Rep. Gagliardi moved that the bill be given immediate effect.

Reps. Geiger, Voorhees and Jansen, having reserved the right to explain their protest against the passage of the bill, made the following statement:

“Mr. Speaker and members of the House:

I voted against this bill because it is redundant and might actually jeopardize existing programs for children. An infant support services program already exists and served 13,000 at-risk families last year.

The current program allows up to 36 visits from a team of professionals including nurses, nutritionists, social workers, and infant mental health specialists for the families of drug exposed infants.

The sentinel network as described in the bill might actually decrease the number of visits to these families. Requirements for reporting suspected abuse exist already.”

Was read a second time, and the question being on the adoption of the proposed substitute (H-1) previously recommended by the Committee on Judiciary,

The substitute (H-1) was adopted, a majority of the members serving voting therefor.

1. Amend page 4, line 23, after “THIS” by striking out “SECTION” and inserting “SUBSECTION”.

(A) THE SCHOOL OR PLACE OF DAY CARE OF ANY MINOR CHILD OF THE PERSON OR THE PLACE OF AN AFTER-SCHOOL ACTIVITY SPONSORED BY THE CHILD’S SCHOOL.

(B) THE RESIDENCE OF ANY MINOR CHILD OF THE PERSON WHEN THE PERSON IS EXERCISING RIGHTS UNDER A PARENTING TIME OR GRANDPARENTING TIME ORDER.”.

2. Amend page 11, line 22, after “(D)” by inserting “OR THE RESTRICTED LICENSE PRIVILEGE DESCRIBED IN SUBSECTION (13)(B)(ix)”.
