SUBJECT: Joint Committee on Administrative Rules (JCAR) Briefing Memo for Rule

Set No. 2019-35 EG

Rules Primer

The Michigan Safe Drinking Water Act, 1976 PA 399, as amended (Act 399), and the associated administrative rules protect public health by regulating Michigan's public drinking water supplies. The rules establish drinking water standards for many natural and man-made contaminants. They also establish requirements for monitoring, treatment, operator oversight, public notification, laboratory certification, and more.

The current rules do not include drinking water standards and related requirements for per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS). The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) has health advisory levels for two PFAS, but these are non-enforceable and not included in Act 399 or the rules.

PFAS are a group of chemicals used during the past century in the manufacturing of water proofing materials, firefighting foam and thousands of other consumer products. According to the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) and the federal Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry (ATSDR), some studies in people have shown that exposure to certain PFAS may cause health issues. Releases of these chemicals to the environment have occurred in locations around Michigan and pose a threat to public health, safety, or the welfare of its citizens and the environment.

Summary of the Final Proposed Rule

As already stated, the current Act 399 and rules do not address PFAS. The proposed rule revisions would establish enforceable sampling requirements and drinking water standards for seven PFAS compounds under the authority of Act 399 and the administrative rules as follows.

- The proposed rules would apply to all community and nontransient noncommunity public water supplies in Michigan (approximately 2,700 water supplies). Community water supplies are those that provide year-round service to 25 or more people (municipalities, apartments, condominiums, manufactured housing communities, etc.). Nontransient noncommunity water supplies serve 25 or more people at least six months per year (schools, industries, places of employment).
- The rules would require quarterly or annual sampling (frequency dependent on initial results) of seven PFAS at all community and nontransient noncommunity water supplies and require reporting of results to EGLE.
- The rules would establish enforceable drinking water standards, or maximum contaminant levels, for seven PFAS compounds, at the levels listed in the table below, and prescribe the method by which compliance with the standards is calculated.

Contaminant	Maximum Contaminant Level
Hexafluoropropylene oxide dimer acid (HFPO-DA) (ppt)	370 ppt (ng/l)
Perfluorobutane sulfonic acid (PFBS) (ppt)	420 ppt (ng/l)
Perfluorohexane sulfonic acid (PFHxS) (ppt)	51 ppt (ng/l)
Perfluorohexanoic acid (PFHxA) (ppt)	400,000 ppt (ng/l)
Perfluorononanoic acid (PFNA) (ppt)	6 ppt (ng/l)
Perfluorooctane sulfonic acid (PFOS) (ppt)	16 ppt (ng/l)
Perfluorooctanoic acid (PFOA) (ppt)	8 ppt (ng/l)

- The rules would require mandatory notification of the public if a water supply exceeds a drinking water standard or fails to sample as required. The rules also establish mandatory content of public notices, including health effect language, as well as timing and delivery requirements.
- The rules identify best available treatment technologies for removal of PFAS.
- The rules also establish criteria for the certification and decertification of laboratories approved to analyze PFAS samples and specify acceptable analytical methods.

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Stakeholder Engagement

The Department engaged with numerous stakeholders to seek input on draft rule language. Stakeholder listening sessions were held before and during drafting of proposed rule language. The following broad stakeholder categories were engaged: Industrial Group, Health Group, Environmental Group, Municipal Group, and Citizen Group. See attached for a list of entities included in each group.

In addition, the Science Advisory Workgroup, established under the Michigan PFAS Action Response Team (MPART), provided EGLE with a formal report recommending health-based values for EGLE's consideration when drafting the proposed rules.

Public Engagement and Public Hearing/Comment/Information

Three public hearings were held as follows:

- January 8, 2020, Grand Rapids, MI
 One Hundred and one (101) attendees signed in and 26 spoke on the record.
 The event was also livestreamed.
- January 14, 2020, Ann Arbor, MI
 One hundred and twenty-five (125) attendees signed in and 29 spoke on the record. The event was also livestreamed.
- January 16, 2020, Roscommon, MI
 Eighty-one (81) attendees signed in and 21 attendees spoke on the record.
 Livestreaming was not available at this location.

Written Comment:

The written public comment period was open from December 19, 2019, through January 31, 2020. Three thousand, three hundred, and thirty-four (3,334) written comments were received. See attached list of individuals speaking at the public hearings.

Modifications Made Due to Public Comment

Modifications due to public comment were minimal. Two commenters identified incorrect Chemical Abstract Service Registry Numbers for two compounds. These corrections were made in the final draft.

Significant Issues Not Incorporated in the Final Proposed Rules

The following concepts were suggested and discussed but did not have consensus among stakeholders or were found not to be feasible at this time, and therefore were not included within this rule set:

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The seven PFAS Health Based Values established by the MPART Science Advisory Workgroup were called into question during public comment. Concerns were raised related to which compounds were being regulated, the appropriateness of the levels proposed to address public health, and whether those compounds should be regulated separately or as a group, as well as others. In response, a group of reviewers within EGLE Drinking Water and Environmental Health Division were convened, in addition to the MPART Human Health Work Group and the members of the original Science Advisory Workgroup. After careful consideration, these reviewers reaffirmed support for the use of the original Health Based Values as proposed.

Additionally, concerns were raised about whether the impact of drinking water rule promulgation would be too severely felt by those in the water supply, public health, manufacturing, agricultural, and property development communities, among others. These concerns were considered and, after careful review, were determined not to outweigh the benefit of rule promulgation for protecting the quality of Michigan's drinking water resources, and therefore, protecting public health, safety, and the welfare of its citizens.

Environmental Rules Review Committee

This was EGLE's first rulemaking that went through the full oversight of the Environmental Rules Review Committee (ERRC). On November 14, 2019, the ERRC approved the draft rules to go to public hearing. On March 27, 2020, the ERRC approved the changes to the rules following public hearing. The ERRC did express some concerns and questions regarding implementation in a letter addressed to JCAR on March 27, 2020.
