- in the department of treasury for the purpose of providing
  scholarship awards to eligible students who attend eligible
  postsecondary educational institutions in this state, as provided
  in subsection (5).
- 5 (2) The state treasurer may receive money or other assets from 6 any source for deposit into the postsecondary scholarship fund. The 7 state treasurer shall direct the investment of the postsecondary 8 scholarship fund. The state treasurer shall credit to the 9 postsecondary scholarship fund interest and earnings from 10 postsecondary scholarship fund investments.

- 5 Sec. 241b. (1) No later than October 15 each year, each public
- 6 university that receives an appropriation in section 236 shall
