Subject: American Academy of Pediatrics Periodicity Schedule Update 2024

Effective: April 1, 2025 (Proposed)

The purpose of this policy is to address a needed change to the Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnosis and Treatment (EPSDT) chapter of the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) Medicaid Provider Manual due to an update of the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) periodicity schedule. The updated AAP periodicity schedule is indicating a change of coverage for a routine human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) screening occurring one time from “between 15 and 18 years of age” to “between 15 and 21 years of age.”

A risk assessment for HIV is to be performed annually for children beginning at 11 years of age and as recommended by the AAP periodicity schedule. A routine HIV screening should be offered to all individuals at least one time between 15 and 21 years of age, making every effort to preserve confidentiality of the adolescent. After initial screening, youth at increased risk of HIV infection should be retested annually or more frequently.
