The expenditures and grants apparently have been made from money that is supposed to go to administrative functions. News of these grants has angered hunting and fishing organizations. It has also upset members of Congress, who are now investigating the legality of numerous grants from the USFWS; and

Whereas, The legitimate programs funded through the Pittman-Robertson Act and the Dingell-Johnson Act are an example of the best in public-private cooperation. Any actions of a governmental agency that jeopardize the trust these acts have represented over the years must be fully and vigorously investigated; now, therefore, be it
