

MINUTES OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE ON INSURANCE

Thursday, October 13, 2011 10:30 a.m. Room 519 House Office Building, Lansing

Representative Lund, Chair, called the meeting to order.

Representative Shaughnessy made a motion to adopt the minutes of the meeting of October 11, 2011. No objections being offered, the minutes were accepted as presented.

The Chair laid HB 4936 before the Committee.

HB 4936 Lund Insurance; no-fault; coverage and benefits; make miscellaneous changes.

Representative O'Brien made a motion to adopt HB 4936 (H-1).

2. Amend page 28, line 8, by inserting "However, for a closed-head injury, a question of fact for the jury is created if a licensed allopathic or osteopathic physician who regularly diagnoses or treats closed-head injuries testifies under oath that there may be a serious neurological injury."
3. Amend page 29, line 8, after "(1)" by striking out the comma and inserting "and".
4. Amend page 29, line 8, after "(2)" by striking out the comma and "**AND (7) TO (13)**".
5. Amend page 30, line 23, after "manifested" by striking out "**INJURY THAT IMPAIRS OR IMPAIRED**" and inserting "impairment of".
6. Amend page 30, line 24, after "function" by striking out "**AND**".
7. Amend page 30, line 24, after "affects" by striking out "**OR AFFECTED**".
8. Amend page 30, line 26, after "life." by striking out the balance of the section.

An insufficient number of members voting in the affirmative, the motion did not prevail.

Kevin Clinton, Insurance Commissioner, Office of Financial and Retirement Services, reviewed various aspects of HB 4936 with the Committee, including: PIP costs, pricing of reserve assumptions, the auto insurance fee schedule, that passage of the bill should result in lower rates to insureds, that the current system is unsustainable and cannot continue on current path and that there is a need to make some

changes. Discussion followed and the Commissioner answered several questions from Committee members.

Subsequent to the remarks from Mr. Clinton, the Committee returned to work on HB 4936.

Representative Howze made a motion to amend HB 4936 (H-1) as follows:

1. Amend page 34, following line 18, by inserting:

"Sec. 3142. (1) Personal protection insurance benefits are payable as loss accrues.

(2) ~~Personal~~**EXCEPT AS PROVIDED IN SUBSECTION (3), PERSONAL** protection insurance benefits are overdue if not paid within 30 days after an insurer receives reasonable proof of the fact and of the amount of loss sustained. If reasonable proof is not supplied as to the entire claim, the amount supported by reasonable proof is overdue if not paid within 30 days after the proof is received by the insurer. Any part of the remainder of the claim that is later supported by reasonable proof is overdue if not paid within 30 days after the proof is received by the insurer. For the purpose of calculating the extent to which benefits are overdue, payment shall be treated as made on the date a draft or other valid instrument was placed in the United States mail in a properly addressed, postpaid envelope, or, if not so posted, on the date of delivery.

(3) AN INSURER, IN PROCESSING A CLAIM FOR PERSONAL PROTECTION BENEFITS FROM A HEALTH PROFESSIONAL, HEALTH FACILITY, HOME HEALTH CARE PROVIDER, OR DURABLE MEDICAL EQUIPMENT PROVIDER FOR SERVICES RENDERED SHALL USE THE FOLLOWING TIMELY PROCESSING AND PAYMENT PROCEDURES:

(A) A CLEAN CLAIM SHALL BE PAID WITHIN 45 DAYS AFTER RECEIPT OF THE CLAIM BY THE INSURER. A CLEAN CLAIM THAT IS NOT PAID WITHIN 45 DAYS IS AN OVERDUE PAYMENT UNDER THIS SECTION.

(B) AN INSURER SHALL NOTIFY THE HEALTH PROFESSIONAL, HEALTH FACILITY, HOME HEALTH CARE PROVIDER, OR DURABLE MEDICAL EQUIPMENT PROVIDER WITHIN 30 DAYS AFTER RECEIPT OF THE CLAIM BY THE INSURER OF ALL KNOWN REASONS THAT PREVENT THE CLAIM FROM BEING A CLEAN CLAIM.

(C) A HEALTH PROFESSIONAL, HEALTH FACILITY, HOME HEALTH CARE PROVIDER, OR DURABLE MEDICAL EQUIPMENT PROVIDER HAS 45 DAYS, AND ANY ADDITIONAL TIME THE INSURER PERMITS, AFTER RECEIPT OF A NOTICE UNDER SUBDIVISION (B) TO CORRECT ALL KNOWN DEFECTS. THE 45-DAY TIME PERIOD IN SUBDIVISION (A) IS TOLLED FROM THE DATE OF RECEIPT OF A NOTICE TO A HEALTH PROFESSIONAL, HEALTH FACILITY, HOME HEALTH CARE PROVIDER, OR DURABLE MEDICAL EQUIPMENT PROVIDER UNDER SUBDIVISION (B) TO THE DATE OF THE INSURER'S RECEIPT OF A RESPONSE FROM THE HEALTH PROFESSIONAL, HEALTH FACILITY, HOME HEALTH CARE PROVIDER, OR DURABLE MEDICAL EQUIPMENT PROVIDER.

(D) IF A HEALTH PROFESSIONAL'S, HEALTH FACILITY'S, HOME HEALTH CARE PROVIDER'S, OR DURABLE MEDICAL EQUIPMENT PROVIDER'S RESPONSE UNDER SUBDIVISION (C) MAKES THE CLAIM A CLEAN CLAIM, THE INSURER SHALL

PAY THE HEALTH PROFESSIONAL, HEALTH FACILITY, HOME HEALTH CARE PROVIDER, OR DURABLE MEDICAL EQUIPMENT PROVIDER WITHIN THE 45-DAY TIME PERIOD UNDER SUBDIVISION (A), EXCLUDING ANY TIME PERIOD TOLLED UNDER SUBDIVISION (C).

(E) IF A HEALTH PROFESSIONAL'S, HEALTH FACILITY'S, HOME HEALTH CARE PROVIDER'S, OR DURABLE MEDICAL EQUIPMENT PROVIDER'S RESPONSE UNDER SUBDIVISION (C) DOES NOT MAKE THE CLAIM A CLEAN CLAIM, THE INSURER SHALL NOTIFY THE HEALTH PROFESSIONAL, HEALTH FACILITY, HOME HEALTH CARE PROVIDER, OR DURABLE MEDICAL EQUIPMENT PROVIDER OF AN ADVERSE CLAIM DETERMINATION AND OF THE REASONS FOR THE ADVERSE CLAIM DETERMINATION WITHIN THE 45-DAY TIME PERIOD UNDER SUBDIVISION (A), EXCLUDING ANY TIME PERIOD TOLLED UNDER SUBDIVISION (C).

(F) A HEALTH PROFESSIONAL, HEALTH FACILITY, HOME HEALTH CARE PROVIDER, OR DURABLE MEDICAL EQUIPMENT PROVIDER SHALL NOT RESUBMIT THE SAME CLAIM TO THE INSURER UNLESS THE TIME FRAME IN SUBDIVISION (A) HAS PASSED OR AS PROVIDED IN SUBDIVISION (C).

(4) NOTICES REQUIRED UNDER SUBSECTION (3) SHALL BE MADE IN WRITING OR ELECTRONICALLY.

(5) A HEALTH PROFESSIONAL, HEALTH FACILITY, HOME HEALTH CARE PROVIDER, DURABLE MEDICAL EQUIPMENT PROVIDER, OR INSURER ALLEGING THAT A TIMELY PROCESSING OR PAYMENT PROCEDURE UNDER SUBSECTION (3) HAS BEEN VIOLATED MAY FILE A COMPLAINT WITH THE COMMISSIONER ON A FORM APPROVED BY THE COMMISSIONER AND HAS A RIGHT TO A DETERMINATION OF THE MATTER BY THE COMMISSIONER OR HIS OR HER DESIGNEE. THIS SUBSECTION DOES NOT PROHIBIT A HEALTH PROFESSIONAL, HEALTH FACILITY, HOME HEALTH CARE PROVIDER, DURABLE MEDICAL EQUIPMENT PROVIDER, OR INSURER FROM FILING A COURT ACTION.

(6) IN ADDITION TO ANY OTHER PENALTY AVAILABLE UNDER THIS ACT, THE COMMISSIONER MAY IMPOSE A CIVIL FINE OF NOT MORE THAN \$1,000.00 FOR EACH VIOLATION OF SUBSECTION (3), NOT TO EXCEED \$10,000.00 IN THE AGGREGATE FOR MULTIPLE VIOLATIONS.

(7) ~~(3)~~-An overdue payment bears simple interest at the rate of 12% per annum.

(8) AS USED IN THIS SECTION:

(A) "CLEAN CLAIM" MEANS A CLAIM THAT DOES ALL OF THE FOLLOWING:

(i) IDENTIFIES THE HEALTH PROFESSIONAL, HEALTH FACILITY, HOME HEALTH CARE PROVIDER, OR DURABLE MEDICAL EQUIPMENT PROVIDER THAT PROVIDED SERVICE SUFFICIENTLY TO VERIFY, IF NECESSARY, AFFILIATION STATUS AND INCLUDES ANY IDENTIFYING NUMBERS.

(ii) SUFFICIENTLY IDENTIFIES THE PATIENT AND, IF DIFFERENT, NAMED INSURED.

(iii) LISTS THE DATE AND PLACE OF SERVICE.

(iv) IS A CLAIM FOR ALLOWABLE PERSONAL PROTECTION BENEFITS.

(v) SUBSTANTIATES THE REASONABLE NECESSITY OF THE SERVICE PROVIDED.

(vi) IDENTIFIES THE SERVICE RENDERED USING A GENERALLY ACCEPTED SYSTEM OF PROCEDURE OR SERVICE CODING.

(vii) INCLUDES ADDITIONAL DOCUMENTATION BASED UPON SERVICES RENDERED AS REASONABLY REQUIRED BY THE INSURER.

(B) "HEALTH FACILITY" MEANS A HEALTH FACILITY OR AGENCY LICENSED UNDER ARTICLE 17 OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH CODE, 1978 PA 368, MCL 333.20101 TO 333.22260.

(C) "HEALTH PROFESSIONAL" MEANS A HEALTH PROFESSIONAL LICENSED OR REGISTERED UNDER ARTICLE 15 OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH CODE, 1978 PA 368, MCL 333.16101 TO 333.18838."
