# SENATE SUBSTITUTE FOR HOUSE BILL NO. 5282

A bill to make appropriations for the department of state police and certain other state purposes for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2001; to provide for the expenditure of those appropriations; to provide for certain reports and the consideration of those reports; to provide for the disposition of other income received by the various state agencies; to provide for the testing of certain persons; to provide for certain emergency powers; and to provide for the powers and duties of certain committees, certain state agencies, and certain employees.

- 17 Payments shall be made for the total amount of the billing by the end of
- 18 the second fiscal quarter.
- 19 Sec. 205. (1) Beginning October 1, a hiring freeze is imposed on
- 20 the state classified civil service. State departments and agencies are
- 21 prohibited from hiring any new full-time state classified civil service
- 22 employees and prohibited from filling any vacant state classified civil
- 23 service positions. This hiring freeze does not apply to internal trans-
- 24 fers of classified employees from 1 position to another within a depart-
- 25 ment or to positions that are funded with 80% or more federal or
- 26 restricted funds.

- 1 (2) The state budget director shall grant exceptions to this hiring
- 2 freeze when the state budget director believes that the hiring freeze

- 3 will result in rendering a state department or agency unable to deliver
- 4 basic services. The state budget director shall report by the fifteenth
- 5 of each month to the chairpersons of the senate and house of representa-
- 6 tives standing committees on appropriations the number of exceptions to
- 7 the hiring freeze approved during the previous month and the justifica-
- 8 tion for the exception.
- 9 Sec. 206. (1) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1,
- 10 there is appropriated an amount not to exceed \$10,000,000.00 for federal
- 11 contingency funds. These funds are not available for expenditure until
- 12 they have been transferred to another line item in this act under
- 13 section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL
- **14** 18.1393.
- 15 (2) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is appro-
- 16 priated an amount not to exceed \$3,500,000.00 for state restricted con-
- 17 tingency funds. These funds are not available for expenditure until they
- 18 have been transferred to another line item in this act under
- 19 section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,
- **20** MCL 18.1393.
- 21 (3) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is appro-
- 22 priated an amount not to exceed \$1,000,000.00 for local contingency
- 23 funds. These funds are not available for expenditure until they have
- 24 been transferred to another line item in this act under section 393(2) of
- 25 the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.
- 26 (4) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is
- 27 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$200,000.00 for private contingency

1 funds. These funds are not available for expenditure until they have

- 2 been transferred to another line item in this act under section 393(2) of
- $\bf 3$  the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.
- 4 Sec. 207. At least 60 days before beginning any effort to privati-
- 5 ze, the department shall submit a complete project plan to the appropri-
- 6 ate senate and house of representatives appropriations subcommittees and
- 7 the senate and house fiscal agencies. The plan shall include the cri-
- 8 teria under which the privatization initiative will be evaluated. The
- 9 evaluation shall be completed and submitted to the appropriate senate and
- 10 house of representatives appropriations subcommittees and the senate and
- 11 house fiscal agencies within 30 months.
- 12 Sec. 208. The department shall continue to pilot the use of the
- 13 Internet to fulfill the reporting requirements of this act. This may
- 14 include transmission of reports via electronic mail to the recipients
- 15 identified for each reporting requirement or it may include placement of
- 16 reports on the Internet or legislative Intranet site. The senate and
- 17 house of representatives appropriations subcommittees and senate and
- 18 house fiscal agencies shall be notified in writing of the Internet or
- 19 Intranet site of any such report. Quarterly, the department shall pro-
- 20 vide a cumulative listing of the reports submitted during the most recent
- 21 3-month period along with the Internet or Intranet site of each report,
- 22 and a list of those reports expected to be transmitted in the following
- 23 quarter.
- 24 Sec. 209. Funds appropriated in part 1 shall not be used for the
- 25 purchase of foreign goods or services, or both, if competitively priced
- 26 and of comparable quality American goods or services, or both, are
- 27 available.

- 1 Sec. 210. The director of each department receiving appropriations
- 2 in part 1 shall take all reasonable steps to ensure businesses in

- 3 deprived and depressed communities compete for and perform contracts to
- 4 provide services or supplies, or both, for the department. The director
- 5 shall strongly encourage firms with which the department contracts to
- 6 subcontract with certified businesses in depressed and deprived communi-
- 7 ties for services or supplies, or both.
- 8 Sec. 211. It is the intent of the legislature that personnel of the
- 9 department who request and are eligible for reimbursement of expenses
- 10 related to the operation of the department be reimbursed from the appro-
- 11 priations provided in this act within 30 days after submitting a request,
- 12 or the eligible personnel shall be paid an additional amount equal to
- 13 0.75% of the payment due. The department shall pay an additional amount
- 14 equal to 0.75% of the payment due for the first month and each succeeding
- 15 month or portion of a month the payment remains past due.
- 16 Sec. 212. Of the state general fund/general purpose revenue appro-
- 17 priated in this act, \$89,533,500.00 represents a state spending increase
- 18 over the amount provided to the department of state police for the fiscal
- 19 year ending September 30, 1994, and may be used to meet state match
- 20 requirements of programs contained in the violent crime control and law
- 21 enforcement act of 1994, Public Law 103-322, 108 Stat. 1796, or successor
- 22 grant programs, so that any additional federal money received supplements
- 23 funding provided to the department of state police in this act.
- 24 Sec. 213. The department is authorized to receive and to expend
- 25 upon receipt any federal or state forfeiture money. Each quarter, the
- 26 department shall notify the state police appropriations subcommittees of

1 the house and senate and the house and senate fiscal agencies of the

- 2 receipt of any federal or state forfeiture money.
- 3 Sec. 214. Any law enforcement entity receiving GF/GP funds from
- 4 this act shall not evaluate an employee or consider an employee for pro-
- 5 motion or assignment on the basis of motor vehicle citations issued.
- 6 Sec. 215. (1) Money appropriated under this act shall be used to
- 7 maintain a sex offenders registry website on the Internet. The website
- 8 shall be capable of being linked to and immediately be accessible from
- 9 the websites of public officials, including legislators. The sex offend-
- 10 ers registry website shall contain a listing of all those persons in the
- 11 state convicted of a sex offense and required to be registered with the
- 12 state under the sex offenders registration act, 1994 PA 295, MCL 28.721
- 13 to 28.732. Persons listed on the sex offenders registry website shall
- 14 have information listed about them including, but not limited to, their
- 15 name, aliases, date of birth, address, physical description, including a
- 16 photograph, and a list of sex offenses of which they were convicted.
- 17 (2) There are sufficient funds appropriated in part 1 for maintain-
- 18 ing the accuracy of the information contained in the sex offender regis-
- 19 try website. The department shall assign sufficient personnel to ensure
- 20 the accuracy and completeness of information concerning each registrant
- 21 on the website by verifying the accuracy of registrants' addresses on a
- 22 regular basis. The department shall vigorously apprehend and prosecute
- 23 those who fail to comply with the sex offenders registration act.
- Sec. 216. (1) It is the intent of the legislature that the depart-
- 25 ment shall not provide any subsidy for contractual services it provides.
- 26 (2) When the department provides contractual services to a local
- 27 unit of government, the department shall be reimbursed for all costs

- 1 incurred in providing the services, including, but not limited to,
- 2 retirement and overtime costs.
- 3 (3) Contractual services provided to an entity other than a local
- 4 unit of government may be provided by department personnel, but only on
- 5 an overtime basis outside the normal work schedule of the personnel.
- **6** (4) This section does not apply to state agencies.
- 7 Sec. 217. In conjunction with the department of transportation, the
- 8 department of state police shall develop plans for the maintenance,
- 9 scheduling, and use of all state-owned aircraft. It is the intent of the
- 10 legislature that these plans maximize the safe and cost-efficient use of
- 11 the state transportation air fleet. The department shall prepare a joint
- 12 report, coordinated by the department of transportation, on the develop-
- 13 ment of these plans.
- 14 Sec. 218. The department shall create and retain copies of reports
- 15 for all money appropriated under part 1.
- 16 Sec. 219. Not later than March 15, 2001 and September 30, 2001, the
- 17 department shall report to the state police appropriations subcommittees
- 18 of the house and senate and the house and senate fiscal agencies. The
- 19 report shall contain the following information regarding the department's
- 20 activities related to casino gaming oversight:
- 21 (a) The amount of money received and expended.
- 22 (b) The nature and structure of the casino gaming oversight unit.
- 23 (c) The positions and classifications of employees assigned.
- 24 (d) The number of full-time and part-time employees and the aggre-
- 25 gate number of FTEs.
- (e) The number of enlisted and civilian positions.

1 (f) The duties and responsibilities of the assigned employees.

- 2 (g) The immediate past position of the enlisted employees assigned.
- 3 Sec. 220. The state police shall collect and computerize the vehi-
- 4 cle identification number of all vehicles that are entered into the state
- 5 accident data collection system and make this and other vehicle informa-
- 6 tion available to the public.

## 7 FIRE MARSHAL

- 8 Sec. 301. (1) The department shall prepare a detailed report and
- 9 deliver it to the senate and house subcommittees on the state police not
- 10 later than May 15, 2001.
- 11 (2) The report shall contain input from a delegate appointed from
- 12 and by the following organizations:
- 13 (a) Michigan fire chiefs association.
- 14 (b) Michigan state fireman's association.
- 15 (c) Michigan firefighter's union.
- 16 (d) Michigan fire service instructors association.
- 17 (e) Michigan fire inspectors society.
- 18 (f) Michigan chapter of the international association of arson
- 19 investigators.
- 20 (3) The report shall contain information about the quality and ade-
- 21 quacy of service from the state fire investigation, education, and train-
- 22 ing under the reorganization of the fire marshal division
- 23 responsibilities. The report shall be based on the performance of the
- 24 fire marshal division in the performance of its fire safety duties during
- 25 the first 6 months of fiscal year 2000-2001.

#### 1 HIGHWAY SAFETY PLANNING

- 2 Sec. 401. In addition to the money appropriated in section 105 and
- 3 section 109, the department may receive and expend state restricted funds
- 4 for the support of the secondary road patrol and traffic accident
- 5 enhanced grants program and training to local units in accordance with
- 6 section 629e of the Michigan vehicle code, 1949 PA 300, MCL 257.629e.
- 7 Expenditures for the support of the secondary road patrol and traffic
- 8 accident enhanced grants and training to local units program shall not
- 9 exceed revenues received.
- 10 Sec. 402. Of the funds appropriated in section 105, a grant of
- 11 \$50,000.00 shall be made to Michigan Technological University to be used
- 12 for a study of the distribution and nature of log truck accidents and the
- 13 characteristics of log trucks and log loads. The findings of this study
- 14 shall be forwarded to the house and senate appropriations committees, the
- 15 house and senate fiscal agencies, and the state budget director.

### 16 CRIMINAL JUSTICE DATA CENTER

- Sec. 501. The money appropriated in section 107 for computer serv-
- 18 ices shall be funded by LEIN user fees sufficient to pay 1/3 of the serv-
- 19 ice and contract maintenance costs of the LEIN mainframe computer
- 20 system.
- 21 Sec. 503. A portion of the funds appropriated in section 107 for
- 22 the criminal justice data center shall be used by the department to
- 23 produce a written report detailing departmental policies regarding access
- 24 to and use of information from the law enforcement information network.
- 25 The report shall include a description of departmental measures to

- 1 protect the security of information in the law enforcement information
- 2 network including safeguards that would prevent unauthorized persons from
- 3 obtaining information from the law enforcement information network. The
- 4 department shall deliver a copy of this report to the senate and house
- 5 appropriations committees no later than April 1, 2001.
- 6 Sec. 504. The criminal justice information systems policy council
- 7 shall encourage members of the law enforcement agencies in the state to
- 8 be sensitive to, and note when necessary, activities or circumstances
- 9 that may suggest the unauthorized access or misuse of information from
- 10 the law enforcement information network. The criminal justice informa-
- 11 tion systems policy council shall advise LEIN auditors, as a part of
- 12 their audit of law enforcement agencies, to investigate in depth all sus-
- 13 pected incidents of improper access or improper use of information from
- 14 the law enforcement information network and determine whether or not
- 15 those incidents were illegal. In those incidents which may be determined
- 16 to be illegal, the executive secretary for the council shall determine
- 17 whether those incidents were of a negligent or criminal nature. When an

### 20 FORENSIC SCIENCES

- 21 Sec. 601. It is the intent of the legislature that the grant to the
- 22 city of Detroit under section 108 be allocated by the city to supplement
- 23 the city's appropriations for the Detroit crime lab and the Detroit
- 24 police special events account. The city of Detroit shall provide a
- 25 report to the department detailing the expenditures made and the services

- 1 provided from the money appropriated for the grant. This report shall be
- 2 forwarded by the department to the house and senate appropriations sub-
- 3 committees on state police, the house and senate fiscal agencies, and the
- 4 state budget director by January 15, 2002.
- 5 Sec. 602. (1) The department shall distribute a copy of the
- 6 department's protocol for retaining and purging DNA analysis samples and
- 7 records to each police agency in this state.
- 8 (2) The department shall report to the house and senate appropria-
- 9 tions subcommittees on state police and the house and senate fiscal agen-
- 10 cies whenever any changes to the department's DNA protocol are made.

### 11 COMMISSION ON LAW ENFORCEMENT STANDARDS

- 12 Sec. 701. The money appropriated to the COLES for maintenance and
- 13 delivery of training to locals is provided in accordance with a state
- 14 reimbursement policy in which 100% of the determined state reimbursement
- 15 rate shall be distributed upon certification by the COLES.
- 16 Sec. 702. The money appropriated in section 109 for community
- 17 policing coordination shall be used by the department to work in conjunc-
- 18 tion with local criminal justice agencies to implement and update an
- 19 appropriate curriculum to support community policing. The department
- 20 shall work as a coordinator to deliver community policing training.
- 21 Sec. 703. From the appropriations in section 109 for the training
- 22 of new Michigan state troopers, other new police officers in the state,
- 23 and the continuing education of all law enforcement officers in the
- 24 state, sufficient funds shall be used for the purpose of including
- 25 curricula on the content and application of federal firearms laws,

1 including the procedures necessary for law enforcement to use to turn

- 2 appropriate cases over to the federal bureau of alcohol, tobacco and
- 3 firearms.

#### 4 EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

- 5 Sec. 801. (1) The state director of emergency management may expend
- 6 money appropriated under this act to call upon any agency or department
- 7 of the state or any resource of the state to protect life or property or
- 8 to provide for the health or safety of the population in any area of the
- 9 state in which the governor proclaims a state of emergency or state of
- 10 disaster under 1945 PA 302, MCL 10.31 to 10.33, or under the emergency
- 11 management act, 1976 PA 390, MCL 30.401 to 30.420. The state director of
- 12 emergency management may expend the amounts the director considers neces-
- 13 sary to accomplish these purposes. The director shall submit to the
- 14 state budget director as soon as possible a complete report of all
- 15 actions taken under the authority of this section. The report shall con-
- 16 tain, as a separate item, a statement of all money expended that is not
- 17 reimbursable from federal money. The state budget director shall review
- 18 the expenditures and submit recommendations to the legislature in regard
- 19 to any possible need for a supplemental appropriation.
- 20 (2) In addition to the money appropriated in this act, the depart-
- 21 ment may receive and expend money from local, private, federal, or state
- 22 sources for the purpose of providing emergency management training to
- 23 local or private interests and for the purpose of supporting emergency
- 24 preparedness, response, recovery, and mitigation activity.

#### 1 UNIFORM SERVICES

- 2 Sec. 901. The department shall not expend any portion of the money
- 3 appropriated in this act, including any expenditure made under an execu-
- 4 tive order, to plan for or to implement a roadblock or check lane system
- 5 that has as its primary objective the deterrence or detection of intoxi-
- 6 cated drivers in this state.
- 7 Sec. 902. It is the intent of the legislature that the department
- 8 maintain the maximum number of troopers on the road from the available
- 9 money appropriated in this act.
- 10 Sec. 903. State police enlisted personnel who are employed to
- 11 enforce traffic laws as provided in section 629e of the Michigan vehicle
- 12 code, 1949 PA 300, MCL 257.629e, shall not be prohibited from responding
- 13 to crimes in progress or other emergency situations, and are responsible
- 14 for protecting every citizen of this state from harm.

Sec. 905. Of the funds appropriated in section 112 for reimbursed services, no less than \$500.000.00 shall be used for construction zone traffic law enforcement.

### 15 SPECIAL OPERATIONS

- 16 Sec. 1001. (1) Money appropriated under section 113 for the
- 17 Michigan public safety communications system shall be expended upon
- 18 approval of an expenditure plan by the state budget director.
- 19 (2) The department of state police shall assess all subscribers of
- 20 the Michigan public safety communications system reasonable access and
- 21 maintenance fees.
- 22 (3) All money received by the department of state police under this
- 23 section shall be deposited to the state general fund pursuant to section
- 24 443 of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1443.

- 26
- 1 (4) The department of state police shall provide a report to the
- 2 house and senate appropriations committees, house and senate fiscal
- 3 agencies, and the state budget director on April 15, 2001, and on October
- 4 15, 2001, indicating the amount of revenue collected under this section
- 5 and deposited to the state general fund for the immediately preceding
- 6 6-month period.
- 7 Sec. 1002. In addition to the appropriations in section 113 to the
- 8 department of state police for the aviation program, the department is
- 9 authorized to sell its aircraft and the proceeds from the sale are appro-
- 10 priated and may be applied to the renovation cost of replacement
- 11 aircraft.

### 12 CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS

- 13 Sec. 1101. (1) There is sufficient money appropriated in
- 14 section 114 to criminal investigations to ensure that the citizens in a
- 15 service area of any state police post in the vicinity of a state prison
- 16 do not experience a downgrading of state police services in their area.
- 17 Criminal investigations shall be available by temporary or permanent
- 18 assignment of a detective when either a temporary or permanent prison
- 19 facility is opened.
- 20 (2) If the department is unable to comply with subsection (1) and
- 21 there is a prison scheduled to open, the department shall provide troop-
- 22 ers to serve as investigators on an interim basis.
- 23 Sec. 1102. In addition to the money appropriated in part 1, the
- 24 department may receive and expend state restricted funds for the support
- 25 of the private security guard licensure program. Expenditures for the

- 27
- 1 support of the private security guard licensure program shall not exceed
- 2 revenues received.
- 3 Sec. 1103. From the appropriations in section 114 for criminal
- 4 investigations, \$300,000.00 shall be used for grants to counties with a
- 5 population in excess of 450,000 that have an Internet/computer crimes
- 6 unit that was in effect as of January 1, 1999. A grant under this sec-
- 7 tion is for investigative employees only, and an investigative employee
- 8 must be certified as a police officer by the Michigan commission on law
- 9 enforcement standards. To receive a grant under this section, a county
- 10 is required to make a 25% match and must work in cooperation with the
- 11 Michigan state police computer crime unit. A county shall not receive
- 12 funding for more than 1 investigator under this grant program.

#### 13 MOTOR CARRIER ENFORCEMENT

- 14 Sec. 1201. The appropriation in section 115 for school bus inspec-
- 15 tions shall be used by the department of state police to inspect each
- 16 school bus and pupil transportation vehicle annually, as required under
- 17 section 715a of the Michigan vehicle code, 1949 PA 300, MCL 257.715a, and
- 18 section 39 of the pupil transportation act, 1990 PA 187, MCL 257.1839.
- 19 The department shall award a certificate to a school system if the
- 20 system's school buses all received a 100% successful state inspection
- 21 upon the first inspection in a given year.

#### 1 CENTRAL RECORDS

2 Sec. 1301. Of the funds appropriated in section 106, there are suf-3 ficient funds for the department to gather and report statistical infor-4 mation on applications for pistol purchases in the state during fiscal 5 year 2000-2001. A report shall be produced that will include a statisti-6 cal sampling of several hundred applications in the state from a variety 7 of jurisdictions, including those from both rural and urban areas of the 8 state. The data collected shall include the number of background checks 9 performed, the number of persons failing background checks according to 10 various state and federal regulations, and the specific reason for each

11 of the pistol purchases denied. The report shall be delivered to the

13 tary and veterans affairs no later than November 15, 2001.
