SUBSTITUTE FOR SENATE BILL NO. 600

A bill to amend 1976 PA 451, entitled "The revised school code,"

by amending sections 1170a, 1170b, 1277, 1278a, 1278c, 1278d, 1279h, 1280, and 1531f (MCL 380.1170a, 380.1170b, 380.1277, 380.1278a, 380.1278c, 380.1278d, 380.1279h, 380.1280, and 380.1531f), section 1170a as added by 2016 PA 388, section 1170b as added by 2017 PA 255, section 1277 as amended by 2018 PA 231, section 1278a as amended by 2018 PA 232, section 1278c as amended by 2018 PA 242, section 1278d as added by 2018 PA 241, section 1279h as added by 2018 PA 184, section 1280 as amended by 2006 PA 123, and section 1531f as added by 2010 PA 168; and to repeal acts and parts of acts.

Sec. 1170a. (1) By not later than the 2017-2018 school year,
 the The department shall ensure that the model core academic
 curriculum content standards for health education and the subject
 area content expectations and guidelines for health education under
 section 1278a provide for all both of the following:

6 (a) Instruction in cardiopulmonary resuscitation for pupils
7 enrolled in grades 7 to 12. Subject to subsection (5), the content
8 standards and subject area content expectations shall guidelines
9 must ensure that the psychomotor skills necessary to perform
10 cardiopulmonary resuscitation are incorporated into the instruction
11 and that the instruction is based on either of the following:

12 (i) An instructional program developed by the American Red13 Cross or the American Heart Association.

14 (*ii*) Nationally recognized, evidence-based guidelines for15 cardiopulmonary resuscitation.

16 (b) Instruction about automated external defibrillators for17 pupils enrolled in grades 7 to 12.

18 (2) The content standards or subject area content expectations 19 and guidelines under subsection (1) shall must not require a 20 certificated teacher to be an authorized CPR/AED instructor to 21 facilitate, provide, or oversee instruction described in subsection 22 (1) (a) if that instruction does not result in a pupil earning a CPR 23 certification card or status.

(3) If instruction described in subsection (1) (a) will result
in a pupil earning a CPR certification card or status, that
instruction must be taught by an authorized CPR/AED instructor, as
applicable.

28 (4) School districts, public school academies, and nonpublic29 schools are encouraged to use locally available resources to



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1 provide the instruction required to meet the content standards or 2 subject area content expectations and guidelines under subsection 3 (1), including, but not limited to, emergency medical technicians, 4 paramedics, police officers, firefighters, representatives of the 5 American Heart Association or American Red Cross, or properly 6 trained teachers or other school employees.

7 (5) The content standards and subject area content
8 expectations and guidelines required under subsection (1) shall
9 must provide that a school or program that provides 100% online
10 instruction is exempt from having to incorporate psychomotor skills
11 into the instruction under this section.

(6) As used in this section:

(a) "Authorized CPR/AED instructor" means an instructor who is
authorized by the American Heart Association, American Red Cross,
or a similar nationally recognized association to provide
instruction in cardiopulmonary resuscitation that results in the
issuance of a CPR certification card or status.

(b) "CPR certification card or status" means a card or other credential evidencing successful completion of instruction in cardiopulmonary resuscitation that is issued by the American Heart Association, American Red Cross, or a similar nationally recognized organization using evidence-based guidelines for the teaching of cardiopulmonary resuscitation.

Sec. 1170b. (1) Beginning in the 2019-2020 school year, the
The department shall ensure that the state model academic standards
guidelines for health education under section 1278a include
instruction on prescription opioid drug abuse, including, at least,
the model program of instruction made available under subsection
(2).



(2) Not later than July 1, 2019, the department shall make 1 available to school districts and public school academies a grade-2 and age-appropriate model program of instruction on prescription 3 opioid drug abuse based on the recommendations developed by the 4 prescription drug and opioid abuse commission under section 7113a 5 6 of the public health code, 1978 PA 368, MCL 333.7113a. The model 7 program of instruction made available by the department shall must 8 include at least instruction on the prescription drug epidemic and 9 the connection between prescription opioid drug abuse and addiction 10 to other drugs.

11 Sec. 1277. (1) Considering criteria established by the state board, in addition to the requirements specified in section 1280 12 for accreditation under that section, if the board of a school 13 14 district wants all of the schools of the school district to be 15 accredited under section 1280, the board shall adopt and implement 16 and, not later than September 1 each year, shall make available to the department a copy of a 3- to 5-year school improvement plan and 17 18 continuing school improvement process for each school within the 19 school district. The school improvement plans shall must include, 20 but are not limited to, a mission statement, goals based on student academic objectives for all students, curriculum alignment 21 22 corresponding with those goals, evaluation processes, staff 23 development, development and utilization of community resources and 24 volunteers, the role of adult and community education, libraries 25 and community colleges in the learning community, and building level decision making. (f) Ways to make available in as many fields as practicable 22 23 opportunities for structured on-the-job learning, such as 24 apprenticeships and internships that involve active, direct, and 25 hands-on learning, combined with classroom instruction that enhances a pupil's employability, including, but not limited to, 26 27 instruction relating to problem solving, personal management, organizational and negotiation skills, and teamwork. 28 29 (q) A requirement that each school operated by the school



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1 district provide to pupils a variety of age-appropriate career
2 informational resources in grades K to 12 and an opportunity to do
3 each of the following:

4 (i) During grade levels that the board of the school district
5 considers appropriate, complete 1 or more experiences in a field of
6 a pupil's interests or aptitude and participate in a follow-up
7 process that provides the pupil with sufficient reflection of those
8 experiences.

9 (ii) During grades K to 12, discuss career interests, options,
10 and preparations with a school counselor or, as considered
11 appropriate by the board of the school district, another
12 knowledgeable adult.

13 (h) Programs that will provide pupils in grades 6 to 12 work14 based learning activities that ensure those pupils make connections
15 with workers or experts in a variety of fields.

16 (i) Programs or instruction that ensure every pupil in grade
17 12 knows how to develop and use a resume, letter of reference,
18 school record, and talent portfolio, as described in section
19 1278b.1278a.

20 (3) Each intermediate school board shall adopt and implement and, not later than September 1 each year, shall make available to 21 22 the department a copy of a 3- to 5-year intermediate school 23 district school improvement plan and continuing school improvement 24 process for the intermediate school district. Constituent and 25 intermediate school board members, school building administrators, 26 teachers and other school employees, pupils, parents of pupils, and residents of the intermediate school district shall must be invited 27 28 and allowed to voluntarily participate in the development, review, 29 and evaluation of the intermediate school district's school



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improvement plan. 16 (d) Methods to assist school districts in integrating applied
17 academics and career and employability skills into all curricular
18 areas.

(e) Ways to make available in as many fields as practicable
opportunities for structured on-the-job learning, such as
apprenticeships and internships, combined with classroom
instruction.

23 (f) Collaborative efforts with supporting agencies that24 enhance academic learning.

(g) Long-range cost containment measures, including additional services that might be provided at reduced costs by the intermediate school district or through cooperative programs, and cost reduction programs such as interdistrict cooperation in special education and other programs and services.



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(h) To the extent that it would improve school effectiveness,
 specific recommendations on consolidation or enhanced interdistrict
 cooperation, or both, along with possible sources of revenue.

Sec. 1278a. (1) Except as otherwise provided in this section,
or section 1278b, beginning with pupils entering grade 8 in 2006,
2020, the board of a school district or board of directors of a
public school academy shall not award a high school diploma to a
pupil unless the pupil meets all both of the following:

10 (a) Has successfully completed all of the following credit 11 requirements of the Michigan merit standard before graduating from 12 high school:

13 (i) At least 4 credits in mathematics that are aligned with 14 subject area content expectations the Michigan high school 15 standards developed by the department and approved by the state board as described under section 1278b, this section, including 16 17 successful completion of at least algebra I , and geometry , and 18 algebra II, or an integrated sequence of this course content that 19 consists of 3-2 credits. , and an additional mathematics credit, 20 such as trigonometry, statistics, precalculus, calculus, applied 21 math, accounting, business math, a retake of algebra II, or a 22 course in financial literacy as described in section 1165. A pupil 23 may complete algebra II over 2 years with 2 credits awarded or over 24 1.5 years with 1.5 credits awarded for the purposes of this section and section 1278b. A pupil also may partially or fully fulfill the 25 26 algebra II requirement by completing a department-approved formal 27 career and technical education program or curriculum, such as a 28 program or curriculum in electronics, machining, construction, 29 welding, engineering, computer science, or renewable energy, and in



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that program or curriculum successfully completing the same content 1 2 as the algebra II benchmarks assessed on the department-prescribed 3 state high school assessment, as determined by the department. The department shall post on its website guidelines for implementation 4 5 of the immediately preceding sentence. Each pupil must successfully 6 complete at least 1 mathematics course during his or her final year 7 of high school enrollment. This subparagraph does not require 8 completion of mathematics courses in any particular sequence. The 9 remaining mathematics credits required in this subparagraph must be 10 satisfied through successful completion of any of the following 11 specified credits, courses, programs, or curricula that align with the Michigan high school standards developed by the department and 12 approved by the state board as described under this section and 13 14 that align with a pupil's educational development plan described 15 under subsection (15):

16 (A) 1 credit in algebra II. A pupil may partially or fully 17 successfully complete a credit in algebra II by completing a state-18 approved career and technical education program or curriculum, such 19 as a program or curriculum in electronics, machining, construction, 20 welding, engineering, computer science, or renewable energy, and in 21 that program or curriculum successfully completing the same content 22 as the algebra II benchmarks assessed on the department-prescribed 23 state high school assessment, as determined by the department. The 24 department shall post on its website quidelines for implementation 25 of the immediately preceding sentence.

- 26 (B) 1 credit in trigonometry.
 - 27 (C) 1 credit in statistics.
 - 28 (D) 1 credit in precalculus.
 - 29 (E) 1 credit in calculus.

- (F) 1 credit in applied math.
- 2 (G) 1 credit in accounting.

3 (H) 1 credit in business math.

4 (I) A course in financial literacy as described in section
5 1165. A pupil who successfully completes the financial literacy
6 course described under this sub-subparagraph is considered to have
7 completed 1 credit for purposes of this subparagraph.

8 (J) Any other credit, course, program, or curriculum that the 9 school district or public school academy determines is appropriate 10 and that includes the same content as the benchmarks assessed on 11 the department-prescribed state high school assessment for any of 12 the credits or courses listed under sub-subparagraphs (A) to (I).

13 (*ii*) Subparagraph (*i*) does not require completion of mathematics
14 courses in any particular sequence.

15 (iii) (iii) -At least 3 credits in social science that are aligned 16 with subject area content expectations the Michigan high school 17 standards developed by the department and approved by the state 18 board as described under section 1278b, including completion of at 19 least 1 credit in United States history and geography, 1 credit in world history and geography, 1/2 credit in economics, and the 20 21 civics course described in section 1166(2). The 1/2-credit 22 economics requirement may be satisfied by completion of at least a 23 1/2-credit course in personal economics that includes a financial 24 literacy component as described in section 1165, if that course 25 covers the subject area content expectations for economics 26 developed by the department and approved by the state board under 27 section 1278b.this section, including successful completion of at 28 least the civics course described under section 1166(2). A pupil 29 who successfully completes a civics course described under section



1166(2) is considered to have completed 1/2 credit for purposes of 1 2 this subparagraph. The remaining social science credits required in 3 this subparagraph must be satisfied through successful completion of any of the following specified credits, courses, programs, or 4 5 curricula that align with the Michigan high school standards 6 developed by the department and approved by the state board as 7 described under this section and that align with a pupil's 8 educational development plan described under subsection (15):

(A) 1 credit in United States history and geography.

10

(B) 1 credit in world history and geography.

(C) 1/2 credit in economics.

(D) A course in personal economics that includes a financial 12 13 literacy component as described in section 1165, if that course 14 covers the Michigan high school standards developed by the 15 department and approved by the state board as described under this 16 section that apply to economics. A pupil who successfully completes a personal economics course described under this sub-subparagraph 17 18 is considered to have completed 1/2 credit for purposes of this 19 subparagraph.

(E) Any other credit, course, program, or curriculum that the school district or public school academy determines is appropriate and that includes the same content as the benchmarks assessed on the department-prescribed state high school assessment for any of the credits or courses listed under sub-subparagraphs (A) to (D).

25 (iv) (iii) At least 1 credit in subject matter that includes both
26 health and physical education aligned with guidelines developed by
27 the department and approved by the state board under section 1278b,
28 or at least 1/2 credit in health aligned with guidelines developed
29 by the department and approved by the state board under section



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1278b and at least 1/2 credit awarded by the school district or 1 public school academy for approved participation in extracurricular 2 3 athletics or other extracurricular activities involving physical activity.At least 4 credits in English language arts that are 4 5 aligned with the Michigan high school standards developed by the 6 department and approved by the state board as described under this 7 section and that align with a pupil's educational development plan 8 described under subsection (15).

9 (v) (iv) At least 1 credit in visual arts, performing arts, or 10 applied arts, as defined by the department, that is aligned with quidelines developed by the department and approved by the state 11 12 board under section 1278b. A school district or public school 13 academy is strongly encouraged to offer visual arts and performing 14 arts courses. At least 3 credits in science that must include 15 successful completion of any of the following specified credits, 16 courses, programs, or curricula that align with the Michigan high 17 school standards developed by the department and approved by the 18 state board as described under this section and that align with a 19 pupil's educational development plan described under subsection 20 (15):

- 21 (A) 1 credit in biology.
- 22 (B) 1 credit in chemistry.
- 23 (C) 1 credit in physics.
- 24 (D) 1 credit in anatomy.
- 25 (E) 1 credit in agricultural science.
- 26 (F) 1 credit in forensics.
- 27 (G) 1 credit in astronomy.
- 28 (H) 1 credit in earth science.
- 29 (I) 1 credit in environmental science.



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- (J) 1 credit in geology.

2 (K) 1 credit in physiology.

3 (L) 1 credit in microbiology.

4 (M) A program or curriculum that provides the same content as 5 the chemistry or physics benchmarks, as determined by the 6 department. A pupil who completes a program or curriculum described 7 under this sub-subparagraph is considered to have completed 1 8 credit for purposes of this subparagraph.

9 (N) A department-approved computer science program or 10 curriculum or state-approved career and technical education program 11 or curriculum. A pupil who completes a program or curriculum 12 described under this sub-subparagraph is considered to have 13 completed 1 credit for purposes of this subparagraph.

(O) Any other credit, course, program, or curriculum that the
school district or public school academy determines is appropriate
and that includes the same content as the benchmarks assessed on
the department-prescribed state high school assessment for any of
the credits listed under sub-subparagraphs (A) to (L).

(v) The credit requirements specified in section 1278b(1).

(vi) Four credits in addition to the credits required under
subparagraphs (i), (iii), (iv), and (v). A school district or public
school academy shall determine the subject area and the manner in
which the credits required under this subparagraph must be
successfully completed.

(b) Meets the online course or learning experience requirement of this subsection. A school district or public school academy shall provide the basic level of technology and internet access required by the state board to complete the online course or learning experience. For a pupil to meet this requirement, the



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pupil shall must meet either of the following, as determined by the school district or public school academy:

3 (i) Has successfully completed at least 1 course or learning4 experience that is presented online, as defined by the department.

5 (ii) The pupil's school district or public school academy has
6 integrated an online experience throughout the high school
7 curriculum by ensuring that each teacher of each course that
8 provides the required credits of the Michigan merit curriculum has
9 integrated an online experience into the course.

10 (2) Any of the following may, without limitation, be counted
11 as an elective credit for a high school pupil if successfully
12 completed:

13 (a) A credit that is grade-appropriate in a language other 14 than English or coursework or other learning experiences that are 15 substantially equivalent to a credit in a language other than 16 English, aligned with guidelines developed by the department and 17 approved by the state board as described under this section, and 18 that is successfully completed during grades K to 12. The board of 19 a school district or board of directors of a public school academy 20 is strongly encouraged to ensure that all pupils complete at least 1 credit in a language other than English in grades K to 6. For 21 purposes of this subdivision, both of the following apply: 22

23 (i) American Sign Language is considered to be a language other24 than English.

(*ii*) The pupil may successfully complete all or part of a
credit under this subdivision with online coursework.

(b) A credit in health that is aligned with guidelines
developed by the department and approved by the state board as
described under this section.



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(c) A credit in physical education that is aligned with
 guidelines developed by the department and approved by the state
 board as described under this section.

4 (d) A credit in a subject matter that includes both health and 5 physical education that is aligned with guidelines developed by the 6 department and approved by the state board as described under this 7 section.

8 (e) A credit awarded by the school district or public school 9 academy for approved participation in extracurricular activities 10 involving physical activity. A school district or public school 11 academy shall determine the manner in which a credit under this 12 subdivision must be successfully completed.

(f) A credit in visual arts, performing arts, or applied arts as defined by the department, that is aligned with guidelines developed by the department and approved by the state board as described under this section. A school district or public school academy is strongly encouraged to offer visual arts and performing arts courses.

(g) Alternative coursework determined to be appropriate by the
school district or public school academy. A school district or
public school academy shall determine the manner in which the
coursework under this subdivision must be successfully completed.

(h) Humanities course sequences as determined to be
appropriate by the school district or public school academy. A
school district or public school academy shall determine the manner
in which the course sequences under this subdivision must be
successfully completed.

(i) A career and technical education course, program, orcurriculum. A school district or public school academy shall



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determine the manner in which the course, program, or curriculum
 under this subdivision must be successfully completed.

3 (j) An industrial technology course, program, or curriculum. A 4 school district or public school academy shall determine the manner 5 in which the course, program, or curriculum under this subdivision 6 must be successfully completed.

7 (k) A vocational education course, program, or curriculum. A
8 school district or public school academy shall determine the manner
9 in which the course, program, or curriculum under this subdivision
10 must be successfully completed.

(l) A course, program, or curriculum that is a combination of the courses, programs, or curricula described in subdivisions (i) to (k). A school district or public school academy shall determine the manner in which the course, program, or curriculum under this subdivision must be successfully completed.

(m) Any other credit, course, program, or curriculum determined to be appropriate by the school district or public school academy. A school district or public school academy shall determine the manner in which a credit, course, program, or curriculum under this subdivision must be successfully completed.

21 (2) In addition to the requirements under subsection (1), 22 beginning with pupils entering grade 3 in 2006, the board of a 23 school district or board of directors of a public school academy shall not award a high school diploma to a pupil unless the pupil 24 25 has successfully completed during grades K to 12 at least 2 credits 26 that are grade-appropriate in a language other than English or 27 course work or other learning experiences that are substantially equivalent to 2 credits in a language other than English, based on 28 guidelines developed by the department. For pupils who graduate 29



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from high school in 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020, 2021, 2022, 2023. 1 or 2024 only, a pupil may partially or fully fulfill 1 credit of 2 this requirement by completing a department-approved formal career 3 4 and technical education program or curriculum or by completing 5 visual or performing arts instruction that is in addition to the requirements under subsection (1) (a) (iv). The board of a school 6 district or board of directors of a public school academy is 7 8 strongly encouraged to ensure that all pupils complete at least 1 9 credit in a language other than English in grades K to 6. For the 10 purposes of this subsection, all of the following apply: (a) American sign language is considered to be a language 11 other than English. 12 13 (b) The pupil may meet all or part of this requirement with 14 online course work. (c) Not later than September 1, 2018, and not later than 15 September 1 of each subsequent school year, a school district or 16 17 public school academy shall report to the department both of the 18 following, in a form and manner prescribed by the department: 19 (i) The number of pupils who partially or fully fulfilled 1 credit in a language other than English by completing a department-20 21 approved formal career and technical education program or 22 curriculum under this subsection in the immediately preceding 23 school vear. 24 (ii) The number of pupils who partially or fully fulfilled 1 25 credit in a language other than English by completing visual or performing arts instruction that is in addition to the requirements 26 27 under subsection (1) (a) (iv) under this subsection in the immediately 28 preceding school year.

29

(3) The requirements under this section and section 1278b for



a high school diploma are in addition to any local requirements 1 2 imposed by the board of a school district or board of directors of a public school academy. The board of a school district or board of 3 directors of a public school academy, as a local requirement for a 4 5 high school diploma, may require a pupil to complete the Michigan 6 merit examination under section 1279g or may require a pupil to 7 participate in the MIAccess assessments if appropriate for the 8 pupil.

9 (4) For Except for the credits required under subsection
10 (1) (a) (vi) and the elective credit options under subsection (2) (e),
11 (g), (h), (i), (j), (k), (l), and (m) and except as otherwise
12 provided in this subsection, for the purposes of this section, and
13 section 1278b, all of the following apply:

14 (a) A pupil is considered to have **successfully** completed a 15 credit if the pupil successfully completes the subject area content expectations Michigan high school standards or quidelines developed 16 17 by the department that apply to the credit. For a career and technical education credit, a school district or public school 18 19 academy may supplement those content expectations standards and 20 quidelines with additional quidelines developed by the school 21 district or public school academy.

22 (b) A school district or public school academy shall base its 23 determination of whether a pupil has successfully completed the 24 subject area content expectations Michigan high school standards or 25 quidelines developed by the department that apply to a credit at least in part on the pupil's performance on the assessments 26 27 developed or selected by the department under section 1278b or on 1 28 or more assessments developed or selected by the school district or 29 public school academy that measure a pupil's understanding of the



subject area content expectations Michigan high school standards or
 guidelines that apply to the credit.

(c) A-Except for the elective credit options under subsection 3 4 (2) (b), (c), (d), and (f), a school district or public school academy shall also grant a pupil a credit if the pupil earns a 5 6 qualifying score, as determined by the department, on the 7 assessments developed or selected for the subject area by the 8 department under section 1278b or the pupil earns a qualifying 9 score, as determined by the school district or public school 10 academy, on 1 or more assessments developed or selected by the 11 school district or public school academy that measure a pupil's 12 understanding of the subject area content expectations Michigan high school standards or guidelines that apply to the credit. 13

14 (5) If a high school is designated by the superintendent of 15 public instruction as a specialty school and the high school meets 16 the requirements of subsection (6), then the pupils of the high 17 school are not required to successfully complete the 4 credits in 18 English language arts required under section 1278b(1)(a) subsection 19 (1) (a) (*iv*) or the 3 credits in social science required under 20 subsection (1) (a) (ii) (1) (a) (iii) and the school district or public 21 school academy is not required to ensure that each pupil is offered 22 the curriculum necessary for meeting those English language arts or 23 social science credit requirements. The superintendent of public 24 instruction may designate up to 15 high schools that meet the 25 requirements of this subsection as specialty schools. Subject to 26 this maximum number, the superintendent of public instruction shall 27 designate a high school as a specialty school if the superintendent 28 of public instruction finds that the high school meets all both of 29 the following criteria:



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(a) The high school incorporates a significant reading and
 writing component throughout its curriculum.

3 (b) The high school uses a specialized, innovative, and
4 rigorous curriculum in such areas as performing arts, foreign
5 language, extensive use of internships, or other learning
6 innovations that conform to pioneering innovations among other
7 leading national or international high schools.

8 (6) A high school that is designated by the superintendent of 9 public instruction as a specialty school under subsection (5) is 10 only exempt from requirements as described under subsection (5) as 11 long as the superintendent of public instruction finds that the 12 high school continues to meet all of the following requirements: 13 (a) The high school clearly states to prospective pupils and 14 their parents that it does not meet the requirements of the 15 Michigan merit standard under this section and section 1278b but is 16 a designated specialty school that is exempt from some of those 17 requirements and that a pupil who enrolls in the high school and 18 subsequently transfers to a high school that is not a specialty 19 school meeting the requirements of this subsection will be required 20 to comply with the requirements of the Michigan merit standard

21 under this section. and section 1278b.

(b) For the most recent year for which the data are available, the mean scores on both the mathematics and science portions of the ACT or SAT examination, as applicable, for the pupils of the high school exceed by at least 10% the mean scores on the mathematics and science portions of the ACT or SAT examination, as applicable, for the pupils of the school district in which the greatest number of the pupils of the high school reside.

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(c) For the most recent year for which the data are available,



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the high school had a graduation rate of at least 85%, as
 determined by the department.

3 (d) For the most recent year for which the data are available,
4 at least 75% of the pupils who graduated from the high school the
5 preceding year are enrolled in a postsecondary institution.

6 (e) All pupils of the high school are required to meet the
7 mathematics credit requirements of subsection (1) (a) (i), with no
8 modification of these requirements under section 1278b(5), under
9 subsection (1) (a) (i) and each pupil is offered the curriculum
10 necessary to meet this requirement.

(f) All pupils of the high school are required to meet the science credit requirements of section 1278b(1)(b) under subsection (1)(a)(v) and are also required to successfully complete at least 1 additional science credit, for a total of at least 4 science credits, with no modification of these requirements under section 1278b(5), and each pupil is offered the curriculum necessary to meet this requirement.

18 (7) If a pupil successfully completes 1 or more of the high
19 school credits required under subsection (1) or elective credit
20 options under subsection (2) before entering high school, the pupil
21 must be given high school credit for that credit.

(8) For the purposes of this section, the department shall doall of the following:

(a) Develop Michigan high school standards that apply to the credits required in the Michigan merit standard under subsection (1) (a) (i), (iii), (iv), and (v) and develop guidelines for the online course or learning experience required under subsection (1) (b) and for the elective credit options under subsection (2) (a) to (d) and (f). All of the following apply to the Michigan high school



1 standards and guidelines described under this subdivision:

2 (*i*) All of the Michigan high school standards must be 3 consistent with the state board recommended model core academic 4 curriculum content standards under section 1278. The Michigan high school standards or guidelines must not include attitudes, beliefs, 5 6 or value systems that are not essential in the legal, economic, and 7 social structure of our society and to the personal and social 8 responsibility of citizens of our society. The Michigan high school 9 standards must require pupils to demonstrate critical thinking 10 skills.

(*ii*) The Michigan high school standards and the guidelines must
be approved by the state board under subsection (9).

13 (*iii*) The Michigan high school standards must state in clear and
14 measurable terms what pupils are expected to know upon completion
15 of each credit.

16 (*iv*) The department shall complete the development of the
17 Michigan high school standards and guidelines described under this
18 subdivision not later than August 1, 2020.

19 (v) If the department has not completed development of the 20 Michigan high school standards that apply to the required credits 21 in the Michigan merit standard under subsection (1) (a) (i), (iii), 22 (iv), and (v) by the date required under this subdivision, a school 23 district or public school academy may align the content of the 24 credit with locally adopted standards.

(vi) Until all of the Michigan high school standards and guidelines have been developed by the department and approved by the state board, the department shall submit a report at least every 6 months to the senate and house standing committees responsible for education legislation on the status of the



1 development of the Michigan high school standards and guidelines. 2 The report must detail any failure by the department to meet the 3 deadline established under subparagraph (iv) and the reasons for 4 that failure.

5 $(v\ddot{u})$ The department shall include in the Michigan high school 6 standards and the guidelines developed under this subsection that 7 the algebra I or geometry credits required under subsection (1) (a) (i), any of the mathematics credits, courses, programs, or 8 9 curricula listed under subsection (1) (a) (i) (A) to (J), the civics 10 course required under subsection (1) (a) (iii), any of the social science credits, courses, programs, or curricula listed under 11 subsection (1) (a) (iii) (A) to (E), the English language arts credits 12 13 required under subsection (1) (a) (iv), any of the science credits, 14 courses, programs, or curricula listed under subsection (1) (a) (ν) (A) 15 to (O), and any of the elective credit options listed under 16 subsection (2)(a) to (f) may be successfully completed through 17 alternative instructional delivery methods such as alternative 18 coursework, humanities course sequences, career and technical 19 education, industrial technology courses, or vocational education, 20 or by a combination of these.

(b) Develop and implement a process for developing the
Michigan high school standards and guidelines required under this
section. This process must provide for all of the following:

8 (*ii*) A review of the Michigan high school standards or

10 (*iii*) An opportunity for the public to review and provide input 11 on the proposed Michigan high school standards or guidelines before 12 they are submitted to the state board for approval. The time period 13 allowed for this review and input must be at least 15 business 14 days.

15 (c) Determine the basic level of technology and internet 16 access required for pupils to complete the online course or 17 learning experience requirement of subsection (1)(b), and submit 18 that determination to the state board for approval.

(d) Develop and make available material to assist school

2 (10) If a pupil receives special education services, the 3 pupil's individualized education program, in accordance with the individuals with disabilities education act, title VI of Public Law 4 5 91-230, must identify the appropriate course or courses of study 6 and identify the supports, accommodations, and modifications 7 necessary to allow the pupil to progress in the curricular 8 requirements of this section for a high school diploma or meet the 9 requirements as modified under subsection (20).

10 (11) The board of a school district or board of directors of a 11 public school academy that operates a high school shall ensure that each pupil is offered the curriculum necessary for the pupil to 12 13 meet the curricular requirements of this section. The board or 14 board of directors may provide this curriculum by providing the 15 algebra I or geometry credits required under subsection (1)(a)(i), 16 any of the mathematics credits, courses, programs, or curricula 17 listed under subsection (1) (a) (i) (A) to (J), the civics course 18 required under subsection (1) (a) (iii), any of the social science 19 credits, courses, programs, or curricula listed under subsection 20 (1) (a) (iii) (A) to (E), the English language arts credits required 21 under subsection (1)(a)(iv), any of the science credits, courses, 22 programs, or curricula listed under subsection (1)(a)(v)(A) to (0), 23 and any of the elective credit options listed under subsection 24 (2) (a) to (f) through alternative instructional delivery methods 25 such as alternative coursework, humanities course sequences, career 26 and technical education, industrial technology courses, or 27 vocational education, or by a combination of these. School 28 districts and public school academies that operate career and 29 technical education programs are encouraged to integrate the credit



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requirements of this section into those programs.

2 (12) If the board of a school district or board of directors 3 of a public school academy wants its high school to be accredited 4 under section 1280, the board or board of directors shall ensure 5 that all elements of the curriculum required under this section are 6 made available to all affected pupils. If a school district or 7 public school academy does not offer all of the required credits, 8 the board of the school district or board of directors of the 9 public school academy shall ensure that the pupil has access to the 10 required credits by other means, such as enrollment in a 11 postsecondary course under the postsecondary enrollment options act, 1996 PA 160, MCL 388.511 to 388.524; enrollment in an online 12 13 course; a cooperative arrangement with a neighboring school 14 district or with a public school academy; or granting approval 15 under section 6(6) of the state school aid act of 1979, MCL 16 388.1606, for the pupil to be counted in membership in another 17 school district.

(14) To the extent required by the no child left behind act of 1 2 2001, Public Law 107-110 or the every student succeeds act, Public 3 Law 114-95, the board of a school district or board of directors of 4 a public school academy shall ensure that all components of the curricular requirements under this section are taught by highly 5 6 qualified teachers. If a school district or public school academy 7 demonstrates to the department that the school district or public 8 school academy is unable to meet the requirements of this section 9 because the school district or public school academy is unable to 10 hire enough highly qualified teachers, the department shall work 11 with the school district or public school academy to develop a plan to allow the school district or public school academy to hire 12 13 enough highly qualified teachers to meet the requirements of this 14 section.

15 (15) The board of a school district or board of directors of a public school academy shall ensure that each pupil develops an 16 17 educational development plan during grade 7, and shall ensure that 18 each pupil reviews his or her educational development plan during 19 grade 8 and revises it as appropriate before he or she begins high 20 school. An educational development plan must be

During the process of 3 developing and reviewing a pupil's educational development plan, 4 the pupil must be advised that many of the curricular requirements 5 of this section may be fulfilled through career and technical 6 education. In addition, during the process of developing and 7 reviewing an educational development plan, the pupil must be 8 provided with both of the following:

9 (a) An opportunity to explore careers specific to the pupil's 10 interests and identify career pathways and goals for achieving 11 success in those careers, including, but not limited to, the level and type of educational preparation necessary to accomplish those 12 13 goals. In fulfilling the requirement under this subdivision, the 14 board of a school district or board of directors of a public school 15 academy is strongly encouraged to ensure that a pupil is also provided with information on various types of careers and current 16 17 and projected job openings in this state and those jobs' actual and 18 projected wages.

19 (b) An opportunity to develop a talent portfolio. A talent 20 portfolio must be developed and revised throughout the 21 implementation of the pupil's educational development plan. A 22 talent portfolio must include, but is not limited to, a record of 23 the pupil's experiences, proficiencies, certifications, or 24 accomplishments that demonstrate talents or marketable skills. The 25 department, in conjunction with the department of labor and 26 economic opportunity, shall develop and make available to the 27 public schools model information materials that school districts or 28 public school academies may use to comply with this subdivision. 29 (16) Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, if a



1 school district or public school academy is unable to implement all 2 of the curricular requirements of this section for pupils entering 3 grade 8 in 2020 or is unable to implement another requirement of 4 this section, the school district or public school academy may 5 apply to the department for permission to phase in 1 or more of the 6 requirements of this section. To apply, the school district or 7 public school academy shall submit a proposed phase-in plan to the 8 department. The department shall approve a phase-in plan if the 9 department determines that the plan will result in the school 10 district or public school academy making satisfactory progress 11 toward full implementation of the requirements of this section. (18) Not later than April 1 of each year, the department shall
submit an annual report to the legislature that evaluates the
overall success of the curriculum required under this section, the
rigor and relevance of the coursework required by the curriculum,



1 the ability of public schools to implement the curriculum and the 2 required coursework, and the impact of the curriculum on pupil 3 success, and that details any activities the department has 4 undertaken to implement this section or to assist public schools in 5 implementing the requirements of this section.

6 (19) If the department already developed and the state board 7 already approved subject area content expectations or guidelines 8 under former section 1278b that are equivalent to the Michigan high 9 school standards or quidelines described under this section or the 10 department already developed and the state board already approved 11 high school standards in the same manner that the Michigan high school standards and quidelines described under this section are 12 13 required to be developed and approved under this section that are 14 equivalent to the Michigan high school standards or guidelines 15 described under this section, those subject area content expectations, guidelines, or high school standards remain in effect 16 17 according to the terms of the original approval and the department 18 may utilize those subject area content expectations, quidelines, or 19 high school standards in meeting the requirement for the 20 development and approval of Michigan high school standards and 21 guidelines under subsections (8) and (9).

22 (20) If the parent or legal guardian of a pupil requests a 23 modification of the Michigan merit standard requirements under this 24 section and demonstrates that the modification is necessary because 25 the pupil is a child with a disability, the school district or 26 public school academy may allow that modification to the extent 27 necessary because of the pupil's disability if the pupil, at least 28 1 of the pupil's parents or the pupil's legal guardian, and a 29 teacher who is currently teaching the pupil or the pupil's high



1 school counselor or another designee qualified to act in a 2 counseling role under section 1233 or 1233a selected by the high 3 school principal determine that the modification is consistent with 4 the pupil's educational development plan under subsection (15) or 5 the pupil's transitional plan and the pupil's individualized 6 education program. As used in this subdivision, "child with a 7 disability" means that term as defined in 20 USC 1401. 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2 (2) As part of the process of developing an educational
3 development plan under section 1278b, 1278a, the board of a school
4 district or board of directors of a public school academy shall
5 ensure that pupils are provided with all of the following:

6 (a) Information about how they can fulfill the requirements of
7 sections section 1278a and 1278b with career and technical
8 education or another program approved by the department.

9 (b) The most recent analysis of in-demand occupations in the 10 region in which the school district, intermediate school district, 11 or public school academy is located, provided by the department of 12 technology, management, and budget, bureau of labor market 13 information and strategic initiatives. The building-level evaluation used in the 3 accreditation process shall must include, but is not limited to, 4 school data collection, self-study, visitation and validation, 5 determination of performance data to be used, and the development 6 of a school improvement plan.

7 (3) The department shall develop and distribute to all public 8 schools proposed accreditation standards. Upon distribution of the 9 proposed standards, the department shall hold statewide public 10 hearings for the purpose of receiving testimony concerning the 11 standards. After a review of the testimony, the department shall revise and submit the proposed standards to the superintendent of 12 public instruction. After a review and revision, if appropriate, of 13 14 the proposed standards, the superintendent of public instruction 15 shall submit the proposed standards to the senate and house 16 committees that have the responsibility for education legislation. Upon approval by these committees, the department shall distribute 17 18 to all public schools the standards to be applied to each school 19 for accreditation purposes. The superintendent of public 20 instruction shall review and update the accreditation standards annually using the process prescribed under this subsection. 21

(4) The superintendent of public instruction shall develop and
distribute to all public schools standards for determining that a
school is eligible for summary accreditation under subsection (6).
The standards shall must be developed, reviewed, approved, and
distributed using the same process as prescribed in subsection (3)
for accreditation standards, and shall must be finally distributed
and implemented not later than December 31, 1994.

(5) The standards for accreditation or summary accreditation



under this section shall must include as criteria pupil performance 1 on Michigan education assessment program (MEAP) tests the M-STEP 2 and on the Michigan merit examination under section 1279g, and, 3 until the Michigan merit examination has been fully implemented, 4 5 the percentage of pupils achieving state endorsement under section 6 1279, but shall not be based solely on pupil performance on MEAP 7 tests the M-STEP or the Michigan merit examination. or on the 8 percentage of pupils achieving state endorsement under section 9 1279. The standards shall must also include as criteria multiple 10 year change in pupil performance on MEAP tests the M-STEP and the 11 Michigan merit examination. and, until after the Michigan merit 12 examination is fully implemented, multiple year change in the percentage of pupils achieving state endorsement under section 13 14 1279. If it is necessary for the superintendent of public 15 instruction to revise accreditation or summary accreditation 16 standards established under subsection (3) or (4) to comply with 17 this subsection, the revised standards shall must be developed, 18 reviewed, approved, and distributed using the same process as 19 prescribed in subsection (3).

20 (6) If the superintendent of public instruction determines 21 that a public school has met the standards established under 22 subsection (4) or (5) for summary accreditation, the school is 23 considered to be accredited without the necessity for a full 24 building-level evaluation under subsection (2).

(7) If the superintendent of public instruction determines that a school has not met the standards established under subsection (4) or (5) for summary accreditation but that the school is making progress toward meeting those standards, or if, based on a full building-level evaluation under subsection (2), the



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superintendent of public instruction determines that a school has not met the standards for accreditation but is making progress toward meeting those standards, the school is in interim status and is subject to a full building-level evaluation as provided in this section.

6 (8) If a school has not met the standards established under
7 subsection (4) or (5) for summary accreditation and is not eligible
8 for interim status under subsection (7), the school is unaccredited
9 and subject to the measures provided in this section.

10 (9) Beginning with the 2002-2003 school year, if If at least 11 5% of a public school's answer sheets from the administration of the Michigan educational assessment program (MEAP) tests M-STEP are 12 lost by the department or by a state contractor and if the public 13 14 school can verify that the answer sheets were collected from pupils 15 and forwarded to the department or the contractor, the department 16 shall not assign an accreditation score or school report card grade to the public school for that subject area for the corresponding 17 18 year for the purposes of determining state accreditation under this 19 section. The department shall not assign an accreditation score or 20 school report card grade to the public school for that subject area 21 until the results of all tests for the next year are available.

(10) Subsection (9) does not preclude the department from 22 23 determining whether a public school or a school district has 24 achieved adequate yearly progress for the school year in which the 25 answer sheets were lost for the purposes of the no child left behind act of 2001, Public Law 107-110. However, the department 26 shall ensure that a public school or the school district is not 27 28 penalized when determining adequate yearly progress status due to 29 the fact that the public school's MEAP M-STEP answer sheets were



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lost by the department or by a state contractor, but shall not
 require a public school or school district to retest pupils or
 produce scores from another test for this purpose.

4 (11) The superintendent of public instruction shall annually
5 review and evaluate for accreditation purposes the performance of
6 each school that is unaccredited and as many of the schools that
7 are in interim status as permitted by the department's resources.

8 (12) The superintendent of public instruction shall, and the 9 intermediate school district to which a school district is 10 constituent, a consortium of intermediate school districts, or any 11 combination thereof may, provide technical assistance, as appropriate, to a school that is unaccredited or that is in interim 12 status upon request of the board of the school district in which 13 14 the school is located. If requests to the superintendent of public 15 instruction for technical assistance exceed the capacity, the superintendent of public instruction shall give priority shall be 16 given to unaccredited schools. 17

18 (13) A school that has been unaccredited for 3 consecutive
19 years is subject to 1 or more of the following measures, as
20 determined by the superintendent of public instruction:

(a) The superintendent of public instruction or his or her
designee shall appoint at the expense of the affected school
district an administrator of the school until the school becomes
accredited.

(b) A parent, legal guardian, or person in loco parentis of a
child who attends the school may send his or her child to any
accredited public school with an appropriate grade level within the
school district.

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(c) The school, with the approval of the superintendent of



public instruction, shall align itself with an existing research based school improvement model or establish an affiliation for
 providing assistance to the school with a college or university
 located in this state.

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(d) The school shall be is closed.

6 (14) The superintendent of public instruction shall evaluate 7 the school accreditation program and the status of schools under 8 this section and shall submit an annual report based upon the 9 evaluation to the senate and house committees that have the 10 responsibility for education legislation. The report shall must 11 address the reasons each unaccredited school is not accredited and 12 shall must recommend legislative action that will result in the accreditation of all public schools in this state. 13

(15) Beginning with the 2008-2009 school year, a A high school 14 15 shall not be accredited by the department unless the department 16 determines that the high school is providing or has otherwise 17 ensured that all pupils have access to all of the elements of the curriculum required under sections section 1278a. and 1278b. If it 18 19 is necessary for the superintendent of public instruction to revise 20 accreditation or summary accreditation standards established under subsection (3) or (4) to comply with the changes made to this 21 section by the amendatory act that added this subsection, 22 23 subsection (16), the revised standards shall must be developed, reviewed, approved, and distributed using the same process as 24 25 prescribed in subsection (3).

26 (16) As used in this section, "M-STEP" means the Michigan27 student test of educational progress.

28 Sec. 1531f. (1) The department may enter into a memorandum of29 understanding with a federally recognized Native American tribe,



the board of a school district, or the board of directors of a 1 public school academy that authorizes the superintendent of public 2 instruction to issue a 3-year letter of approval or continuing 3 approval to allow the Native American tribe, school district, or 4 5 public school academy to use teachers who do not possess a valid 6 Michigan teaching certificate to teach a Native American tribal 7 language and culture class. A memorandum of understanding entered 8 into under this section shall must require that a noncertificated 9 teacher has demonstrated mastery of the tribal language either 10 through a credential issued by a federally recognized Native 11 American tribe or another means considered suitable by the 12 department. The memorandum of agreement shall must include 13 requirements for renewal or continuing approval of the 14 noncertificated teacher as established by the Native American 15 tribe, the board of the school district, or the board of directors 16 of the public school academy in collaboration with the department.

17 (2) Credits earned by a pupil in a Native American tribal 18 language taught by a noncertificated teacher pursuant to under this 19 section may be applied by the Native American tribe, school 20 district, or public school academy for any purpose to the same extent as if taught by a certificated teacher, including, but not 21 limited to, credit toward completion of the **elective** credit 22 23 requirements option under section 1278a concerning for a credit in 24 a language other than English.

25 Enacting section 1. Section 1278b of the revised school code,26 1976 PA 451, MCL 380.1278b, is repealed.

27 Enacting section 2. This amendatory act takes effect 30 days28 after the date it is enacted into law.



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
