The Michigan Developmental Disabilities Council is a 21 member body of citizens appointed by the Governor to advocate for persons with developmental disabilities.

As of 2013, all but five states in the United States have at least introduced legislation to change the language in their state from 'mental retardation' to people first language.

We strongly and enthusiastically support House Bills 5345–5352 for the following reasons:

1. The phrase mental retardation has evolved from a medical diagnosis to a hurtful, offensive and derogatory word used to demean and offend people with disabilities.
2. This legislation will put Michigan in line with 45 other states and the federal government. President Barack Obama signed Rosa's Law in October of 2010. The signing of Rosa's Law was a significant milestone in establishing dignity, inclusion and respect for all people with intellectual disabilities.



■ **In 2009:** the DD Council started a campaign to end the use of the word retard. 10,000 pledges have been collected

■ **As of 2010:** 39 codes, 6 senate bills and 7 house bills use Mental Retardation, retard, retarded and other variations
