

HOUSE BILL No. 5493

EXECUTIVE BUDGET BILL

February 14, 1990, Introduced by Reps. Jacobetti and Emerson and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

A bill to make appropriations for the department of public health and substance abuse programs for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1991; to provide for the expenditure of those appropriations; to provide for reports; and to provide for the disposition of fees and other income received by the department of public health.

 22 that state spending to local units of government will be less than the amount
 23 that was projected to be expended for any quarter, the principal executive
 24 officer shall immediately give notice of the approximate shortfall to the

 26 committees, and the senate and house fiscal agencies.

1 Sec. 202. The appropriations made and the expenditures authorized under
2 this act and the departments, agencies, commissions, boards, offices, and
3 programs for which an appropriation is made under this act are subject to the
4 management and budget act, Act No. 431 of the Public Acts of 1984, being
5 sections 18.1101 to 18.1594 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

6 Sec. 203. As used in this act:

7 (a) "AGR-FNS" means the United States department of agriculture, food,
8 nutrition service.

9 (b) "AIDS" means acquired immune deficiency syndrome.

10 (c) "CDC" means the centers for disease control.

11 (d) "CHASS" means community health and social services.

12 (e) "DED" means the United States department of education.

13 (f) "Department" means the department of public health.

14 (g) "DMB" means the department of management and budget.

15 (h) "DOD-ARMY" means the United States department of defense, army.

16 (i) "DOL-OSHA" means the United States department of labor, occupational
17 safety and health administration.

18 (j) "DOT" means the United States department of transportation.

19 (k) "DOT-NHTSA" means the United States department of transportation,
20 national highway traffic safety administration.

21 (l) "DSS" means department of social services.

22 (m) "EMS" means emergency medical services.

23 (n) "EPA" means the environmental protection agency.

24 (o) "EPA-OWWM" means the environmental protection agency, office of water
25 and waste management.

26 (p) "FTE" means full-time equated.

1 (q) "HHS" means the United States department of health and human services.

2 (r) "HHS-ADAMHA" means the United States department of health and human
3 services, alcohol, drug abuse, and mental health administration.

4 (s) "HHS-HCFA" means the United States department of health and human
5 services, health care financing administration.

6 (t) "HHS-HRSA" means the United States department of health and human
7 services, health resources and services administration.

8 (u) "HHS-PHS" means the United States department of health and human
9 services, public health service.

10 (v) "IDG" means interdepartment grant.

11 (w) "IDT" means intradepartment transfer.

12 (x) "IDT-ADP" means intradepartment transfer -- automated data processing.

13 (y) "MCH" means maternal and child health.

14 (z) "MHI" means Michigan health initiative.

15 (aa) "NRC" means the nuclear regulatory commission.

16 (bb) "OSAS" means the office of substance abuse services.

17 (cc) "SAPE" means substance abuse, prevention, and education.

18 (dd) "Title XVIII" means title XVIII of the social security act, chapter
19 531, 49 Stat. 620, 42 U.S.C. 1395 to 1395b, 1395b-2, 1395c to 1395i, 1395i-1a
20 to 1395i-3, 1395j to 1395dd, 1395ff to 1395mm, and 1395oo to 1395ccc.

21 (ee) "Title XIX" means title XIX of the social security act, chapter 531,
22 49 Stat. 620, 42 U.S.C. 1396 to 1396d, 1396f to 1396g, and 1396i to 1396s.

23 (ff) "VA-DMS" means the veterans administration, department of medicine
24 and surgery.

25 (gg) "WIC" means women, infants, and children.

26 Sec. 204. Basic health services for the fiscal year beginning October 1,

1 1990, for the purpose of part 23 of the public health code, Act No. 368 of the
2 Public Acts of 1978, being sections 333.2301 to 333.2321 of the Michigan
3 Compiled Laws, are those described by the department in its proposed program
4 statement dated October 16, 1981, and in the "prenatal postpartum care,
5 proposed basic health service program statement" included in the department
6 document entitled "A Study of Prenatal Care as a Basic Service," dated March 1,
7 1986, and for which the legislature has made funds available in amounts
8 necessary to ensure their availability and accessibility. The services
9 described in the statement are: immunizations, communicable disease control,
10 venereal disease control, tuberculosis control, prevention of gonorrhea eye
11 infection in newborns, screening newborns for phenylketonuria and
12 hypothyroidism, health/medical annex of emergency preparedness plan, licensing
13 and surveillance of agricultural labor camps, and prenatal care.

14 Sec. 205. By March 1, 1991, the department shall report to the members of
15 the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on public health, the senate
16 and house fiscal agencies, and to the department of management and budget on
17 the department's affirmative action program including recruitment, training,
18 and career ladder development. The report shall specify the number of new
19 hires, promotions, and reallocations by civil service classification and grade
20 and by race, sex, and handicapping condition.

21 Sec. 206. To promote more effective management of the department, the
22 director of public health may utilize not more than 20 positions from any
23 appropriation account for functions in other department units which the
24 director of public health considers to be more critical to the management of
25 departmental programs. The department shall report quarterly to the department
26 of management and budget, the senate and house appropriations committees, and

1 the senate and house fiscal agencies on the transfer of positions and costs
2 pursuant to this part.

3 Sec. 207. If the federal and restricted funds used as a source of funding
4 for programs in section 101 are not received in the amount appropriated, the
5 department shall submit a report to the members of the house and senate
6 appropriations subcommittees on public health, house and senate fiscal
7 agencies, and the department of management and budget on the amount received by
8 type of federal and restricted funding and the planned allocations among
9 individual programs in comparison to appropriated amounts and originally
10 planned allocations. The report shall be submitted prior to the implementation
11 of any revised allocations.

12 Sec. 208. The department shall provide a report on contractual services
13 to the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on public health and the
14 senate and house fiscal agencies each quarter. The report shall be based on
15 the monthly civil service statewide contracted services report required by
16 section 281 of the management and budget act, Act No. 431 of the Public Acts of
17 1984, being section 18.1281 of the Michigan Compiled Laws. The report shall
18 provide the name of the contractor, the dollar value of the contract,
19 description and location of the service to be provided, and justification for
20 the contract.

21 Sec. 209. The amounts appropriated in section 101 for utilities and that
22 portion of contractual services, supplies, and materials used to pay for
23 utility service to state facilities may be expended in a manner consistent with
24 section 253 of the management and budget act, Act No. 431 of the Public Acts of
25 1984, being section 18.1253 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

26 Sec. 210. If the department or the office of substance abuse services

1 signs an agreement with an agency outside the department or OSAS for a program
2 that receives an appropriation under section 101, the amount to be spent
3 pursuant to the agreement shall not exceed the total appropriation for that
4 program under section 101.

5 EXECUTIVE SERVICES

6 Sec. 301. Expenditures of federal or other restricted allotments from the
7 amounts appropriated in section 101 for federal and other restricted assistance
8 for health services shall not be made until after receipt of a recommendation
9 from the department of management and budget. The expenditure plan submitted
10 by the department of management and budget can be implemented by the department
11 15 days after its transmittal to the Legislature.

12 Sec. 302. Of the amount appropriated in section 101 from revenues from
13 fees and collections, not more than \$250,000.00 received from the sale of vital
14 records death data shall be used for improvements in the vital records and
15 health statistics program. The amount described in this section shall not
16 revert to the general fund at the end of the fiscal year ending September 30,
17 1991. Not later than December 1, 1991, the amount of any unexpended balances
18 and the proposed uses for those balances shall be reported to the department of
19 management and budget, the members of the senate and house subcommittees on
20 public health, and the senate and house fiscal agencies.

21 Sec. 303. The amount appropriated to the department in section 101 for
22 the post-polio education and referral project shall be used to provide for the
23 dissemination of information and educational materials to health care
24 professionals and polio survivors concerning the symptoms of the late effects
25 of polio and the resources available for evaluation, treatment, and
26 rehabilitation, the presentation of workshops and public information programs

1 to educate health professionals and the general public about the late effects
2 of polio, and other activities with health professionals and polio survivor
3 support groups to increase access to needed services for polio survivors.

4 COMMUNICABLE DISEASE CONTROL

5 Sec. 401. The department shall not pay for billings received for the care
6 and treatment of tuberculosis patients which are submitted more than 12 months
7 after the services are rendered.

8 Sec. 402. State funds appropriated in any other account in section 101
9 may be used to supplant not more than \$250,000.00 in federal funds projected
10 for immunization, if the federal funds are unavailable. The department shall
11 inform the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on public health,
12 senate and house fiscal agencies, and the department of management and budget
13 of the specific line items reduced pursuant to this section.

14 Sec. 403. On January 1, April 1, and July 1, 1991, the department shall
15 report to the members of the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on
16 public health, the senate and house fiscal agencies, and the department of
17 management and budget on the number of clinical laboratory tests pertaining to
18 AIDS actually performed by the department.

19 BIOLOGIC PRODUCTS

20 Sec. 501. The appropriations in section 101 for contracts for projects
21 and biologic products processing do not prohibit the department from charging
22 related activities to other appropriate operational accounts in the laboratory
23 services and biologic products appropriation units.

24 Sec. 502. Not later than December 1, 1991, the department shall report to
25 the department of management and budget, the members of the senate and house
26 appropriations subcommittees on public health, and the senate and house fiscal

1 agencies on the revenues received by and expended from the pharmaceutical
2 products fund created in section 9112 of the public health code, Act No. 368 of
3 the Public Acts of 1978, being section 333.9112 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

4 COMMUNITY ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH

5 Sec. 601. The department of public health shall submit a report by July
6 1, 1991 and annually thereafter to the senate and house appropriations
7 subcommittees on public health, the senate and house fiscal agencies, and the
8 department of management and budget. The report shall contain all of the
9 following information:

10 (a) The number of licensed food service establishments in the jurisdiction
11 of each local health department.

12 (b) The number of food service establishment inspections performed by each
13 local health department.

14 (c) A summary of the rating or results of each food service establishment
15 inspection performed by a local health department.

16 (d) State funding allocations for local health department food service
17 inspection activities and the sources of funding for these allocations.

18 (e) Expenditures from allocations reported under subdivision (d).

19 HEALTH CARE RESOURCES DEVELOPMENT AND REGULATION

20 Sec. 701. The amount appropriated in section 101 for the EMS program
21 shall include funding for regional contracts which shall include, at a minimum,
22 EMS ambulance inspection, EMS personnel licensure examinations, review of
23 training programs, and consultation.

24 Sec. 702. Spending authorization in the certificate of need (C.O.N.)
25 program is contingent upon actual fees being received for the amount
26 appropriated to the department in section 101.

1 Sec. 703. The \$500,000.00 appropriated in section 101 for medical waste
2 disposal regulation shall not be spent by the department until the necessary
3 fees are actually received by the department.

4 Sec. 704. The amount appropriated in section 101 for poison control
5 regional centers shall be allocated to Blodgett memorial hospital in Grand
6 Rapids and children's hospital in Detroit based on a formula that includes the
7 following provisions:

8 (a) Blodgett memorial hospital in Grand Rapids and children's hospital in
9 Detroit shall each be allocated \$75,000.00 for the support of the following
10 services:

11 (i) Twenty-four hours per day, 7 days per week, on-call staff.

12 (ii) A toll-free telephone line.

13 (iii) Maintenance of a toxic substance data base.

14 (b) The amount remaining after compliance with subdivision (a) shall be
15 allocated as follows:

16	(i) Blodgett memorial hospital in Grand Rapids	37.5%
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17	(ii) Children's hospital in Detroit	62.5%
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18 OCCUPATIONAL HEALTH

19 Sec. 801. The \$500,000 appropriated in section 101 for the asbestos
20 abatement program related to pending fee legislation shall not be spent by the
21 department until the necessary fees are enacted into law and actually received
22 by the department.

23 D. J. JACOBETTI VETERANS' FACILITY

24 Sec. 901. Notwithstanding Act No. 152 of the Public Acts of 1885, being
25 sections 36.1 to 36.12 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, the commandant of the D.
26 J. Jacobetti veterans' facility may give special consideration for admission to

1 handicapped veterans who have served in the armed forces of the United States
2 for less than 90 days and who have been honorably discharged.

3 CENTER FOR HEALTH PROMOTION

4 Sec. 1001. The appropriations in section 101 for the Michigan model for
5 comprehensive school health education shall be used for contracts and services
6 for implementation efforts, including a school health materials center. The
7 contracts and services for implementation efforts relating to the school health
8 materials center and special projects shall be with central Michigan
9 university. The contracts and services shall be reviewed by the state
10 interagency steering committee and reported in their annual implementation plan.

11 Sec. 1002. In developing and implementing AIDS provider education
12 activities, the department may provide funding to the Michigan state medical
13 society to serve as lead agency to convene a consortium of health care
14 providers, to design needed educational efforts, to fund other statewide
15 provider groups, and to assure implementation of these efforts, in accordance
16 with a plan approved by the department.

17 Sec. 1003. The funds appropriated in section 101 for the Michigan health
18 initiative programs include monies for the purposes of local AIDS referral and
19 care network grants, AIDS and risk reduction clearinghouse and media campaign,
20 AIDS local education and outreach program, AIDS local counseling and testing
21 program, health care provider risk reduction, AIDS program administration,
22 Michigan health initiative administration, worksite risk reduction and health
23 promotion grants, cancer prevention and control program, research,
24 demonstration and evaluations.

25 Sec. 1004. The funds appropriated in section 101 for the Vietnam veterans
26 agent orange program shall be considered a work project account that shall not

1 lapse at the end of the fiscal year.

2 Sec. 1005. By January 1, 1991 and annually thereafter, the department
3 shall submit a report to the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on
4 public health, the senate and house fiscal agencies, and the department of
5 management and budget regarding grants and services provided from the Michigan
6 health initiative fund.

7 BUREAU OF COMMUNITY SERVICES

8 Sec. 1101. Before December 1, 1990, the department shall submit a list of
9 projects by expenditure category to be supported with the funds appropriated in
10 section 101 for maternal and infant health data and evaluation to the members
11 of the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on public health, the
12 senate and house fiscal agencies, and the department of management and budget.
13 The list shall include a project which links birth outcomes to maternal
14 participation in state funded maternal and child health programs.

15 COMMUNITY SERVICES GRANTS TO LOCAL AGENCIES

16 Sec. 1201. The department shall review the basis for the distribution of
17 funds to local health departments and other public and private agencies for the
18 women, infants, and children food supplement program; family planning; early
19 and periodic screening, diagnosis, and treatment program; and prenatal care
20 outreach and service delivery support program and indicate the basis upon which
21 any projected underexpenditures by local public and private agencies shall be
22 reallocated to other local agencies that demonstrate need.

23 Sec. 1202. A clinic, institution, or other health facility receiving
24 state funding for family planning purposes shall provide to a client seeking
25 family planning services, at initial contact, a pamphlet containing educational
26 information to assist the patient in making responsible parenting decisions.

1 The pamphlet shall include, but shall not be limited to, information regarding
2 the physical, financial, and time commitment involved in parenting. The
3 pamphlets required by this section shall be provided by the department. The
4 pamphlets shall be written in clear and nontechnical terms. Copies of the
5 pamphlets shall also be printed in English and Spanish and distributed upon
6 request to the clinics, institutions, and other health facilities described in
7 this section.

8 Sec. 1203. The amount appropriated in section 101 for state/local cost
9 sharing may be used for special grants to local health departments to satisfy
10 minimum funding levels prescribed by section 2477 of the public health code,
11 Act No. 368 of the Public Acts of 1978, being section 333.2477 of the Michigan
12 Compiled Laws, and any other authorized supplement. The special grants shall
13 not exceed a total of \$250,000.00.

14 Sec. 1204. (1) Agencies receiving funds appropriated from section 101 for
15 adolescent health care services shall meet all of the following criteria:

16 (a) Adolescent health centers shall report to the department on an annual
17 basis all of the following information:

18 (i) Funding sources of the adolescent health clinic.

19 (ii) Demographic information of populations served including sex, age, and
20 race.

21 (iii) Utilization data that reflects the number of visits and repeat
22 visits and types of services provided per visit.

23 (iv) Types and number of referrals to other health care agencies.

24 (b) The local school board shall establish a local advisory committee
25 prior to the planning phase of an adolescent health clinic intended to provide
26 services within that school district. The advisory committee shall be

1 comprised of not less than 50% residents of the local school district, and
2 shall not be comprised of more than 50% health care providers. A person who is
3 employed by the sponsoring agency shall not have voting privileges as a member
4 of the advisory committee. All advisory committee meetings shall be open to
5 the public with at least a 1-week notice of the meeting date published in the
6 local newspaper.

7 (c) The local advisory committee, in cooperation with the sponsoring
8 agency, shall submit written recommendations regarding the implementation and
9 types of services rendered by an adolescent health clinic to the local school
10 board for approval of services rendered in a building where instruction is
11 provided in grades kindergarten through 12.

12 (d) An adolescent health clinic shall not, as part of the services
13 offered, provide abortion counseling or services or make referrals for abortion
14 services.

15 (e) If the local advisory committee recommends that family planning be
16 provided as a service, then any public information brochure shall include
17 family planning in its description of the entire array of services provided by
18 the clinic.

19 (f) All adolescent health clinics shall have a written policy on parental
20 consent, developed by the local advisory committee and submitted to the local
21 school board for approval if the services are provided in a building where
22 instruction is provided in grades kindergarten through 12.

23 (2) The department shall submit a report to the members of the senate and
24 house appropriations subcommittees on public health, senate and house fiscal
25 agencies, and the department of management and budget based on the information
26 provided under subsection (1)(a). The report shall be due 90 days after the

1 end of the calendar year.

2 Sec. 1205. (1) Before April 1, 1991, the department shall submit a report
3 to the members of the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on public
4 health, the senate and house fiscal agencies, and the department of management
5 and budget on planned allocations from the amount appropriated in section 101
6 for maternity, infant, and children's health care local agreements. The report
7 shall include information on all of the following:

8 (a) Funding allocations.

9 (b) Basis for grantee selection.

10 (c) Expected cost per client served by grantee.

11 (d) Number of women expected to be served.

12 (e) Number of children expected to be served.

13 (f) Expected first and third party collections by source of payment.

14 (g) Actual numbers served and amounts expended in the categories described
15 in subdivisions (a) to (f) for the fiscal year 1989-90.

16 (2) Before April 1, 1992, the department shall report to the parties
17 specified in subsection (1) on the actual numbers served and amounts expended
18 in the categories described in subsection (1)(a) through (f) for the fiscal
19 year 1990-91.

20 Sec. 1206. For all programs appropriated in section 101 for community
21 services grants to local agencies unit, the department shall contract with
22 those local public and private nonprofit agencies best able to serve clients.
23 Factors to be used in the evaluation shall include ability to serve high-risk
24 population groups; ability to serve low-income clients, where applicable;
25 availability of, and access to, service sites; management efficiency; and
26 ability to meet federal standards, where applicable.

1 Sec. 1207. (1) All family planning programs receiving federal title X
2 family planning funds shall be in compliance with all performance and quality
3 assurance indicators that the United States bureau of community health services
4 specifies as its common reporting requirements. Agencies out of compliance
5 with the administrative indicator shall not receive supplemental or reallocated
6 funds.

7 (2) By April 1, 1991, the department shall report to the members of the
8 house and senate appropriations subcommittees on public health, the senate and
9 house fiscal agencies, and the department of management and budget on both of
10 the following:

11 (a) The extent to which all delegate agencies meet the federal indicators.

12 (b) Using applicable federal definitions, the total expended by the
13 department of public health and its delegate agencies on family planning
14 services, the number of clients served, and the average cost per client by
15 delegate agency.

16 Sec. 1208. The department and local health departments shall report by
17 April 1, 1991 to the members of the senate and house appropriations
18 subcommittees on public health, senate and house fiscal agencies, and the
19 department of management and budget on the disposition of the funds distributed
20 from the health and safety fund under the health and safety fund act, Act No.
21 264 of the Public Acts of 1987, being sections 141.471 to 141.479 of the
22 Michigan Compiled Laws, and sections 5 and 20 of Act No. 265 of the Public Acts
23 of 1947, being sections 205.507 and 205.520 of the Michigan Compiled Laws. The
24 report shall include all of the following:

25 (a) Whether the funds received from the health and safety fund were used
26 for property tax relief and, if not, the specific programs supported by that

1 portion of the distribution mandated for public health prevention programs and
2 services.

3 (b) A comparison of total local support for local public health
4 departments for fiscal year 1991 and for fiscal year 1990.

5 Sec. 1209. Expenditures for the early and periodic screening, diagnosis,
6 and treatment program, including state administration, and for the medical
7 review and nursing evaluation program, shall not exceed the actual amount of
8 funds available from the department of social services and any associated
9 federal matching funds.

10 Sec. 1210. (1) By April 1, 1991 the department shall submit a report to
11 the members of the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on public
12 health, the senate and house fiscal agencies, and the department of management
13 and budget on the prenatal care outreach and service delivery support program.
14 The report shall include a listing of all agencies expected to receive funds
15 from this program and the allotted amount for each agency, the services to be
16 provided, and the expected number of persons to be served.

17 (2) By April 1, 1992 the department shall report to the parties specified
18 in subsection (1) on the actual number of persons served and the amounts
19 expended by each agency that received funds under the program.

20 Sec. 1211. By December 1, 1990, the department shall report to the house
21 and senate appropriations subcommittees on public health, the house and senate
22 fiscal agencies, and the department of management and budget on the newborn
23 genetic screening program and the sickle cell and other genetic services local
24 agreements. The report shall include all of the following information:

25 (a) The basis for funding allocations, including caseload, formula,
26 staffing levels, or other basis.

1 (b) A plan for funding the entire program within revenues available in
2 fiscal year 1990-91 and in subsequent fiscal years.

3 (c) A description of specific activities funded by each contract,
4 including research, education and training, medical management of patients, and
5 administration and coordination.

6 Sec. 1212. Of the amount appropriated in section 101 for prenatal care
7 outreach and service delivery support, not more than 10% shall be expended for
8 local administration, data processing, and evaluation.

9 Sec. 1213. The funds appropriated in section 101 for adolescent health
10 care services shall not be used to fund grants for planning for or community
11 coordination of additional adolescent health care programs.

12 Sec. 1214. Prior to spending any of the funds appropriated in Section 101
13 for the essential health provider program, a plan must be developed by the
14 department and submitted to the members of the house and senate appropriations
15 subcommittees on public health, the house and senate fiscal agencies, and the
16 department of management and budget. The plan shall specify at a minimum the
17 following:

18 (a) All geographical regions of the state, population groups, or
19 facilities that are designated as health resource shortage areas and which are
20 eligible for placement of health professionals.

21 (b) The number and type of health professionals that will be eligible for
22 the repayment program during fiscal year 1991.

23 (c) An indication of measures to determine community support for retaining
24 any professional that is placed in a health resource shortage area.

25 The department may implement all or portions of the essential health
26 provider program through agreements with other state agencies or contracts with

1 private non-profit organizations. The funds must be spent in a manner
2 consistent with the department's plan.

3 CRIPPLED CHILDREN SERVICES

4 Sec. 1301. Money appropriated in section 101 for medical care and
5 treatment of crippled children shall be paid according to reimbursement
6 policies determined by the Michigan medical assistance program. Exceptions to
7 these policies may be taken with the prior approval of the department of
8 management and budget.

9 Sec. 1302. The department may do one or more of the following:

10 (a) Provide special formula for eligible clients with specified metabolic
11 and allergic disorders.

12 (b) Provide medical care and treatment to eligible patients with cystic
13 fibrosis who are 21 years of age or older.

14 (c) Provide genetic diagnostic and counseling services for eligible
15 families.

16 (d) Provide medical care and treatment to eligible patients with
17 hereditary coagulation defects (hemophilia) who are 21 years of age or older.

18 Sec. 1303. A provider of service who does not submit a bill for care
19 related to part 58 of the public health code, Act No. 368 of the Public Acts of
20 1978, being sections 333.5801 to 333.5879 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, within
21 12 months after the date of service forfeits the right to payment and shall not
22 seek reimbursement from the recipient of the care nor from the recipient's
23 family or guardian.

24 Sec. 1304. (1) By April 1, 1991 the department shall submit a report to
25 the members of the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on public
26 health on the crippled children case management services program. The report

1 shall include funding allocations by local health departments or other
2 contractors and the number of children and families expected to be served by
3 the agency.

4 (2) By April 1, 1992 the department shall report to the parties specified
5 in subsection (1) on the actual number of persons served and the amounts
6 expended by each agency that received funds under the program.

7 SUBSTANCE ABUSE GRANTS AND CONTRACTS

8 Sec. 1401. This act does not prohibit the provision of programmatic or
9 financial support for the same or similar services by state departments other
10 than the office of substance abuse services.

11 Sec. 1402. The funds appropriated in section 101 for the SAPE program
12 shall be used to support regional drug education programs through contracts
13 with selected intermediate school districts. These state funds shall not be
14 expended unless the intermediate school district appropriates an amount equal
15 to 10% of the total program.

16 Sec. 1403. Not more than \$47,400.00 may be expended from the amount
17 appropriated in section 101 for community substance abuse prevention,
18 education, and treatment grants to reimburse the department of state police for
19 fire inspection of substance abuse facilities.

20 Sec. 1404. Of the funds appropriated in section 101 for substance abuse,
21 not more than 10% of state administered funds may be expended for
22 administration of coordinating agencies.

23 Sec. 1405. Of the funds appropriated in section 101 for substance abuse
24 prevention, education, and treatment grants, not more than \$100,000.00 may be
25 utilized by the OSAS to implement fire and safety standards for local
26 residential services programs.

1 Sec. 1406. The amount appropriated in section 101 for substance abuse
2 prevention, education, and treatment grants shall be expended for contracting
3 with coordinating agencies or designated service providers.

4 Sec. 1407. The department shall not pay for services rendered under part
5 65 of the public health code, Act No. 368 of the Public Acts of 1978, being
6 sections 333.6501 to 333.6523 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, if the billings or
7 invoices for those services are submitted more than 12 months after the
8 services are rendered.

9 Sec. 1408. Of the amount appropriated in section 101 for community
10 substance abuse prevention, education, and treatment grants, \$992,500.00 shall
11 be for alcoholism and drug abuse services provided in residential and
12 outpatient settings to statewide medicaid and Wayne county general
13 assistance/resident county hospitalization substance abuse clients.

14 Sec. 1409. Prior to the implementation of any changes in the allocation
15 formula currently being used to distribute substance abuse grants and
16 contracts, the office of substance abuse services shall submit the changes and
17 their impact upon substance abuse coordinating agencies, programs, and services
18 for review to the members of the house and senate appropriations subcommittees
19 on public health, the house and senate fiscal agencies, and the department of
20 management and budget.
