

HOUSE BILL No. 5482

EXECUTIVE BUDGET BILL

February 14, 1990, Introduced by Reps. Jacobetti and Harrison and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

A bill to make appropriations for the department of natural resources for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1991; to provide for the expenditure of those appropriations; to create funds and accounts; to require reports; to prescribe certain powers and duties of certain state departments and officers, institutions, and agencies; to authorize certain transfers by certain state agencies; and to provide for the disposition of fees and other income received by the various state agencies.
