage form,
 28 a drug strength, a drug quantity, a direction for use, or an issue
 29 date with regard to a prescription. A pharmacist shall note the

- 2 subsection on the prescription or, if the drug is dispensed at a
- 3 remote pharmacy, on the digital image of the prescription described
- 4 in subsection (1), and shall maintain that documentation with the
- 5 prescription as required in section 17752. A pharmacist shall not
- 6 change the patient's name, controlled substance prescribed unless
- 7 authorized to dispense a lower cost generically equivalent drug
- 8 product under section 17755, or the prescriber's signature with
- 9 regard to a prescription.
- 10 (7) A prescription that is contained within a patient's chart
- 11 in a health facility or agency licensed under article 17 or other
- 12 medical institution and that is transmitted to a pharmacy under

- 15 drug or device under a prescription described in this subsection. A

- 24 (8) If, after consulting with a patient, a pharmacist
- 25 determines in the exercise of his or her professional judgment that
- 26 dispensing additional quantities of a prescription drug is
- 27 appropriate for the patient, the pharmacist may dispense, at one
- 28 time, additional quantities of the prescription drug up to the
- 29 total number of dosage units authorized by the prescriber on the

- 1 original prescription for the patient and any refills of the
- 2 prescription. Except for a controlled substance included in
- 3 schedule 5 that does not contain an opioid, this subsection does
- 4 not apply to a prescription for a controlled substance.
- 5 Sec. 17752. (1) A prescription, or an equivalent record of the
- 6 prescription approved by the board, shall be preserved by a
- 7 licensee or dispensing prescriber for not less than 5 years.
- 8 (2) A prescription or equivalent record on file in a pharmacy
- 9 is not a public record. A person having custody of or access to
- 10 prescriptions shall not disclose their contents or provide copies
- 11 without the patient's authorization, to any person except to any of
- 12 the following:
- 13 (a) The patient for whom the prescription was issued, or
- 14 another pharmacist acting on behalf of the patient.
- 15 (b) The authorized prescriber who issued the prescription, or
- 16 a licensed health professional who is currently treating the

- 18 (c) An agency or agent of government responsible for the
- 19 enforcement of laws relating to drugs and devices.

- 21 (e) A person engaged in research projects or studies with

- 23 (3) A pharmacist may refill a copy of a prescription from
- 24 another pharmacy if the original prescription has remaining
- 25 authorized refills, and the copy is issued according to the
- 26 following procedure:
- 27 (a) The pharmacist issuing a written or oral copy of a
- 28 prescription shall cancel the original prescription and record the
- 29 cancellation. The record of cancellation shall must include the

- date the copy was issued, to whom issued, and the identification ofthe pharmacist who issued the copy.
- 3 (b) The written or oral copy issued shall must be a duplicate
 4 of the original prescription except that it shall must also include
 5 the prescription number, the name of the pharmacy issuing the copy,
 6 the date the copy was issued, and the number of authorized refills
 7 remaining available to the patient.
 - (c) The pharmacist receiving a written or oral copy of the prescription shall exercise reasonable diligence to determine whether it is a valid copy, and having done so may treat the copy as an original prescription.
- 12 (d) Except as described in this part, all other copies
 13 furnished shall must be used for information purposes only and
 14 clearly marked "for informational or reference purposes only".
- 15 (4) Subsection (3) does not apply to pharmacies any of the 16 following:
 - (a) Pharmacies that share a real-time, on-line database or other equivalent means of communication. or to pharmacies
 - **(b) Pharmacies** that transfer prescriptions pursuant to a written contract for centralized prescription processing services as provided under section 17753.
 - (c) A parent pharmacy if the parent pharmacy receives a copy of a prescription from a remote pharmacy that it operates.
 - (d) A remote pharmacy if the remote pharmacy receives a copy of a prescription from a parent pharmacy.
- 26 (5) For purposes of this section, "equivalent record of the 27 prescription approved by the board" or "equivalent record" includes 28 a digital image described in section 17751(1).
