

# HOUSE BILL No. 5491

## EXECUTIVE BUDGET BILL

February 14, 1990, Introduced by Reps. Jacobetti and O'Neill and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

A bill to make appropriations for the department of education and certain other purposes relating to education for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1991; to provide for the expenditure of the appropriations; to prescribe the powers and duties of certain state departments, school districts, and other governmental bodies; and to provide for the disposition of fees and other income received by certain legal entities and state agencies.

24 Sec. 202. The appropriations made and the expenditures authorized under

- 19 (o) "OERI" means office of educational research and improvement.
- 20 (p) "OESE" means office of elementary and secondary education.
- 21 (q) "OHDS" means office of human development services.
- 22 (r) "OPSE" means office of postsecondary education.
- 23 (s) "OSERS" means the office of special education rehabilitation service.
- 24 (t) "OVAE" means office of vocational and adult education.
- 25 (u) "SSA" means the social security administration.
- 26 (v) "USDA" means the United States department of agriculture.

1 (w) "VA" means the United States veterans administration.

2 Sec. 204. A position created under this act that is fully funded by  
3 federal funds shall not be continued as a state funded position when the  
4 federal funds are discontinued or reduced to the point that the federal funds  
5 will not sustain the position 100%.

6 Sec. 205. The funds appropriated in section 101 for the employer's  
7 contribution to the state employees' retirement system shall be paid at the  
8 rate of 17.67% of salaries, wages, longevity, overtime, and annual leave paid  
9 upon termination of employment.

10 Sec. 206. The funds donated from private sources to the department shall  
11 be appropriated for the purpose for which they are granted, if the department  
12 expends the funds in furtherance of programs established and recognized by the  
13 legislature.

14 Sec. 207. The funds appropriated in section 101 from the central funds  
15 for acquiring additional federal funds, private foundation grants, or gifts  
16 shall not be expended until the grant money is authorized by the grantor.  
17 Expenditure of these funds shall be controlled through the allotment process.  
18 Funds accepted under this section shall not be authorized if the receipt of the  
19 funds mandates a commitment for state funding at a future date. The department  
20 shall report by December 30 of each year to the department of management and  
21 budget and the senate and house appropriations subcommittees responsible for  
22 the department's budget concerning the funds received and utilized under this  
23 section during the previous fiscal year.

24 Sec. 208. The department shall expend a portion of the funds appropriated  
25 to the department in reporting to the senate and house appropriations  
26 subcommittees responsible for the department's budget and the department of

1 management and budget within 60 days after the auditor general issues his or  
2 her annual report on the operation of the department. The report of the  
3 department shall specify all of the following:

4 (a) The recommendations of the auditor general implemented by the  
5 department.

6 (b) The recommendations of the auditor general not implemented by the  
7 department or implemented by the department as modified.

8 (c) The rationale for not implementing a recommendation of the auditor  
9 general or of implementing a recommendation as modified.

10 Sec. 209. The department may carry into the succeeding fiscal year  
11 unexpended federal pass-through funds to local institutions and governments  
12 that do not require additional state matching funds. Federal pass-through  
13 funds to local institutions and governments that are received in amounts in  
14 addition to those included in section 101 and that do not require additional  
15 state matching funds are appropriated for the purposes intended.

16 Sec. 210. The department may receive and expend funds in addition to  
17 those authorized in section 101 for conducting training and orientation  
18 workshops and seminars that are consistent with the programmatic mission of the  
19 individual unit sponsoring or coordinating the program.

20 Sec. 211. The department shall transmit to the department of management  
21 and budget, the senate and house appropriations subcommittees responsible for  
22 the department's budget and the senate and house fiscal agencies a quarterly  
23 report on all of the department's contractual employees. This report shall  
24 specify each contractual employee by:

25 (a) Position and organizational location.

26 (b) Name.

- 1 (c) Salary or wage and all related expenses.
- 2 (d) Starting date and projected duration of position.
- 3 (e) Programmatic purpose of the position.
- 4 (f) Recruitment process and selection criteria used.
- 5 (g) The current appropriation source that provides funding for the  
6 position.
- 7 (h) Other information considered necessary or appropriate by either or  
8 both of the appropriations subcommittees.

9 Sec. 212. The funds appropriated for utilities and that portion of  
10 contractual services, supplies, and materials used to pay for utility service  
11 to state facilities in section 101 may be expended in a manner consistent with  
12 section 253 of the management and budget act, Act No. 431 of the Public Acts of  
13 1984, being section 18.1253 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

14 STATE BOARD/OFFICE OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

15 Sec. 301. The department may expend technical assistance funds to help  
16 local and intermediate school districts address current financial problems, to  
17 improve management, and to improve public information and educational delivery  
18 systems. Unexpended technical assistance funds from Act No. 171 of the Public  
19 Acts of 1989 may be expended by the department for the purposes described in  
20 this section.

21 Sec. 302. The funds appropriated in section 101 for the school-age  
22 parents program shall be expended for all of the following purposes:

- 23 (a) Administering the alternative education program for school-age  
24 parents, as authorized in section 93 of the state school aid act of 1979, Act  
25 No. 94 of the Public Acts of 1979, being section 388.1693 of the Michigan  
26 Compiled Laws.



1 (b) Coordinating the services offered by the departments of social  
2 services, public health, and education to school-age parents and their children.

3 (c) Monitoring and evaluating the effectiveness of alternative programs  
4 for school-age parents and their children in K to 12 school districts.

5 (d) The department shall report the results of its evaluations of  
6 alternative programs for school-age parents for the preceding fiscal year to  
7 the department of management and budget and the house and senate appropriation  
8 subcommittees responsible for the department's budget by November 1, 1990.

9 Sec. 303. (1) Included in section 101 are funds for the office of  
10 minority equity in postsecondary education. This office shall review and make  
11 recommendations for enhancing the state's progress in responding to the  
12 educational needs of minorities, handicappers, and women in postsecondary  
13 education. The office shall serve as ombudsman to investigate and resolve  
14 reports of barriers to minority success on state university campuses.

15 (2) The office of minority equity shall provide a report on its  
16 recommendations concerning the state's response to the postsecondary  
17 educational needs of minorities, handicappers and women as a result of its  
18 investigations in the preceding fiscal year to the department of management and  
19 budget and the house and senate appropriation subcommittees responsible for the  
20 department's budget by November 1, 1990.

21 Sec. 304. The Detroit education center may work with the Detroit public  
22 schools and other partners in the Detroit compact and may provide assistance  
23 relative to those issues directly related to the responsibilities of the  
24 superintendent of public instruction required by the federal district court  
25 orders under *Bradley v Milliken*, 411 F Supp 943 (ED Mich 1975), aff'd 433 US  
26 267, 279 (1977) (*Milliken II*).

1       Sec. 305. From the \$560,500.00 appropriated in section 101 to the state  
2 board of education, not more than \$55,000.00 shall be expended for travel.

3       Sec. 306. Not later than May 1 of each year, the department shall provide  
4 the senate and house appropriations subcommittees responsible for the  
5 department's budget and the department of management and budget with a revised  
6 comprehensive report of the transferability of vocational courses from high  
7 school to community colleges, junior colleges, and 4-year colleges and  
8 universities.

9       Sec. 307. The funds appropriated in section 101 for the classrooms of  
10 tomorrow study implementation shall be expended for management of the  
11 implementation and expansion of the program.

12 OFFICE OF TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE AND EVALUATION

13       Sec. 401. (1) The contracts provided for in section 101 that relate to  
14 the Michigan education assessment program shall be awarded on the basis of  
15 competitive bidding. The department shall not use the results of the Michigan  
16 education assessment program for evaluation purposes. All school districts  
17 within this state shall participate in the tenth grade assessment program.

18       (2) The department may contract with a local school district, an  
19 intermediate school district, or both, as well as with testing companies, for  
20 sample testing, but not for the every-pupil mathematics and reading testing  
21 portion of the Michigan education assessment program.

22       Sec. 402. (1) The department shall continue to redevelop tests for use in  
23 the basic skills assessment of students in the fourth, seventh, and tenth  
24 grades and shall continue to develop advanced skills tests for use in the  
25 fourth, seventh, and tenth grades in the areas of language arts and  
26 mathematics. The advanced skills reading test shall be administered annually

1 in all school districts, and the advanced skills mathematics tests shall be  
2 administered in all school districts during the 1990-91 school year and  
3 annually thereafter.

4 (2) The funds appropriated in section 101 for science testing are for  
5 contractual funds to support the annual statewide testing of each student in  
6 the fifth, eighth, and eleventh grades.

7 Sec. 403. (1) From the funds appropriated in section 101 for operations  
8 in the office of technical assistance and evaluation, \$860,000.00 is reserved  
9 for contracts to carry out Michigan education assessment program testing, to  
10 develop new tests for future use in the Michigan education assessment program,  
11 and to develop materials to assist local school districts in using and  
12 reporting Michigan education assessment program test results.

13 (2) The department shall report on its activities concerning Michigan  
14 education assessment program testing, new test development, and the development  
15 of materials to assist local school districts in using and reporting test  
16 results for the preceding fiscal year by November 1, 1990 to the department of  
17 management and budget and to the house and senate appropriation subcommittees  
18 responsible for the department's budget. Said report shall contain a  
19 description of activities, a detailed accounting of expenditures for the  
20 previous fiscal year, and an anticipated budget and work plan for the 1990-91  
21 fiscal year.

22 Sec. 404. (1) The funds appropriated in section 101 for the Michigan  
23 Shiga sister state and international program shall be used to support the  
24 teacher exchange and other sister state programs, and to plan and implement a  
25 program of international education and understanding in elementary, secondary,  
26 and higher education. Funds for this program shall not be expended directly or

1 indirectly for travel or other expenses incurred by spouses of employees of the  
2 department or by spouses of members of the state board of education.

3 (2) The department shall report on its activities concerning the  
4 Michigan-Shiga sister state and international programs for the preceding fiscal  
5 year by November 1, 1990 to the department of management and budget and the  
6 house and senate appropriation subcommittees responsible for the department's  
7 budget. Said report shall contain a description of activities, a detailed  
8 accounting of expenditures for the previous fiscal year, and an anticipated  
9 budget and work plan for the 1990-91 fiscal year.

10 Sec. 405. (1) From the funds appropriated in section 101 for the  
11 employability skills test, \$225,000.00 shall be allocated to the Michigan human  
12 investment fund office in the department of management and budget for  
13 developing the adult component of the employability skills test.

14 (2) The department shall report on its activities concerning the  
15 development and implementation of the employability skills test for the  
16 preceding fiscal year by November 1, 1990 to the department of management and  
17 budget and the house and senate appropriation subcommittees responsible for the  
18 department's budget. Said report shall contain a description of activities, a  
19 detailed accounting of expenditures for the previous fiscal year, and an  
20 anticipated budget and work plan for the 1990-91 fiscal year.

#### 21 SCHOOL PROGRAM SERVICES

22 Sec. 501. From the funds appropriated in section 101 for school program  
23 services, 2 full-time equated classified professionals shall work full-time in  
24 1990-91 in the instructional specialists program's gifted and talented unit.

25 Sec. 502. The funds appropriated in section 101 for the social studies  
26 textbook study shall be expended to support a study of ethnic, racial, or

1 religious bias in the United States and in other countries, as it is found in  
2 school social studies textbooks most commonly used in this state.

3       Sec. 503. The funds appropriated in section 101 for the early childhood  
4 development program study shall be expended through a competitive process to a  
5 research organization or consortium that best meets the criteria established by  
6 the state board of education's evaluation panel for state-funded preschool  
7 programs.

8       Sec. 504. (1) The funds appropriated in section 101 for communities in  
9 schools shall be allocated for the purpose of establishing pilot projects in 7  
10 schools to address the multiple needs of at-risk youth and their families. A  
11 policy council consisting of the directors of the departments of education,  
12 mental health, public health, social services and labor shall determine the  
13 location of the 7 pilot projects and funding for each site. Funds shall be  
14 used to cover salaries, travel and other expenses related to the training of  
15 project directors at each pilot site. Project directors will coordinate  
16 existing multi-disciplinary staff from human service agencies and volunteer  
17 organizations to more effectively provide necessary educational and social  
18 services for at-risk students and their families at the school sites. The  
19 project directors will work to establish a local board of directors for each  
20 site, chaired by a representative from the business sector, which will assess  
21 the community's needs, leverage existing resources, and raise additional  
22 private sector funds to support the communities in schools team.

23       (2) The department shall report on its activities concerning communities  
24 in schools during 1990-91 by November 1, 1991 to the department of management  
25 and budget and the house and senate appropriation subcommittees responsible for  
26 the department's budget. Said report shall contain a description of activities

1 performed during 1990-91, a detailed accounting of expenditures, and an  
2 anticipated budget and work plan for 1991-92.

3 Section 505. (1) Funds appropriated in section 101 for technology  
4 curriculum shall be allocated for expenses related to the release of  
5 seventh-grade teachers for training in the new curriculum or the retrofitting  
6 of laboratories. Funds shall be used to promote seventh-grade student  
7 laboratory research which will result in the use of such problem-solving skills  
8 as reasoning, creative and critical thinking, and the design of test devices  
9 and decision-making systems.

10 (2) The department shall report on its activities concerning technology  
11 curriculum during 1990-91 by November 1, 1991 to the department of management  
12 and budget and the house and senate appropriation subcommittees responsible for  
13 the department's budget. Said report shall contain a description of activities  
14 performed during 1990-91, a detailed accounting of expenditures, and an  
15 anticipated budget and work plan for 1991-92.

16 Section 506. The department shall report its activities concerning the  
17 model health curriculum for the preceding fiscal year by November 1, 1990 to  
18 the department of management and budget and the house and senate appropriation  
19 subcommittees responsible for the department's budget. Said report shall  
20 contain a description of the activities involved in expanding the health  
21 curriculum to the ninth to twelfth grades, as well as other activities involved  
22 in maintaining and expanding the model health curriculum, a detailed accounting  
23 of expenditures for the previous fiscal year, and an anticipated budget and  
24 work plan for the 1990-91 fiscal year.

25 MSB/MSD/STIRC/REHABILITATION PROGRAMS

26 Sec. 601. The employees at the Michigan school for the blind, the

1 Michigan school for the deaf, and the state technical institute and  
2 rehabilitation center who work on a school year basis shall be considered  
3 annual employees for purposes of service credits, retirement, and insurance  
4 benefits.

5 Sec. 602. For each student enrolled at the Michigan school for the blind  
6 and the Michigan school for the deaf, the department shall assess the  
7 intermediate school district of residence 100% of the cost of operating the  
8 student's instructional program. The amount shall exclude room and board  
9 related costs and the cost of weekend transportation between the school and  
10 each student's home. If the fees collected under this section are not  
11 sufficient to provide the \$5,752,200.00 appropriated in section 101 for the  
12 Michigan school for the blind and the Michigan school for the deaf, the  
13 shortage shall be made up from the general fund.

14 Sec. 603. From the funds appropriated in section 101 for salaries, wages,  
15 and fringe benefits for employees of the school for the blind, not more than 1%  
16 may be expended to cover the costs of salaries, wages, and fringe benefits for  
17 time necessary to prepare for the opening and closing of camp Tuhsmebeta for  
18 summer activities.

19 Sec. 604. A local community mental health board representative shall  
20 participate in the individualized educational planning committee for each  
21 severely mentally impaired or emotionally impaired student within its  
22 jurisdiction who is considered for placement at the Michigan school for the  
23 blind or the Michigan school for the deaf.

24 Sec. 605. The department may assess rent to the department of corrections  
25 for Michigan school for the blind space occupied by the corrections staff  
26 training academy. The rental rates and all leasing arrangements shall be

1 subject to the approval of the department of management and budget. Amounts  
2 received under section 101 for the corrections academy lease program may be  
3 expended by the department for operation, maintenance, and renovation expenses  
4 associated with the lease space. If there are any unexpended and unencumbered  
5 funds remaining on September 30, 1991 from the amounts appropriated in section  
6 101 for the corrections academy lease program, an amount not to exceed  
7 \$20,000.00 shall be available for expenditure for the 1991-92 fiscal year for  
8 equipment, maintenance, and renovation at other Michigan school for the blind  
9 facilities. The balance of the unexpended and unencumbered funds shall revert  
10 to the general fund.

11       Sec. 606. The state technical institute and rehabilitation center may  
12 receive equipment and in-kind contributions for the direct support of staff  
13 services through the Pine Lake fund, the Delton-Kellogg school district or  
14 other local or intermediate school district, or any combination of local or  
15 intermediate school districts in addition to those authorized in section 101.  
16 For fiscal year 1990-91, the state technical institute and rehabilitation  
17 center is authorized 3.5 full-time equated positions for projects with industry  
18 and 2 full-time equated positions for the SAGA grant program. The staff  
19 involved in these programs shall provide increased vocational training and  
20 placement opportunities for severely handicapped adults. The state technical  
21 institute and rehabilitation center shall prescribe the form and content of  
22 each of its training and placement programs. Privately generated opportunities  
23 to enhance the state technical institute and rehabilitation center's vocational  
24 training and placement efforts shall be consistent with the center's  
25 programmatic mission.

26       Sec. 607. The Michigan rehabilitation service shall make every effort to



1 ensure that all sources of matching funds in this state are used to obtain  
2 federal vocational rehabilitation funds. All sources include, but are not  
3 limited to, privately-raised funds to support public nonprofit rehabilitation  
4 centers as permitted by the rehabilitation act of 1973, Public Law 93-112, 29  
5 U.S.C. 701 to 717, 720 to 724, 730 to 732, 740 to 741, 750, 752, 760 to 762,  
6 770 to 777b, 777d to 777f, 780 to 785, and 790 to 796.

7       Sec. 608. (1) Funds received under section 101 for the state employees  
8 child care center may be expended by the department for operations,  
9 maintenance, and other expenses associated with the operation of the state  
10 employees child care center.

11       (2) The department may assess EC3, Inc. for janitor service, utilities,  
12 food, and other services provided for operation of the state employees child  
13 care center.

14       Sec. 609. In addition to the appropriations in section 101, federal  
15 DED-OSERS funds received after August 31, 1991 through redistribution by the  
16 federal government for vocational rehabilitation programs are appropriated and  
17 may be expended for expenses incurred in the operation of these programs.  
18 Funds needed to meet federal match requirements for funds received through  
19 federal redistribution may be obtained through the legislative transfer of  
20 existing appropriations.

#### 21 HIGHER EDUCATION MANAGEMENT SERVICES

22       Sec. 701. (1) The department shall maintain the Michigan postsecondary  
23 education data base as a service for the state's postsecondary education  
24 policymakers and administrators. The department may collect data from the  
25 state's public 2-year and 4-year postsecondary educational institutions. The  
26 data base shall be open and accessible to any interested party at as minimal a

1 fee as possible. The department may use contractual services or grants to  
2 state universities or community or junior colleges to develop and implement the  
3 higher education data base.

4 (2) A policy council shall develop policies and procedures governing the  
5 operation and use of the state postsecondary education data base. The council  
6 shall consist of the following members or their designated representatives:

7 (a) The chairpersons of the senate and house appropriations subcommittees  
8 responsible for the higher education budget.

9 (b) The superintendent of public instruction.

10 (c) The director of the department of management and budget.

11 (d) The director of the department of labor.

12 (e) The director of the house fiscal agency.

13 (f) The director of the senate fiscal agency.

14 (g) A representative of the state's public colleges and universities.

15 (h) A representative of the state's public community and junior colleges.

16 (i) A representative of the state's independent colleges and universities.

17 (3) The policy council described in subsection (2) may add other members  
18 that it considers necessary as ex officio members.

#### 19 TEACHER PREPARATION AND CERTIFICATION SERVICES

20 Sec. 801. From the funds appropriated in section 101 for teacher  
21 preparation and certification services, the department shall expend the funds  
22 to provide 1 full-time equated classified position to handle the professional  
23 personnel register and certificate revocation/felony conviction files.

24 Sec. 802. (1) Not later than November 30, 1990, the department shall  
25 submit to the senate and house appropriations subcommittees responsible for the  
26 department's budget and the department of management and budget a report on the

1 status of activities to meet the requirements of section 1531 of the school  
2 code of 1976, Act No. 451 of the Public Acts of 1976, being section 380.1531 of  
3 the Michigan Compiled Laws, relating to teacher test development, validation,  
4 and implementation.

5 (2) The department may carry forward as a work project into the fiscal  
6 year ending September 30, 1991 any unexpended balance appropriated in Act No.  
7 171 of the Public Acts of 1989 for teacher competency test valuation. The  
8 department may expend the amount carried forward pursuant to this section to  
9 develop a method of validating teacher competency.

#### 10 GRANTS AND DISTRIBUTIONS

11 Sec. 1101. The funds appropriated in section 101 for the school breakfast  
12 program required by section 1272a of the school code of 1976, Act No. 451 of  
13 the Public Acts of 1976, being section 380.1272a of the Michigan Compiled Laws,  
14 shall be paid to school districts for reasonable and necessary costs that  
15 exceed available federal reimbursement. Reasonable and necessary costs include  
16 costs for either of the following:

17 (a) A breakfast, as provided for in section 1272a of Act No. 451 of the  
18 Public Acts of 1976, that is eligible for state cash reimbursement and that  
19 meets the nutritional standards prescribed by the United States department of  
20 agriculture pursuant to section 4 of the child nutrition act of 1966, Public  
21 Law 89-642, 42 U.S.C. 1773.

22 (b) Other costs necessary for the implementation of a breakfast program,  
23 which costs may cover not more than 1/2 hour of custodial service, and 1 aide  
24 for every 200 nonparticipating, supervised children, and which costs shall not  
25 cover more than 2 aides per building, nor more than 1 hour per day per aide.

26 Sec. 1102. The funds appropriated in section 101 for M-Star shall be

1 expended for the acquisition of use rights and licensing for instructional  
2 television for statewide use and to increase the capability of teachers to use  
3 the instructional television programs in the educational process. Not later  
4 than January 1, 1991, the department shall report to the senate and house  
5 appropriations subcommittees responsible for the department's budget and to the  
6 department of management and budget on the activities, expenditures, and impact  
7 of the M-Star telecommunications project during 1989-90.

8       Sec. 1103. (1) The funds appropriated under grants and distributions in  
9 section 101 for school safety shall be allocated by the department to those  
10 local school districts that conduct a "safe school program" approved by the  
11 department.

12       (2) A safe school program may include, but is not limited to, the purchase  
13 of school security equipment or entering into contracts, singularly or in  
14 combination, with cities, villages, townships, or counties, for the provision  
15 of security services or for the establishment of a program to hire community  
16 members to serve as classroom monitors in school buildings. Contractual  
17 security services may include, but are not limited to, special patrols,  
18 surveillance, or liaison services to be provided by police departments or  
19 sheriffs' departments in schools, on school property, or both.

20       (3) The grants shall be awarded to an applicant local school district  
21 based on both of the following:

22       (a) The number of student expulsions and suspensions due to violent acts  
23 against people and property in the specific school building or buildings that  
24 would operate the program.

25       (b) The department of state police uniform crime report index compiled  
26 pursuant to Act No. 319 of the Public Acts of 1968, being sections 28.251 to  
04933'90

1 28.258 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

2 (4) All approved schools shall establish a school building advisory  
3 council to monitor the program. The council shall be composed of parents,  
4 students, security personnel, teachers, administrators, and local law  
5 enforcement officials.

6 (5) From the funds appropriated in section 101 for school safety grants,  
7 an amount equal to the school safety funding provided to the Detroit city  
8 school district under Act No. 302 of the Public Acts of 1988, plus an  
9 additional \$250,000.00 shall be allocated to the Detroit city school district  
10 for community-based classroom monitor pilot programs.

11 (6) From the funds appropriated in section 101 for school safety grants,  
12 \$48,700.00 shall be allocated to the Newaygo county intermediate school  
13 district in collaboration with the county prosecuting attorney for the  
14 promotion of a comprehensive law enforcement education pilot program with local  
15 school districts.

16 Sec. 1104. (1) The funds appropriated in section 101 to the department  
17 for the development of community college educational telecommunications shall  
18 be allocated for the development and improvement of cooperative  
19 telecommunications systems. The department shall not expend more than  
20 \$29,200.00 of the funds appropriated in section 101 for monitoring the  
21 development and improvement of cooperative telecommunications systems.

22 (2) The department shall report on its activities concerning the  
23 development of community college educational telecommunications for the  
24 preceding fiscal year by November 1, 1990 to the department of management and  
25 budget and to the house and senate appropriation subcommittees responsible for  
26 the department's budget. Said report shall contain a description of

1 activities, a detailed accounting of expenditures for the previous fiscal year,  
2 and an anticipated budget and work plan for the 1990-91 fiscal year.

3       Sec. 1105. (1) The funds appropriated in section 101 for cable television  
4 shall be allocated to intermediate school districts for the purpose of  
5 implementing a model 2-way interactive, interconnected video system linking  
6 local school districts by cable television for academic programming and the  
7 interactive delivery of instruction. To be eligible for funds under this  
8 section, an intermediate school district shall submit to the superintendent of  
9 public instruction for approval a plan and a timetable for implementing the  
10 2-way interactive, interconnected video system. The intermediate school  
11 district shall provide a plan to link all constituent school districts and  
12 demonstrate that at least a portion of the system can be made operational with  
13 the funds allocated by this section.

14       (2) From the funds appropriated in section 101 for cable television,  
15 \$63,400.00 is allocated to the Eaton county intermediate school district and  
16 \$63,400.00 is allocated to the Cheboygan-Otsego-Presque Isle intermediate  
17 school district for facilities and equipment to implement a model 2-way  
18 interactive, interconnected video system.

19       (3) The department shall carry forward as a work project into the fiscal  
20 year ending September 30, 1991 any unexpended balance appropriated in Act No.  
21 171 of the Public Acts of 1989 for cable television. The funds carried forward  
22 pursuant to this subsection shall be allocated as directed pursuant to section  
23 1105 of Act No. 171 of the Public Acts of 1989.

24       Sec. 1106. The funds appropriated in section 101 for anti-drug abuse  
25 grants shall be used in coordination with appropriations provided under section  
26 45 of the state school aid act of 1979, Act No. 94 of the Public Acts of 1979,

1 being section 388.1645 of the Michigan Compiled Laws. The funds shall be  
2 expended to provide for technical assistance and to provide grants to, or  
3 contracts with, local school districts and intermediate school districts for  
4 the provision of a school drug education and prevention program consistent with  
5 the program described in the application approved by the United States  
6 department of education for funding under the drug-free schools and communities  
7 act of 1986, part 2 of subtitle B of title IV of Public Law 99-570.

8       Sec. 1107. (1) The funds appropriated in section 101 for computer literacy  
9 and educational technology grants shall be expended to teach and strengthen the  
10 computer skills of students and teachers and to integrate technology into  
11 instructional programs. The funds shall be expended to award grants to local  
12 and intermediate school districts to promote student access to computer  
13 applications, to increase the statewide availability of courses in computer  
14 literacy, to support the use of computers and other technologies by teachers in  
15 the educational process, and to establish demonstration sites in schools with  
16 effective programs.

17       (2) From the funds appropriated in section 101 for computer literacy and  
18 educational technology grants, \$195,000.00 shall be allocated to upper Great  
19 Lakes educational technologies, inc., a nonprofit corporation, and \$390,000.00  
20 to Lake Superior state university for the collaborative development of an upper  
21 peninsula-wide and northern lower peninsula telecommunications plan.  
22 Objectives for the telecommunications plan shall include, but not be limited  
23 to, providing 2-way interactive video, audio, and data delivery for K to 12,  
24 postsecondary, continuing education, governmental, health, public service, and  
25 Indian community use. The funds allocated to Lake Superior state university  
26 shall be equally matched by federal funding sources and shall not be expended

1 unless federal matching funds become available.

2 (3) From the funds appropriated in section 101 for computer literacy and  
3 educational technology grants, \$285,700.00 shall be allocated to the greater  
4 Saginaw Valley regional educational cooperative to do all of the following:

5 (a) Collectively study, plan, and implement a 2-way interactive,  
6 interconnected telecommunications network for the transmission of instructional  
7 classes and programs, consultant services, data, teleconferencing, and various  
8 other forms of educational information to and from the service areas of the  
9 participating organizations for ready accessibility to area educators and their  
10 students.

11 (b) Involve business and industry in cooperative educational support by  
12 making the expertise of their personnel available through the use of the  
13 network described in subdivision (a).

14 (c) Interconnect the network described in subdivision (a) with other  
15 established telecommunications systems through a statewide telecommunications  
16 network for the reception and delivery of statewide, national, and  
17 international educational programming and related services.

18 (d) Support the science education initiatives planned for the Saginaw  
19 Valley state university science center.

20 (e) Support arts activities planned through the regional arts resource  
21 cooperative.

22 (f) Provide professional development opportunities for teachers and  
23 administrators through the regional professional development center.

24 Sec. 1108. (1) From the funds appropriated in section 101 for the  
25 literacy project grant, \$15,500.00 shall be allocated to the library  
26 cooperative of Macomb to strengthen coordination between the Macomb literacy



1 project and local business and industry. In addition, \$34,100.00 shall be  
2 allocated to the capital area literacy coalition to promote family and  
3 workplace literacy and to create a collaborative literacy model for community  
4 agencies, business, and higher education.

5 (2) The department shall report on activities concerning literacy project  
6 grants for the preceding fiscal year by November 1, 1990 to the department of  
7 management and budget and to the house and senate appropriations subcommittees  
8 responsible for the department's budget. Said report shall contain a  
9 description of activities, a detailed accounting of expenditures for the  
10 previous fiscal year, and an anticipated budget and work plan for the 1990-91  
11 fiscal year.

12 Sec. 1109. (1) The funds appropriated in section 101 for early childhood  
13 development programs shall be made available through a competitive application  
14 process as follows:

15 (a) An applicant may be any public or private nonprofit legal entity or  
16 agency other than a local or intermediate school district except a local or  
17 intermediate school district acting as a fiscal agent for a child caring  
18 organization regulated under Act No. 116 of the Public Acts of 1973, being  
19 sections 722.111 to 722.128 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

20 (b) Applications shall be submitted in a form and manner as required by  
21 the department.

22 (c) Applications shall be reviewed by a diverse interagency committee  
23 composed of representatives of the department, appropriate community,  
24 volunteer, social service agencies and organizations, and parents.

25 (d) Priority in the recommendation for awarding of grants by the state  
26 board of education to applicants shall be based upon the following criteria:

1 (i) Compliance with standards for early childhood development consistent  
2 with programs for 4-year olds, as approved by the interagency committee and the  
3 state board of education.

4 (ii) Active and continuous involvement of the parents or guardians of the  
5 children participating in the program.

6 (iii) Employment of teachers possessing proper training in early childhood  
7 development, including an early childhood (ZA) endorsement and/or child  
8 development associate, and trained support staff.

9 (iv) Collaboration with the community of providers of early childhood  
10 development programs.

11 (v) The extent to which these funds will supplement other federal state,  
12 local, or private funds.

13 (vi) The extent to which these funds will be targeted to children who will  
14 be at least 4, but less than 5, years of age as of December 1 of the year in  
15 which the programs are offered and who show evidence of being "at-risk" as  
16 defined in the state board of education report entitled, "children at risk"  
17 that was adopted by the state board on April 5, 1988.

18 (e) Whether the application contains a comprehensive evaluation plan which  
19 includes implementation of all program components required, and an assessment  
20 of the gains of children participating in an early childhood development  
21 program.

22 (f) Whether the application provides for the establishment of a community  
23 advisory committee that shall be involved in the planning and evaluation of the  
24 program and provides for collaboration with, and the involvement of, parents  
25 and appropriate community, volunteer, and social service agencies and  
26 organizations.

1 (2) Grant awards by the state board of education may be at whatever level  
2 the board determines appropriate. A grant, when combined with other sources of  
3 state revenue for this program, shall not exceed \$2,250.00 per child or the  
4 cost of the program.

5 (3) An applicant that received a grant under this section in previous  
6 fiscal years shall receive priority for funding in the 1990-91 fiscal year.  
7 However, continuation of funding is contingent on the availability of funds and  
8 documented evidence of grantee compliance with all operational, fiscal,  
9 administrative, and other program requirements.

10 Sec. 1110. (1) From the funds appropriated in section 101 for educational  
11 innovation grants, \$97,500.00 shall be allocated to the Michigan dyslexia  
12 institute for all of the following purposes:

13 (a) Training general education and special education teachers in  
14 approaches and techniques that will increase their effectiveness in teaching  
15 reading, writing, and spelling to dyslexic students.

16 (b) Preparing teachers of dyslexic students to train other teachers within  
17 their respective districts to teach dyslexic students.

18 (c) Helping districts to plan and implement their own training programs  
19 for teachers of dyslexic students using participants from programs funded under  
20 this section as trainers.

21 (d) Preparing and providing instructional materials to be used by  
22 districts in their training programs for teachers of dyslexic students.

23 (e) Developing and making available to all local school districts  
24 strategic planning guidelines that may be used to establish training programs  
25 for teachers of dyslexic students.

26 (2) Not later than December 1, 1990, the Michigan dyslexia institute shall

1 submit to the senate and house appropriations subcommittees responsible for the  
2 department's budget and the department of management and budget a report on  
3 expenditures, activities, and accomplishments of the Michigan dyslexia  
4 institute in 1989-90 and a work plan and budget for 1990-91.

5 (3) From the funds appropriated in section 101 for educational innovation  
6 grants, \$24,400.00 shall be allocated for a program of study of far eastern art  
7 at eastern Michigan university.

8 (4) From the funds appropriated in section 101 for educational innovation  
9 grants, \$48,700.00 shall be allocated to the school district of the city of  
10 Saginaw for its project PRIDE program for Hispanic student basic skills  
11 improvement.

12 (5) From the funds appropriated in section 101 for educational innovation  
13 grants, \$243,700.00 shall be allocated to the Michigan institute for  
14 educational management for educational administrator training to improve the  
15 leadership skills of current and prospective educational administrators.

16 (6) From the funds appropriated in section 101 for educational innovation  
17 grants, \$487,500.00 shall be allocated to Michigan state university through the  
18 bureau of education services to continue the educational extension service for  
19 the purposes of applying and disseminating the latest research on teaching,  
20 learning, organization, and management to the state's public schools. During  
21 1990-91, Michigan state university and its partner institutions in the  
22 educational extension service shall also raise or contribute matching funds  
23 totaling at least 1/2 of the amount allocated in this subsection for the  
24 educational extension service. Of the funds allocated under this subsection,  
25 approximately 2/3 shall be expended for research application to translate  
26 research into practice and to evaluate the results. The balance of the funds

1 shall be expended for the purpose of disseminating practical, tested knowledge  
2 to schools in this state. In the research application area, the university  
3 shall establish relationships with 4 to 6 schools, collaborate with the schools  
4 to identify priority areas for both instructional and, if necessary,  
5 organizational improvement, establish collaborative university-school working  
6 groups to address these priorities, formulate plans to make research-based  
7 improvements in the priority areas, and initiate implementation of these plans.

8 (7) The funds allocated under subsection (6) for research application may  
9 be expended for purposes, including, but not limited to, all of the following:

10 (a) Released time for teachers and administrators to collaborate with  
11 university faculty.

12 (b) Compensation for teachers and administrators for summer activities  
13 such as course planning, materials development, professional development, and  
14 for activities beyond the normal school day or week.

15 (c) Compensation for university faculty for summer activities.

16 (d) Compensation for support staff necessary to facilitate the  
17 participation of teachers, administrators, and university faculty.

18 (e) Research reports, books, and other materials related to curriculum,  
19 instruction, organization, and management.

20 (f) Meeting expenses.

21 (g) In-state travel and other items essential to the goals of the  
22 extension service.

23 (8) For purposes of subsection (6), Michigan state university shall  
24 establish a dissemination advisory committee. This committee shall be  
25 comprised of representatives from appropriate professional associations, local  
26 and intermediate school districts, and institutions of higher education. The

1 committee shall identify priority areas for research dissemination, form  
2 consortia of organizations to plan dissemination activities in the priority  
3 areas, and implement the plans.

4 (9) Not later than March 1, 1991, Michigan state university shall submit  
5 to the senate and house appropriations subcommittees responsible for the  
6 department's budget, the department, and the governor's cabinet council on  
7 human investment a report on expenditures, activities, and accomplishments of  
8 the educational extension service, and a work plan and budget for 1991-92.  
9 Included in this report shall be an evaluation plan for 1990-91 and 1991-92  
10 expenditures and activities related to the educational extension service and a  
11 description of planned activities to integrate the research application and  
12 dissemination areas.

13 Sec. 1111. The funds appropriated in section 101 for the personal care  
14 attendants' program shall be expended for a program supporting personal care  
15 attendants to enable handicappers to pursue gainful employment.

16 Sec. 1112. (1) In selecting school districts for school dropout prevention  
17 programs, the purpose of which is to encourage students identified as potential  
18 dropouts to remain in school and graduate through services such as counseling,  
19 basic skills remediation, tutorial assistance, and career exploration and  
20 development, the department shall ensure that the school dropout prevention  
21 programs are designed for students who meet the following criteria:

22 (a) The pupils are 12 through 18 years of age.

23 (b) The pupils are members of households that receive general assistance  
24 or aid to families with dependent children administered under the social  
25 welfare act, Act No. 280 of the Public Acts of 1939, being sections 400.1 to  
26 400.121 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, or that meet food stamp income

1 eligibility requirements of the food stamp act of 1977, U.S.C. 2011 to 2026.  
2 Pupils who are not members of households that receive general assistance or aid  
3 to families with dependent children may also participate if a school can  
4 document that the pupil is at risk of dropping out of school.

5 (2) Students participating in a school dropout prevention program may  
6 enter paid work experience programs implemented during the second quarter of  
7 the program year based upon their first quarter attendance and academic  
8 record. Participant pupils who maintain not less than an 80% school attendance  
9 record while participating in this program shall be eligible under this program  
10 for part-time employment during the school year. Money earned by a student  
11 pursuant to this section shall be disregarded as income for purposes of  
12 determining eligibility and benefit levels for aid or assistance administered  
13 under the social welfare act, Act No. 280 of the Public Acts of 1939, being  
14 sections 400.1 to 400.121 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

15 (3) To the extent possible, school districts that receive state funds for  
16 a school dropout prevention program shall work with nonprofit organizations,  
17 private industry, and governmental units to provide employment and job training  
18 to eligible pupils. At their discretion, school districts may involve  
19 intermediate school districts in the coordination and implementation of the  
20 employment and job training programs.

21 (4) Local school districts may file applications for grants with the  
22 department. The department shall prescribe the form and content of each  
23 application based on the major components of the operation graduation pilot  
24 program funded by the legislature.

25 (5) Districts who receive funding under this section shall prepare an  
26 annual evaluation report which includes number of students served, academic

1 performance, work experience including employability skills, and school  
2 retention rates in a form as prescribed by the department of education.

3       Sec. 1113. (1) The department shall develop bid specifications for  
4 bidding through the department of management and budget for the warehousing and  
5 distribution of the United States department of agriculture surplus commodities.

6       (2) The department shall collaborate with the department of management and  
7 budget to develop contractual service regions along lines similar to those  
8 utilized by the department of management and budget while taking into account  
9 local school district boundaries. The contractual service regions shall  
10 provide for the most efficient and economical means of distribution of the  
11 United States department of agriculture surplus commodities.

12       Sec. 1114. (1) The funds appropriated in section 101 for mathematics and  
13 science challenge grants are allocated for the planning, start-up and  
14 development, continuing support of, and outreach programs for, mathematics and  
15 science centers.

16       (2) The mathematics and science centers, within a designated service area,  
17 shall provide accelerated instruction in mathematics, science, and computer  
18 science for qualified students and serve as a resource and support center for  
19 teacher training, curriculum development, enrichment programs, and other  
20 activities and programs related to the overall improvement of mathematics and  
21 science education.

22       (3) A grant awarded under this section for planning shall be expended for  
23 developing community support for, and for planning, a mathematics and science  
24 center. A grant awarded under this section for start-up and development shall  
25 be expended for building renovation, the purchase of mathematics and  
26 science-related equipment, and curriculum development. A continuing support



1 grant awarded under this section shall be expended for operational costs of  
2 existing mathematics and science centers. A grant awarded under this section  
3 for outreach shall be expended to extend the impact of a mathematics and  
4 science center to other area students and educators.

5 (4) A school district, intermediate school district, or science or  
6 technological museum may apply for a grant described in subsection (3) using an  
7 application developed by the department.

8 (5) Each grant application shall include, but not be limited to, all of  
9 the following:

10 (a) A statement of the purpose and goals of the applicant and the  
11 projected impact on improving the mathematics and science curriculum for  
12 students in the area.

13 (b) An assurance that any plan for student selection will provide fair  
14 access to the mathematics and science center for all students from  
15 participating schools.

16 (c) A clearly defined plan for funding the proposal, including a list of  
17 all anticipated local or private funds.

18 (d) Except as provided in this section, evidence that the state grant will  
19 be matched on at least a 3 to 1 ratio by the applicant. The department may  
20 waive this match requirement for an applicant with unusual circumstances that  
21 is making a good faith effort to comply.

22 (e) Evidence of the establishment of a local advisory committee composed  
23 of teachers, administrators, parents, and representatives of higher education,  
24 business, industry, and technological or science museums, private foundations,  
25 and other organizations involved in mathematics and science education.

26 (6) The superintendent of public instruction shall establish an advisory

1 committee comprised of not less than 11 members to review all grant  
2 applications received pursuant to this section and to recommend grant  
3 recipients. The advisory committee shall include 3 teachers, 4 science-based  
4 professionals from business and industry; 1 parent and 2 science or mathematics  
5 specialists from higher education institutions or other organizations involved  
6 in mathematics and science education such as science museums or private  
7 foundations.

8 (7) After reviewing the grant applications received pursuant to this  
9 section and not later than December 1, 1990, the advisory committee shall  
10 submit a list of recommended grant recipients and amounts to the department.  
11 The maximum level of any single grant approved by the department for planning  
12 shall not exceed \$25,000.00. Grants for start-up and development shall not  
13 exceed \$200,000.00. Continuing support grants shall not exceed \$75,000.00 with  
14 not less than an equal match from public or private sources, or both. Grants  
15 for outreach programs shall not exceed \$100,000.00. The state board of  
16 education shall determine the final selection of grant recipients, and, upon  
17 recommendation of the superintendent of public instruction, may alter or  
18 substitute the recommendations of the advisory committee.

19 (8) The department may carry into the succeeding fiscal year any  
20 committed but unexpended funds appropriated in section 101 for mathematics and  
21 science challenge grants.

22 (9) From the funds appropriated in section 101 for mathematics and  
23 science challenge grants, \$136,500.00 shall be allocated to Sanilac county  
24 intermediate school district for the second year of a two-year mathematics and  
25 science challenge grant.

26 Sec. 1115. (1) The amount appropriated in section 101 for the institute

1 for adult learning and literacy shall be allocated to central Michigan  
2 university for a research institute and informational clearinghouse for adult  
3 training and education in both the public and private sectors. The institute  
4 for adult learning and literacy shall be administered by central Michigan  
5 university. In consultation with other institutions of higher education, the  
6 institute for adult learning and literacy shall determine the most effective  
7 ways to teach adults and develop curriculum materials for adults. The  
8 institute for adult learning and literacy shall provide its findings and  
9 recommendations relative to the methods of teaching adults and the curriculum  
10 materials developed to the adult training and education programs in this  
11 state. The amount allocated shall not be expended unless it is matched on a 2  
12 to 1 basis by any combination of federal or private sources.

13 (2) The department shall report on activities concerning the institute  
14 for adult learning and literacy for the preceding fiscal year by November 1,  
15 1990 to the department of management and budget and the house and senate  
16 appropriation subcommittees responsible for the department's budget. Said  
17 report shall contain a description of activities, a detailed accounting of  
18 expenditures for the previous fiscal year, and an anticipated budget and work  
19 plan for the 1990-91 fiscal year.

20 Sec. 1116. (1) From the funds appropriated in section 101 for regional  
21 organizational skills development, \$263,200.00 shall be allocated to the  
22 Saginaw regional organizational skills development network for the second year  
23 of a 2-year project to establish an informational exchange center for  
24 coordinated training, retraining, and educational services provided by area  
25 educational, industrial, and business organizations.

26 (2) The department shall report on activities concerning the regional

1 organizational skills development grant for the preceding fiscal year by  
2 November 1, 1990 to the department of management and budget and the house and  
3 senate appropriation subcommittees responsible for the department's budget.  
4 Said report shall contain a description of activities, a detailed accounting of  
5 expenditures for the previous fiscal year, and an anticipated budget and work  
6 plan for the 1990-91 fiscal year.

7       Sec. 1117. (1) The funds appropriated in section 101 for the Michigan  
8 geographic alliance shall be allocated for the second year of a 3-year program  
9 to strengthen geography education in public schools by providing geography  
10 workshops and in-service geography training programs involving public school  
11 geography teachers and representatives of higher education. Central Michigan  
12 university shall coordinate the activities of the Michigan geographic alliance  
13 in cooperation with northern Michigan university, Wayne state university, and  
14 western Michigan university. The funds allocated in this section shall not be  
15 expended and shall lapse unless private funding sources equally match these  
16 funds.

17       (2) The department shall report on activities concerning the Michigan  
18 geographic alliance grant for the preceding fiscal year by November 1, 1990 to  
19 the department of management and budget and the house and senate appropriation  
20 subcommittees responsible for the department's budget. Said report shall  
21 contain a description of activities, a detailed accounting of expenditures for  
22 the previous fiscal year, and an anticipated budget and work plan for the  
23 1990-91 fiscal year.

24       Sec. 1118. (1) From the funds appropriated in section 101 for local  
25 school district consolidation and annexation grants, the department may make  
26 allocations to local school districts undertaking reorganization studies.

1 Local school boards may file applications for planning grants with the  
2 department. The department shall prescribe the form and content of the  
3 applications and shall determine the amount of each planning grant.

4 Sec. 1119. (1) The amount appropriated in section 101 for science and  
5 math improvement services shall be allocated to a university to provide science  
6 and math education improvement services to intermediate school districts.

7 (2) The department shall report on activities concerning science and math  
8 improvement services for the preceding fiscal year by November 1, 1990 to the  
9 department of management and budget and the house and senate appropriation  
10 subcommittees responsible for the department's budget. Said report shall  
11 contain a description of activities, a detailed accounting of expenditures for  
12 the previous fiscal year, and an anticipated budget and work plan for the  
13 1990-91 fiscal year.

14 Sec. 1120 (1) Beginning in the 1990 school year from the amount  
15 appropriated in section 101, there is allocated an amount not to exceed  
16 \$750,000 to applicant districts to develop and implement a schools of choice  
17 program. A district that develops a schools of choice program shall ensure  
18 that each parent, legal guardian, or person in loco parentis of a child  
19 residing within the district has the opportunity, to the extent permitted by  
20 building capacity, special needs, talents, and learning abilities and styles of  
21 pupils; and other appropriate factors, to select from a variety of public  
22 schools with an appropriate grade level within the district, the school that  
23 his or her child will attend. The choices may include, but are not limited to,  
24 vocational-technical schools, magnet schools, and other specialty schools,  
25 including schools within schools. A school building may contain one or more  
26 choice programs. A single choice program may encompass more than one school

1 building.

2 (2) A district is eligible for funds under this section if, in a manner  
3 required by the department, the following conditions are met:

4 (A) The district establishes a schools of choice planning committee. The  
5 committee shall be composed of 1/3 parents and pupils, 1/3 teachers, and 1/3  
6 school board members and administrators including principals.

7 (B) The district schools of choice planning committee shall develop and  
8 submit to the state board for approval a district schools of choice program  
9 which includes but is not limited to, all of the following:

10 (i) A means to ensure that all school-aged children, parents, legal  
11 guardians, and persons in loco parentis of a school-aged child residing within  
12 the school district are provided with all of the following:

13 (a) information about the schools of choice plan and the philosophy and  
14 staffing of each school so that they may make informed decisions about which  
15 school the child will attend,

16 (b) existing information based on testing and analysis as to the learning  
17 style, special talents, and educational needs of the child.

18 (ii) A means to ensure that transportation to the school of choice is  
19 provided to a child if the child is from a low-income family, as determined by  
20 the department, or from a single parent or 2-career family that falls below an  
21 income level determined by the department and that cannot provide  
22 transportation for the child due to a job-related schedule.

23 (iii) A means to ensure that each child has an equal opportunity for  
24 enrollment in the school that his or her parent, legal guardian, or person in  
25 loco parentis chooses for him or her.

26 (iv) A means to ensure that successful school programs, as measured by

1 increased pupil enrollment or improved pupil performance, or both are provided  
2 with adequate resources to continue and expand, consistent with the school  
3 improvement plan and process.

4 (v) A means to ensure that the teachers and principals of a school  
5 building have the authority to make decisions regarding school programs for  
6 their building as long as the school programs are consistent with the  
7 locally-approved school improvement plan.

8 (vi) A means to ensure that the racial and ethnic balance of the district  
9 is maintained.

10 (vii) A provision that if the school board has joined an athletic  
11 association, the pupils and schools of the school district remain subject to  
12 the rules of that association.

13 (3) When a schools of choice planning and evaluation committee begins  
14 developing a proposed schools of choice program, each school within the  
15 district shall establish a schools of choice planning committee. The committee  
16 shall be composed of teachers and administrators from the school, plus parents  
17 and other residents of the school district. A building level planning  
18 committee may be the school building improvement committee. The schools of  
19 choice planning committee shall examine the school's educational goals and  
20 consider methods in which the schools could offer quality educational programs  
21 to improve the academic performance of pupils residing within the district.

22 (4) After the district schools of choice planning committee develops the  
23 schools of choice plan, the committee and the schools board shall hold 1 or  
24 more joint public hearings within the school district to explain the plan. The  
25 explanation of the schools of choice plan shall include, but is not limited to,  
26 all of the following:

1 (A) A list and description of each school that may be chosen.

2 (B) The method of pupil selection if the number of pupils wanting to  
3 enroll in a particular school is greater than the school can accommodate.

4 (C) The fiscal impact of the program, including transportation, on the  
5 school district.

6 (5) After receipt of public opinion concerning the schools of choice  
7 plan, the district schools of choice planning committee may revise the plan.  
8 Upon finalization of the schools of choice plan by the district schools of  
9 choice planning committee and approval by the school board, the plan shall be  
10 submitted to the state board of education for approval.

11 (6) The department shall do all of the following:

12 (A) Provide criteria to districts for use in determining how pupils from  
13 families needing transportation assistance will be transported.

14 (B) Provide training, technical assistance, and administrative support,  
15 as necessary, to school districts implementing this section.

16 (C) Disseminate information to school districts, the public, and the  
17 legislature on the characteristics and success of the schools of choice plans  
18 implemented under this section.

19 (7) Funds allocated under this section for the fiscal year ending  
20 September 30, 1991 shall not lapse, but shall continue to be available for  
21 expenditure in the succeeding fiscal year.

22 Sec. 1121. The department shall provide a report for each of the  
23 following grant programs to the department of management and budget and the  
24 house and senate appropriation subcommittees responsible for the department's  
25 budget within 30 days after the grants are announced: school safety grants;  
26 cable television grants; anti-drug abuse grants; computer literacy and



1 educational technology grants; early childhood development programs grants;  
2 educational innovation grants, excluding the Michigan dyslexia institute and  
3 the educational extension service; school dropout prevention programs grants;  
4 mathematics and science challenge grants; and schools of choice grants. Each  
5 report shall include a description of the selection criteria used to award the  
6 competitive portions of the grant programs, the total number and dollar amount  
7 of all grants awarded, and the total number and dollar amount of all projects  
8 submitted for consideration. Each report shall also include the following  
9 information for every project which received an award: the entity receiving  
10 the award, the amount of the grant award, a brief description of the project,  
11 the duration of the project, and the number of students, teachers or other  
12 clientele served by the project.
