A resolution to declare March 8, 2020, as International
 Women's Day in the state of Michigan.

3 Whereas, March 8, 2020, marks the 109th anniversary of the 4 celebration of International Women's Day. Originally called 5 International Working Women's Day, it is celebrated on March 8 of 6 every year; and

7 Whereas, International Women's Day is a global day celebrating8 the economic, political, and social achievements of women in the



1 past, present, and future. It is a day when women are recognized 2 for their achievements, regardless of divisions, whether national, 3 ethnic, linguistic, cultural, economic, or political. It is an 4 occasion for looking back on past struggles and accomplishments 5 and, more importantly, for looking ahead to the untapped potential 6 and opportunities that await future generations of women; and

7 Whereas, In different regions the focus of the celebrations
8 ranges from general celebration of respect, appreciation, and love
9 towards women to a celebration for women's economic, political, and
10 social achievements; and

11 Whereas, The earliest Women's Day observance was held in 1909 in New York and was organized in remembrance of the strike of the 12 International Ladies' Garment Workers Union. At the second 13 14 International Women's Conference in 1910, the first International 15 Women's Day was officially established to promote equal rights, including suffrage, for women. The following year, International 16 17 Women's Day was marked by over a million people in Austria, 18 Denmark, Germany, and Switzerland. The efforts of early European 19 pioneers led to women gaining the right to vote and to hold public 20 office and the establishment of many early prohibitions against 21 employment sex discrimination; and

22 Whereas, In 1975, during the United Nations (UN) International 23 Year for Women, the UN held its first official celebration of International Women's Day. Two years later, in December 1977, the 24 25 General Assembly adopted a resolution proclaiming a United Nations 26 Day for Women's Rights and International Peace to be observed by 27 member states. In adopting this resolution, the General Assembly 28 recognized the role of women in peace efforts and development and 29 urged an end to discrimination and an increase of support for

1 women's full and equal participation; and

Whereas, Beginning in 1996, International Women's Day organizers began adopting a theme to each year's celebrations that reinforces its commitment to women's rights and world peace. Successful campaigns centered on such themes as "Celebrating the Past, Planning for the Future" (1996) and "Women in Decision-Making" (2006); and

8 Whereas, Presidents of the United States have consecutively 9 declared March to be Women's History Month since 1988 after the 10 National Women's History Project petitioned the United States 11 Congress in 1987 for recognition of Women's History Month, and have since announced the 2020 theme of "Valiant Women of the Vote"; and 12 Whereas, On the occasion of 2010 International Women's Day, 13 14 the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) drew attention 15 to the hardships displaced women endure by spreading awareness of the displacement of populations as one of the gravest consequences 16 of today's armed conflicts; and 17

18 Whereas, There are more than 3.7 billion women in the world 19 today. Women around the world participate in the political, social, 20 and economic life of their communities, play a critical role in 21 providing and caring for their families, contribute substantially 22 to the growth of economies, and, as both farmers and caregivers, 23 play an important role in advancing food security for their 24 communities; and

25 Whereas, The advancement of women is a public policy priority 26 for our country and the state of Michigan and the ability of women 27 to realize their full potential is critical to the ability of a 28 country and state to achieve strong and lasting economic growth and 29 social stability; and

Whereas, According to the International Monetary Fund,
 "focusing on the needs and empowerment of women is one of the keys
 to human development" and according to the 2012 World Economic
 Forum Global Gender Gap Report, "reducing gender inequality
 enhances productivity and economic growth"; and

6 Whereas, According to the World Bank 2012 World Development
7 Report: Gender Equality and Development, "greater gender equality
8 is also smart economics, enhancing productivity and improving other
9 development outcomes, including prospects for the next generation
10 and for the quality of societal policies and institutions"; and

Whereas, Although strides have been made in recent decades, women around the world continue to face significant obstacles in all aspects of their lives, including underrepresentation in all aspects of public life, denial of basic human rights, and discrimination; and

16 Whereas, Despite some achievements by individual women 17 leaders, women around the world are still vastly underrepresented 18 in high level positions and in national and local legislatures and 19 governments and, according to the Inter-Parliamentary Union, women 20 account for only 24 percent of national parliamentarians; and

21 Whereas, Women remain underrepresented in conflict prevention and conflict resolution efforts, despite proven successes by women 22 23 in conflict-affected regions in moderating violent extremism, 24 resolving disputes through non-violent mediation and negotiation, 25 and stabilizing their societies by improving access to peace and security services, institutions, and decision making venues; and 26 27 Whereas, According to the Food and Agriculture Organization of 28 the United Nations, the majority of women living in rural areas of 29 the developing world are heavily engaged in agricultural labor, yet

they receive less credit, land, agricultural inputs, and training
 than their male counterparts; and

3 Whereas, It is imperative to alleviate violence and
4 discrimination against women and afford them every opportunity to
5 be full and productive members of their communities; and

6 Whereas, March 8 is recognized each year as International 7 Women's Day, a global day to celebrate the economic, political, and 8 social achievements of women past, present, and future, and a day 9 to recognize the obstacles that women still face in the struggle 10 for equal rights and opportunities; now, therefore, be it

11 Resolved by the House of Representatives, That the members of this legislative body declare March 8, 2020, as International 12 13 Women's Day in the state of Michigan. We support the goals of 14 International Women's Day, recognize that the empowerment of women 15 is inextricably linked to the potential of countries to generate economic growth, sustainable democracy, and inclusive security, 16 honor the women in the United States and around the world who have 17 18 worked throughout history to ensure that women are guaranteed 19 equality and basic human rights, reaffirm the movement's commitment 20 to ending discrimination and violence against women and girls, to 21 ensuring the safety and welfare of women and girls, and to pursuing 22 policies that guarantee the basic human rights of women and girls 23 worldwide, and encourage the people of Michigan to observe 24 International Women's Day with appropriate programs and activities.
