Third Reading of Bills

Senate Bill No. 1021, entitled

A bill to repeal local acts prohibiting or restricting Sunday hunting.

The bill was read a third time.

The question being on the passage of the bill,

Rep. London moved to amend the bill as follows:

1. Amend page 1, following line 5, by striking out the balance of the bill and inserting:

"Enacting section 2. (1) Enacting section 1 does not take effect unless submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of Macomb county and approved by a majority of the electors voting on the question. The question of approval of enacting section 1 may be submitted to the qualified electors of Macomb county at the next regular election to be held not less than 60 days after the effective date of this act, or at a special election called for that purpose by the county board of commissioners of Macomb county. If submitted, the question shall be submitted in substantially the following form:

"Shall enacting section 1 of 1998 Local Act _____, which would repeal 1947 LA 9 and therefore would permit hunting, on Sunday, for game animals and game birds in the county of Macomb, be adopted?

Yes () No ()".

(2) If a majority of the qualified electors voting on the question vote in favor of the adoption of enacting section 1, the repeal of the act to prevent hunting, on Sunday, for game animals and game birds in the county of Macomb, 1947 LA 9, becomes effective 10 days following the certification of the election results.

Enacting section 3. 1939 LA 4 is repealed.

Enacting section 4. (1) Enacting section 3 does not take effect unless submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of St. Clair county and approved by a majority of the electors voting on the question. The question of approval of enacting section 3 shall be submitted to the qualified electors of St. Clair county at the next regular election to be held not less than 60 days after the effective date of this act, or at a special election called for that purpose by the county board of commissioners of St. Clair county. The question shall be submitted in substantially the following form:

"Shall enacting section 3 of 1998 Local Act _____, which would repeal 1939 LA 4 and therefore would permit hunting, on Sunday, with firearms or dogs in the county of St. Clair, be adopted?

Yes () No ()".

(2) If a majority of the qualified electors voting on the question vote in favor of the adoption of enacting section 3, the repeal of 1939 LA 4 becomes effective 10 days following the certification of the election results.".

Rep. Willard moved that consideration of the amendment be postponed temporarily. The motion prevailed.

A resolution honoring Howard Wetters, Sr.

Whereas, Howard Wetters, Sr., born of immigrant parents, came to this country more than 100 years ago from Holland to seek a new and better life and renew his family's history by farming in the rich soils of Michigan's Saginaw Valley. The place they settled was to become Howard's home for the rest of his life. The community they created, the community he nurtured and guided, and the land they farmed were the source of his sustenance and livelihood; and

Whereas, Howard left his home to serve in the Navy during the second World War providing an experience that both broadened his horizons and shaped his understanding of his world and the place he occupied in it. After his return from the war he married Helen Emerson, who along with Howard, worked through difficult and rewarding times to build a home and business. Together they had a son, Howard, Jr., who was graced by being raised on a farm watching the examples set by both his parents; and

Whereas, Howard Wetters worked harder than any man should. He would often work twenty hours a day, day after day, to accomplish his goals. This pace eventually took its toll on his body and led to a life-long battle with arthritis, which from the time he was 38 until his death, made pain his constant companion. Yet throughout those years, it can be said Howard rarely complained about his affliction and despite it still worked harder and longer than most of his peers. Indeed, his only challenge to those who worked around him was "keep up with me." Few could keep the pace he set as an elderly man; and

Whereas, Those who worked for him including a long line of children who grew up in his community, came to work on his farm and learned that fairness, honesty and hard work were virtues which you could use to guide your life. Education was the key to advancement in the world he saw. Indeed, there were many children who came to work on the Wetters farm. When it came time for college they received a generous gift from this man who struggled with dyslexia. He valued the opportunity to help give them what had eluded him, a college education; and

Whereas, Howard Wetters, Sr. spent much of his adult life serving his community as a leader. He was a member of the Brissett School Board, Bay City Lions Club, Masons, Elf Khurafeh Shrine Temple, Post 22 Scout Leader, and the Kawkawlin Community Church Deacon and Trustee, where he demonstrated again and again his defining characteristics of loyalty, fairness and the ability to foster compromise though reason in the most difficult of circumstances; and

Whereas, Howard Wetters, Sr. worked his whole life to foster compromise and build his community in ways that gained him the respect and admiration of those who knew him. At his passing, it was universally said that no one had ever heard anyone speak an ill word about the man he became and the work he pursued. A fitting tribute to a quiet man who avoided the limelight and instead chose to work behind the scenes building solutions to problems others thought intractable; and

Whereas, Howard Wetters, Sr. lived to see many accomplishments of which he was very proud, including, having the Wetters Family Farm designated as a Centennial Farm and seeing his son elected to the Michigan Legislature, an accomplishment his good name and reputation made possible; and

Whereas, Howard Wetters, Sr. was a man of simple gifts, who made the most of both the gifts he was given and the burdens he was forced to bear. It is fitting and proper to remember the words of that old shaker tune "Simple Gifts", which so aptly describe his life and its accomplishments:

"Tis a gift to be simple, tis a gift to be free, Tis a gift to come down where we ought to be, And if we can land in that place just right, We will be in the valley of love and delight.

When true simplicity is gained, To bow and to bend, we will not be ashamed To turn, to turn will be our delight, Till by turning and turning we come down right."

Howard was a simple man who was not ashamed to bow or bend. He served his community throughout his life; and Whereas, We can all benefit and gain insight into our own lives from the examples Howard Wetters, Sr. set in his life, and know that we will have lived well if we can approach his standard of commitment and hard work; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the House of Representatives, That we honor the accomplishments of this man who quietly helped so many and never asked to be recognized or honored for what he had done, and convey that message to his friends, family, and members of his community who loved him most; and be it further

Perhaps nothing better demonstrates this skill than Dorn's decision to travel to China, where he was amazingly lucky enough to travel with Victoria Seaver, a beautiful and accomplished woman. To our amazement Victoria became Dorn's wife and the mother of their four children. Victoria found a uniqueness in Dorn, which she later referred to as the "Bay City sense of humor," which was defined by cynicism and an intolerance of fools. Victoria may have found something else about Dorn attractive during those long nights in China, but since no one else was there to report back that shall remain a mystery; and

Whereas, Dorn's Bay City friends take credit for forging what became his greatest asset, a biting sense of humor. They also deserve credit for sharing in the merciless criticism and attacks that toughened all their souls and helped to make them far more capable of dealing with whatever difficulties life presented. Many of the Bay City friends have grown to adulthood without ever encountering another person as capable of equally withering or accurate fire. Nor have they encountered people so capable of finding and exploiting "holes in their armor" as well as that circle of friends. Some people believe that friends are there to support you in the bad times. These friends did their best to prepare each other for the worst of times, by being tougher on each other than anyone else could be. In that way, they are always with one another in the most difficult of times, even though years and thousands of miles may now separate them; and

Whereas, Dorn has succeeded in applying these considerable skills as a "guerrilla" accountant who comes from a firm people call after the big five have politely declined and everyone else laughs at their request. This niche fits Dorn's personality well and has led him to be uncommonly successful and interested in the game of doing what others say cannot be done; and

Whereas, Much of Dorn's life is typified by doing what others say cannot be done, his accomplishments have been extraordinary. Victoria, a beautiful, loving, and lest we forget rich wife, Jennie, Kyle, Nathan and Hannah, four beautiful and accomplished children, a unique and interesting job, which is also entertaining and fun, provides a steady stream of targets for his warped sense of humor, and the ability and desire to find the time to keep in touch with the old friends who still know his weaknesses best, define what Dorn Dean has become; and

Whereas, Luck has played as great a role in Dorn's success as skill or daring. It is fitting to remember the response Napoleon gave when asked what qualities he sought that made his generals so successful. "Luck" was the one thing he looked for because luck can, on any day, on any battlefield, overwhelm both skill and planning. Given that Dorn spent much of his youth playing war games where he was the general in command, it is fitting that the quality of one of the greatest generals most looked for in his commanders is a quality Dorn has had throughout his life; now therefore, be it

Captained by Speaker Hertel, the Sticks were greatly assisted by the talents of Speaker Harwood, who has a long history of hockey greatness; and

Whereas, Speaker Harwood began preparing for his chance to play for the Capitol Sticks by earning three first-team All-State hockey selections while attending Mt. St. Charles Academy. Speaker Harwood's talents did not go unnoticed, as he was recruited to play for several schools, including the University of Michigan. Graduating from the University of Pennsylvania, University of Miami and Boston College Law School, he went on to earn All-Ivy honors in hockey. Speaker Harwood also attended the New York Islanders training camp where an injury cut short his tryout. He was later inducted into the University of Pennsylvania Hall of Fame for hockey and baseball.
