Dear Senator Marleau:

**Regarding Senate Bill 481:** *This legislation will modernize Michigan's restrictive healthcare regulatory environment by enabling Advanced Practice Registered Nurses (APRNs) to practice to the full extent of their required education, license, and competencies. The legislation also will positively address access to care issues in Michigan's underserved communities by increasing the number of healthcare providers. COMON strongly supports SB 481, and advocates for all Michigan APRNs.*

This letter is sent on behalf of the **Coalition of Michigan Organizations of Nursing (COMON)**, representing 42 Michigan nursing organizations, with membership of over 40,000 nurses. Modernizing Michigan's regulatory environment to maximize the use of APRN healthcare professionals to meet the demand for healthcare services is COMON's highest policy priority for 2011-2015. COMON urges you and the Senate Health Policy Committee to report out this legislation.

SB 481 proposes autonomous practice and separate licensure for Certified Nurse Practitioners (CNP), Certified Nurse Midwives (CNMs), and Clinical Nurse Specialists (CNS-Cs). This improved regulatory environment must be provided for all APRNs. Extensive research has shown that APRNs provide cost-effective care that is equal to or better than care provided by equivalent physicians (see attached *Summary of the Future of Nursing*, Institute of Medicine (IOM), 2010). In rural areas of Michigan, APRNs are often the only practitioners providing primary, obstetrical, and anesthesia care.

As Michigan's percentage of residents over age 65 grows, the need for additional healthcare providers will continue to rise. During Governor Snyder's Michigan Health Address in September 2011 he referred to the growing Michigan physician shortage and the need to educate more healthcare providers to meet growing demand over the next 20 years. Michigan must remove regulatory barriers that put the state at a disadvantage for attracting and keeping APRN healthcare providers.

Michigan educates hundreds of APRNs each year, but at least 30% of our APRN graduates leave the state to find a more supportive, less restrictive regulatory environment for their practice. Several national entities, including the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) and the U.S. Federal Trade Commission have stated that legislation removing practice restrictions for all APRNs is pro-competition and improves consumers' access to affordable healthcare.<sup>1</sup>
