A bill to make, supplement, and adjust appropriations for capital outlay, the department of agriculture, the department of environmental quality, the department of natural resources, the department of treasury, the department of community health, the department of transportation, and the department of consumer and industry services for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2001; to implement the appropriations within the budgetary process; to provide for the expenditure of appropriations; and to repeal acts and parts of acts.

10 Sec. 202. The expenditures and funding sources authorized under
11 this act are subject to the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,
12 MCL 18.1101 to 18.1594.

13 CAPITAL OUTLAY

14 Sec. 301. The department of natural resources shall require local
15 units of government to enter into agreements with the department for the
16 purpose of administering the natural resources trust fund grants identi-
17 fied in section 102. Among other provisions, the agreements shall
18 require that grant recipients agree to dedicate to public outdoor recre-
19 ation uses in perpetuity the land acquired or developed; to replace lands
20 converted or lost to other than public outdoor recreation use; and, for
21 parcels acquired that are 5 or more acres in size, to provide the state
22 with a nonparticipating 1/6 minimum royalty interest in any acquired min-
23 erals that are retained by the grant recipient. The agreements shall
24 also provide that the full payments of grants can be made only after
25 proof of acquisition, or completion of the development project, is

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1 submitted by the grant recipient and all costs are verified by the
2 department of natural resources.

3 Sec. 302. Any unobligated balance in any natural resources trust
4 fund appropriation made under section 102 shall not revert to the fund

1 COMMUNITY HEALTH

2 Sec. 350. (1) Effective January 1, 2001, it is the intent of the
3 legislature that an elder prescription insurance coverage program will be
4 established, referred to in this section as the EPIC program. The guid-
5 ing principles of this program are all of the following:

6 (a) To enhance access to prescription medications for low-income
7 elderly residents of this state.

8 (b) To make that access meaningful by reducing the cost to senior
9 citizens to obtain prescription medications.

10 (c) To assist the elderly in understanding how prescription medica-
11 tions can be beneficial in treating diseases, illnesses, and conditions
12 that are more prevalent in the aged.

13 (d) To provide the means by which those persons who prescribe and
14 dispense prescription medications for the elderly are better able to rec-
15 ognize those prescription situations in which combinations of new or
16 existing drugs, or other factors, could result in an adverse drug inter-
17 action in an elderly person.

18 (e) The program developed pursuant to this section is not an enti-
19 tlement and benefits are limited to the level supported by the funding
20 explicitly appropriated in this act or subsequent acts.

21 (f) Emergency prescription assistance shall continue to be available
22 through the program.

23 (2) In furthering these guiding principles, the operation parameters
24 of the EPIC program shall include at least all of the following:

25 (a) Limiting eligibility to Michigan residents who are over the age
26 of 64, who have household incomes at or below 200% of poverty, and who
27 are not eligible for Medicaid.

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1 (b) Establishing variable copayment rates, which in total shall be
2 not more than 5% of the person's annual household income if household
3 income is 200% of poverty and shall be zero if household income is 100%
4 or less of poverty.

5 (c) A mechanism, such as limiting the number of policies sold, to
6 ensure that expenditures do not exceed available revenue.

7 (3) The EPIC program shall not be implemented until after an auto-
8 mated pharmacy claims adjudication and prospective drug utilization
9 review system is operational.

10 (4) The Michigan emergency pharmaceutical program for seniors shall
11 be continued until the EPIC program is fully implemented.

12 Sec. 351. From the funds appropriated in section 104 for lead
13 abatement, up to \$1,500,000.00 shall be used for lead abatement activi-
14 ties statewide, including Wayne County.

15 **ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY**

16 Sec. 601. (1) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1 for

8 in this section.

9 (4) To the extent authorized under 1998 PA 288, unexpended and unen-

11 initiative fund contained in 1999 PA 111 and 2000 PA 52 are appropriated

[Sec. 606. By March 1 of each year, the department of environmental quality shall submit to the senate and house of representatives appropriations committees and the standing committees of the senate and house of representatives with jurisdiction over issues primarily pertaining to natural resources and the environment, a report on the expenditure of the proceeds of bonds issued under the clean Michigan initiative act, 1998 PA 284, MCL 324.95101 to 324.95108. The department shall submit the report beginning in the year 2001 and every year thereafter until all bond proceeds have been expended. The report shall provide information related to expenditures during the previous fiscal year and over the cumulative life of the bond. Information related to expenditures shall include, but are not limited to, all of the following:

- (a) The amount of bonds sold.
- (b) The amount of bond proceeds expended.
- (c) The number of and locations of sites in which bond proceeds have been expended.
- (d) The human health and environmental impacts that have been mitigated by the expenditure of bond funds including, but not limited to:
 - (i) Amount of contaminated sediment remediated.
 - (ii) Number of illicit storm sewer connections identified and corrected.
 - (iii) Number of stream and road crossings stabilized to control

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nonpoint source pollution.

(iv) Number of miles of shoreline stabilized or buffered to control nonpoint source pollution.

(v) Number of abandoned wells identified and plugged.

(vi) Number and type of actions taken to implement lakewide management plans (R324.8904), remedial action plans (R324.8905), approved watershed management plans (R324.8902).

(vii) Number of cleaned up sites of environmental contamination having imminent and substantial endangerment to human health or the environment.

(e) The implementation of and results from the monitoring program conducted to achieve the goals stated in "A Strategic Environmental Quality Monitoring Program for Michigan's Surface Waters" as required under section 8807(4)(a) of part 88 of the natural resources and environmental protection act. The report shall include a discussion of annual monitoring results as well as trends over time.

(f) The brownfield properties that have been redeveloped by the expenditure of bond funds, including, but not limited to:

(i) Number of corrective actions undertaken by the department to address releases from leaking underground storage tanks pursuant to part 213.

(ii) The number of response activities undertaken by the department at facilities pursuant to part 201 to promote redevelopment.

(iii) The number of assessment activities undertaken to determine whether the property is a facility.

(iv) The number of grants provided to local units of governments and brownfield redevelopment authorities created under the brownfield redevelopment financing act, 1996 PA 381, MCL 125.2651 to 125.2672, for response activities at known or suspected facilities with redevelopment potential.

(v) The acres of brownfields remediated.

(vi) The acres of former brownfields that have been redeveloped and are now being used for other purposes.]

1 NATURAL RESOURCES

2 Sec. 701. The appropriation in part 1 for local recreation grants
3 shall be allocated and awarded in accordance with part 716 of the natural
4 resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.71601 to
5 324.71607.

6 Sec. 702. The unexpended portion of the appropriation in part 1 for
7 local recreation grants is considered a work project appropriation. The
8 purpose of these grants is to provide funding to local governmental units
9 for local recreation capital improvement projects including the construc-
10 tion, expansion, development, or rehabilitation of recreational
11 facilities. The estimated cost is \$14,733,800.00, with an estimated com-
12 pletion date of September 30, 2005.

2 Sec. 801. (1) The \$10,000,000.00 appropriated in section 111 of
3 2000 PA 276 is from the tobacco settlement trust fund to fund an incen-
4 tive program for the Michigan education savings program created under the
5 Michigan education savings program act, 2000 PA 161, MCL 390.1471 to
6 390.1486.

7 (2) The funds appropriated for the Michigan education savings pro-
8 gram shall be utilized to provide a state match to dollars invested on
9 behalf of each child named as a designated beneficiary in the Michigan
10 education savings program who is 6 years old or less [, who is a Michigan
resident] and whose family's
11 income is \$80,000.00 or less.

12 (3) During fiscal year 2001, the state shall provide \$1.00 of match-
