

SENATE BILL No. 228

EXECUTIVE BUDGET BILL

March 7, 1989, Introduced by Senator ARTHURHULTZ and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

A bill to make appropriations for the department of natural resources for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1990; to provide for the expenditure of those appropriations; to create funds and accounts; to require reports; to prescribe certain powers and duties of certain state departments and officers, institutions; and agencies; to authorize certain transfers by certain state agencies; and to provide for the disposition of fees and other income received by the various state agencies.

 14 sections 18.1101 to 18.1594 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

5 (m) "DOI-OWRT" means the DOI-office of water research and technology.

6 (n) "DOT" means the United States department of transportation.

7 (o) "EPA" means the United States environmental protection agency.

8 (p) "EPA-LUST trust" means the EPA-leaking underground storage tank trust
9 fund.

10 (q) "EPA-OPM" means the EPA-office of program management.

11 (r) "EPA-ORD" means the EPA-office of research and development.

12 (s) "EPA-OWWM" means the EPA-office of water and waste management.

13 (t) "FTE" means full-time equated.

14 (u) "PCB" means polychlorinated biphenyl.

15 EXECUTIVE

16 Sec. 301. The appropriations in section 101 may be used for per diem
17 payments to the members of commissions for a full day's committee work at which
18 a quorum is present, for attending a hearing as authorized by the respective
19 commissions, or for performing official business as authorized by each
20 respective commission. The per diem payments shall be at a rate as follows:

21 (a) Commission of natural resources.....\$75.00 per day

22 (b) Hazardous waste management planning committee....\$50.00 per day

23 (c) Toxic substance control commission.....\$100.00 per day

24 Sec. 302. Amounts appropriated in this act to the department shall not be
25 used to purchase any airplane or helicopter, or any boat over 21 feet in length.

26 Sec. 303. The department when purchasing any equipment or supplies with

1 funds appropriated in section 101, shall give preference to those items
2 manufactured, assembled, or sold in this state.

3 Sec. 304. In carrying out the provisions of this act, should the director
4 of the department be required to lay off any department employees, the director
5 shall be exempted from using a strict application of continuous service credits
6 in accordance with guidelines developed by the state personnel director and
7 approved by the civil service commission in order to preserve affirmative
8 action gains made in a program approved by the Michigan equal employment and
9 business opportunity council. This is in accordance with civil service
10 commission rule 2-19.3d.

11 ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

12 Sec. 401. The following are the estimated revenues available in the game
13 and fish protection fund for the state fiscal year beginning October 1, 1989:

20 Sec. 402. The department, in cooperation with the department of treasury,
21 shall study the mineral lease management program for purposes of implementing a
22 permanent audit unit for that program. Upon completion of the study the
23 department shall recommend to the legislature the feasibility of establishing
24 an audit unit. If the report determines that the creation of an audit unit is
25 feasible the report shall contain at a minimum all of the following:

26 (a) The amount of funding necessary to support an audit unit.

1 (b) The number of FTE positions that would be required.

2 (c) One or more sources of financing for the program, other than the
3 general fund of the state.

4 (d) Where the audit unit would be located within the department.

5 DEPARTMENTAL OPERATIONAL SUPPORT

6 Sec. 501. The department shall report on February 1, 1990, to the senate
7 and house of representatives appropriations committees and to the senate and
8 house fiscal agencies. The report shall include:

9 (a) The amount of contributions, gifts, bequests, grants, and donations
10 received by the department for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1989.

11 (b) A listing of the expenditures made from the amounts received as
12 reported in subdivision (a).

13 RECREATION

14 Sec. 601. The department may charge the appropriations contained in
15 section 101 including all special maintenance and capital projects appropriated
16 for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1990, for the engineering services
17 provided, a standard percentage fee to be determined by the director of the
18 department of management and budget, and may use the revenue derived to support
19 the engineering services charges provided for in section 101.

20 STATE PARKS

21 Sec. 701. (1) There is created and established under the jurisdiction and
22 control of the department a revolving account to be known as the MacMullan
23 conference center account. The account shall receive all fees or other
24 revenues generated from operation of the MacMullan conference center.
25 Appropriations shall be made from the account for support of programs
26 operations and all maintenance and operations of the facility, and shall not

1 exceed the estimated revenues for the fiscal year in which they are made,
2 together with any unexpended balances from prior years. An annual report of
3 operations and expenditures shall be submitted to the appropriations committees
4 of the senate and house of representatives and the house and senate fiscal
5 agencies at the end of the fiscal year.

6 (2) The MacMullan conference center shall be uniformly available to any
7 group or organization dedicated to utilization, protection, and economic
8 development of the state's natural resources. An annual report of the amount
9 of money expended and the nature of training sessions that were held shall be
10 submitted to the appropriations committees of the senate and house of
11 representatives and the house and senate fiscal agencies at the end of the
12 fiscal year.

13 Sec. 702. The commission of natural resources shall provide that each
14 concession in a state park shall be awarded every 7 years based upon
15 renegotiation or competitive bidding. The award of each concession in a state
16 park shall be approved by the commission of natural resources.

17 Sec. 703. Of the total funds appropriated in section 101 for state park
18 operations, the department shall expend \$40,000.00 to contract with Saginaw
19 Valley state university and Delta community college to operate the Jenison
20 trail side museum interpretive center at Bay City state park.

21 FOREST RESOURCE MANAGEMENT

22 Sec. 801. The department of state may carry over unexpended snowmobile
23 and off-road vehicle fee collections as authorized by Act No. 74 of the Public
24 Acts of 1968, being sections 257.1501 to 257.1518 of the Michigan Compiled
25 Laws, and Act No. 319 of the Public Acts of 1975, being sections 257.1601 to
26 257.1626 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, to fund following year programs in the

1 department of state and the department as appropriated by the legislature.

2 Sec. 802. The department may carry forward the unexpended revenue
3 collected for wildfire prevention and the Roscommon equipment center.
4 Expenditure shall not exceed revenue collected for the fiscal year together
5 with any unexpended balances of the prior fiscal year.

6 REAL ESTATE

7 Sec. 901. The department may charge land acquisition projects
8 appropriated for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1990, and for prior
9 fiscal years, a standard percentage fee to be determined by the state budget
10 director, and may use the revenue derived to support the land acquisition
11 service charges provided for in section 101.

12 Sec. 902. The land sale service charges fund is created. An amount equal
13 to the cost of personal services, printing, postage, advertising, contractual
14 services, and facility rental associated with the sale of tax reverted lands
15 shall be deducted from the sales and credited to the land sale service charges
16 fund.

17 Sec. 903. The department shall not offer for public sale any mineral
18 rights that it owns until the department has the permission of the owner of the
19 surface rights to that land.

20 GEOLOGICAL SURVEY

21 Sec. 1001 Of the amount appropriated in section 101 for services to oil
22 and gas programs, an amount not to exceed \$150,000 is appropriated for a grant
23 to Michigan state university and the university of Michigan for bioremediation
24 research.

25 LAND AND WATER MANAGEMENT

26 Sec. 1101. From fees collected pursuant to section 22 of Act No. 61 of

1 the Public Acts of 1939, being section 319.22 of the Michigan Compiled Laws,
2 there is appropriated \$125,000.00 to be known as the brine loss investigation
3 fund which shall be utilized by the supervisor of wells for response and
4 investigation of existing or future alleged instances of groundwater
5 contamination resulting from drilling or operation of oil or gas wells. If
6 necessary, and after consultation with the oil and gas advisory board, the
7 supervisor of wells may negotiate and authorize direct contractual services
8 for surface of hydrogeologic investigations. The fund shall not be used for
9 research or for soil or groundwater sampling where verified complaints do not
10 exist.

11 ENVIRONMENTAL RESPONSE

12 Sec. 1201. When funds are expended from the appropriation in section 101
13 for water cleaning emergency funds for use by the department, the department
14 shall do all within its powers to ascertain who was at fault in causing a spill-
15 or leakage which to remedy the situation necessitated the use of the emergency
16 fund. When possible, the department shall charge and collect from the party
17 responsible for the spill or leakage, the costs incurred by the department in
18 remedying the situation. Funds collected, after the costs of collection, shall
19 be returned to the water cleaning emergency fund. Notwithstanding any other
20 section of this act, these funds are hereby appropriated and allocated for
21 expenditure when received. The department shall report to the appropriations
22 committees of the house of representatives and senate and the house and senate
23 fiscal agencies, the status, use, and results of the water cleaning emergency
24 fund in April of each year.

25 Sec. 1202. (1) Under the appropriation in section 101 for the Act 307
26 cleanup program, the department shall continue to make authorizations for site

1 evaluation, interim response activity, final response activity, and
 2 contingencies for all environmental contamination sites and for the
 3 administration of the program created by the environmental response act, Act
 4 No. 307 of the Public Acts of 1982, being sections 299.601 to 299.611 of the
 5 Michigan Compiled Laws.

6 (2) The department shall report the following information relative to
 7 allocations made from the line "Act 307 cleanup" in section 101 to the senate
 8 and house appropriations committees and the senate and house fiscal agencies:

9 (a) The name and location of the site for which an allocation is made.

10 (b) The nature of the problem encountered at the site.

11 (c) The estimated time necessary to prepare plans or complete any
 12 necessary study if the allocation is for plans or a study.

13 (d) A brief description of how the problem will be resolved if the
 14 allocation is made for a response activity.

15 (e) The estimated time to complete the response activity if the allocation
 16 is for a response activity.

17 (f) The amount of the allocation.

18 (3) The report shall be made available as follows:

22 (4) The unexpended portion of the appropriation in section 101 to the
 23 department, state cleanups (Act 307 PA 1982) remaining at the end of the
 24 fiscal year ending September 30, 1990, shall not lapse to the fund from which
 25 appropriated but shall continue to be available for the purposes for which it
 26 was appropriated. The funds carried forward into the next fiscal year

1 pursuant to this section shall be used at the discretion of the director of
 2 the department for remedial actions only for those sites evaluated under the
 3 site assessment system created in the environmental response act, Act No. 307
 4 of the Public Acts of 1982, being sections 299.601 to 299.611 of the Michigan
 5 Compiled Laws.

6 (5) The unexpended portion of the appropriation in section 101 to the
 7 department for superfund cleanup match, remaining at the end of the fiscal
 8 year ending September 30, 1990, shall not lapse to the fund from which
 9 appropriated but shall continue to be available for the purposes for which it
 10 was appropriated.

11 Sec. 1203. (1) The department shall report the following information
 12 relative to site specific cooperative agreements made from the line "superfund
 13 cleanup" to the senate and house appropriations committees and the senate and
 14 house fiscal agencies:

15 (a) The name and location of the site for which the site specific
 16 cooperative agreement is made.

17 (b) The nature of the problem encountered at the site.

18 (c) The estimated time to prepare plans or complete any necessary study if
 19 the allocation is for plans or a study.

20 (d) A brief description of how the problem will be resolved if the
 21 allocation is made for a remedy.

22 (e) The estimated time to complete the remedy of the problem if the
 23 allocation is for a remedy.

24 (f) The amount of the anticipated financing for the site.

25 (2) The report shall be made available as follows:

26 Reporting Period Report Due

2	April through September	November 15

3 Sec. 1204. The department shall report to the house and senate
4 appropriations subcommittees on natural resources within 30 days before April
5 30, 1990 and within 30 days before October 30, 1990 on the status of the
6 department's efforts to reduce the existing backlog of groundwater discharge
7 permits.

8 Sec. 1205. The department may contract with the department of public
9 health or the department of agriculture, or both, for the purpose of laboratory
10 tests, monitoring, or analyses in connection with the industrial surveillance
11 program. The department performing the service shall bill the department
12 receiving the service for the necessary costs of the service. A department
13 shall pay each bill received for services rendered pursuant to this section.

14 RESOURCE PRESERVATION LAW ENFORCEMENT

15 Sec. 1301. Of the state general fund/general purpose resources
16 appropriated in section 101 to resource preservation law enforcement,
17 \$2,015,300.00 is to provide reimbursement to the game and fish protection fund
18 for senior citizen reimbursement.

19 GRANTS

20 Sec. 1401. In administering the federal land and water conservation grant
21 program, the department shall not adopt a policy that discriminates against
22 providing funding to small communities in this state.

23 Sec. 1402. The department shall report to the house and senate
24 appropriations subcommittees on natural resources those local units of
25 government which received hazardous waste grants from the funds appropriated in
26 section 101.

1 Sec. 1403. Before any of the \$248,100.00 appropriated in section 101 for
2 groundwater compliance grants is committed, the department shall submit to the
3 senate and house appropriations subcommittees on natural resources a list of
4 the projects and the local governmental units proposed to be funded by the
5 appropriation.

6 Sec. 1404. Of the funds appropriated in section 101 as state match for
7 the superfund cleanup program, an amount not to exceed \$250,000.00 may be
8 expended as state match for the hazardous substance research center
9 appropriated in section 101.

10 Sec. 1405. (1) If a certified health department does not exist in a city,
11 county, or district or does not fulfill its responsibilities under the septage
12 waste servicers act, Act No. 181 of the Public Acts of 1986, being sections
13 325.311 to 325.332 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, then the department may spend
14 funds appropriated in section 101 under the septage waste compliance program in
15 accordance with section 17(3) of the septage waste servicers act, Act No. 181
16 of the Public Acts of 1986.

17 (2) The department may carry forward unexpended septage waste license fees
18 collected for the septage waste compliance program. Expenditures shall not
19 exceed revenue collected for the fiscal year together with any unexpended
20 balances of the prior fiscal year.

21 Sec. 1406. Of the state general fund/general purpose resources
22 appropriated in section 101 for purchased lands, \$1,544,100.00 is to provide
23 reimbursement to the game and fish protection fund for the third year of a
24 5-year phase-in of general fund support of 50% of the total tax payments due to
25 local units for lands acquired with hunting and fishing license fees from the
26 game and fish protection fund.

1 Sec. 1407. Amounts needed to pay for interest, fees, and costs associated
2 with the payment, registration, trustee services, credit enhancements, and
3 issuing costs for debt service on notes and bonds that are issued by the state
4 pursuant to sections 14, 15, and 16 of article IX of the state constitution of
5 1963 as implemented by Act No. 266 of the Public Acts of 1967, being sections
6 17.451 to 17.455 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, are appropriated.

7 Sec. 1408. The amounts appropriated for utilities and that portion of
8 contractual services, supplies, and materials used to pay for utility service
9 to state facilities in section 101 may be expended in a manner consistent with
10 the provisions of section 253 of the management and budget act, Act No. 431 of
11 the Public Acts of 1984, as amended, being section 18.1253 of the Michigan
12 Compiled Laws.

13 Sec. 1409. Of the amounts appropriated in section 101 for commercial
14 forest grants, an amount of \$.10 per acre for each acre of land certified and
15 listed as commercial forest in the state under Act 94 of the Public Acts of
16 1925, as amended, shall be utilized for administration of the act by the
17 department.
