“Mr. Speaker and members of the House:

I voted no on the conference report for SB 237, the appropriations bill for the Department of Military and Veterans Affairs because of the lack of adequate funding for the Grand Rapids and D.J. Jacobetti veterans homes. While the homes received a minuscule increase in state funding, it is by no means sufficient. In part, the sacrifices these individuals made are a prime reason we enjoy the freedom today we do. To give them a token increase in state funding is a disservice, and does not give them the respect they deserve.”

Reps. Adamini and Bogardus, having reserved the right to explain their nay vote, made the following statement:  
 “Mr. Speaker and members of the House:

I voted no on the passage of this appropriation bill because on the last session day before Memorial Day when a large number of veterans were present in the Chamber, this body, with great fanfare, rejected proposed cuts in funding for the state veteran’s homes in Grand Rapids and Marquette as suggested in the Governor’s revised budget recommendation. This action was greatly appreciated by those veterans who were present. Later, after those same veterans returned home satisfied with the work we had done, we now strip away those increases that we so dramatically granted. This is a stab in the back to those who gave so much for their country and state. If we can’t keep our word to veterans, who can we trust?”

The House agreed to the title of the bill.  
Rep. Patterson moved that the bill be given immediate effect.

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Rep. Gosselin, having reserved the right to explain his protest against the passage of the bill, made the following statement:

“Mr. Speaker and members of the House:

David Boaz executive vice president of the Cato Institute in Washington gave the following explanation of why arts and government don't mix:

‘Discussions of policy issues should begin with first principles. As my colleague Ed Crane notes, there are only two basic ways to organize society: coercively, through government dictates, or voluntarily, through the myriad interactions among individuals and private associations. All the various political ‘isms’—fascism, communism, conservatism, liberalism, neoconservatism—boil down to a single question. The bottom line of political philosophy, and therefore of politics itself, is ‘Who is going to make the decision about this particular aspect of your life, you or somebody else?’

‘No matter what the philosophical debate, keep your eye on the bottom line: Politics is about the individual's relationship to the state, pure and simple.’

‘In a civil society you make the choices about your life. In a political society someone else makes those choices. And because it is not the natural order of things for someone other than you to make those decisions about your life, the political society is of necessity based on coercion.’

‘The American Founders understood this. That's why they declared, ‘All men are endowed by their creator with certain unalienable rights, that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness,’ and why they wrote a Constitution that granted the federal government only a few enumerated and limited powers.’

‘Today, however, the federal Leviathan concerns itself with every nook and cranny of our lives, and the arts have not escaped its tender, stifling embrace.’

‘Art establishes the basic human truths which must serve as the touchstones of our judgment. The artist, however faithful to his personal vision of reality, becomes the last champion of the individual mind and sensibility against an intrusive society and an officious state.’

‘It is precisely because art has power, because it deals with basic human truths, that it must be kept separate from government. Government, as I noted earlier, involves the organization of coercion. In a free society coercion should be reserved only for such essential functions of government as protecting rights and punishing criminals. People should not be forced to contribute money to artistic endeavors that they may not approve, nor should artists be forced to trim their sails to meet government standards.’

‘The American Founders knew that the solution was the separation of church and state. Because art is just as spiritual, just as meaningful, just as powerful as religion, it is time to grant art the same independence and respect that religion has. It is time to establish the separation of art and state’ .”

“Mr. Speaker and members of the House:

“Mr. Speaker and members of the House:

Public funding of arts is unfair to taxpayers, and bad for the arts. Former Detroit News editor Tom Bray gave some good reasons why this is true in a op-ed on an Oakland Arts tax last fall. He wrote:

. . . it has never been clear why taxpayers should subsidize the fine arts. To the extent they feel the DIA is important to them, for example, they are free to make voluntary contributions. If they would rather spend the money in a casino or on a rock concert, why shouldn't they have that right? Opera isn't everybody's taste.

Probably the best argument for a public subsidy is that it would further the education of our children. To the extent that's true, though, one wonders why the money doesn't come directly from school budgets. If schools are unwilling to adjust their priorities to make this possible—say, by reducing the football program—then maybe we should be asking some hard questions about education policy.

(If this money) were left in the private sector, it might be spent or aggregated in ways that are even more beneficial to the community—including on cultural events that more closely match people's personal interests. It's a fallacy to think money can only be put to constructive public use if it's aggregated through the political process.

The cultural tax idea got its start in 1991 when the state, then facing a large budget deficit, sharply cut its funding for the arts. Such cities as Chicago, St. Louis and Denver levy a cultural tax. Why not Detroit?

But the broader message of the 1991 debacle may be that it's dangerous for cultural institutions to get too dependent on government funding. If such funding is to occur, it should come from the local level, where accountability is likely to be strongest. Still, there are reasons to wonder if taxpayer money would sap the arts of the dynamic energy they receive from having to compete for the cultural dollar in the marketplace.”

“Mr. Speaker and members of the House:

Public funding of arts is unfair to taxpayers, and bad for the arts.

Tax dollars for government arts and culture spending takes from the poor and gives to the rich—it’s a ‘reverse Robin Hood’ effect. This is because the wealthy are more likely to be patrons of the programs subsidized by tax dollars. For the same reason, this hurts seniors on fixed incomes.

Government arts funding is elitist. Some would rather see a rock concert than an opera—why should they have to pay for the opera? Yet government subsidizes opera—not rock.

Then there is the moral question of who should decide how an individual’s money is spent—the individual or the government? The answer is clear: Let the individual decide. Some would rather give the money to a charity or their church. Using tax dollars for arts subsidies takes away that choice.

Government arts subsidies are subject to abuse, and often fund objectionable art. Past examples of so-called ‘art’ are displays of a Crucifix in a jar of urine, or the Virgin Mary covered with dung. You want to see that? Fine—pay for it yourself. But not with tax dollars. It’s a free country, no one says this ‘art’ can’t be shown—but taxpayers should not have to subsidize it.

The specific objection with this legislation is that it creates a new state Arts Department. The inevitable result will be to create a concentrated source of pressure for increased arts spending. Right now, arts spending is spread around many departments, and no one agency has an overwhelming incentive to push for more subsidies. That will change with this new department. We know what happens with new government departments—they just get bigger. Art subsidies are not a vital government function. Republican legislators in particular should oppose this new department. You all ran for election with promises to reduce government and cut taxes. This legislation will have the opposite effect.”

There are important matters that deal with morality and the principles of constitutional government that come into play on the issue of government funding for the arts. David Boaz executive vice president of the Cato Institute in Washington gave the following explanation of what this means:

‘If individual rights and social peace are furthered by putting religion beyond government’s reach, this has implications for art, which—like religion—expresses, transmits, and challenges our deepest values. As the managing director of Baltimore’s Center Stage put it, ‘Art has power. It has the power to sustain, to heal, to humanize . . . to change something in you.’ Because art is so powerful, we dare not entangle it with coercive government power. That means no censorship or regulation of art.’

‘It also means no tax subsidies for arts and artists, for when government gets into the arts funding business, we get political conflicts: Conservatives denounce the National Endowment for the Arts for funding erotic photography and the Public Broadcasting System for broadcasting Tales of the City, which has gay characters. Civil rights activists make the Library of Congress take down an exhibit on antebellum slave life, and veterans’ groups pressure the Smithsonian to remove a display on the bombing of Hiroshima. To avoid political battles over how to spend the taxpayers’ money, to keep art and its power in the realm of persuasion, we would all be well advised to establish the separation of art and state.’”

We spent money as fast as it came in, and paid no heed to any notion suggesting that revenue intake could slow down. But, the money did run out, and we now spend our days in legislative battles regarding where to cut, how much to cut, and even how to use deficit financing so as to put off the problem to another day. If there were to be any benefit to come from this experience, it would have been that we had learned a lesson regarding the potential for government spending to spiral wildly out of control. This bill clearly demonstrates that this government has no capacity for learning from its mistakes.

In any other financial setting, a dramatic drop in revenue would precipitate the prudent elimination of unnecessary activities and purchases. Times are tight in Michigan. Families are canceling vacations. The recreational departments of their lives are being eliminated. A decade ago, facing similar economic challenges, the state wisely cut arts and culture funding.

However, against all logic, we have chosen this moment to protect these programs within their own new department. When a future legislature runs short on cash, there will be a brand new mouth demanding to be fed. This new branch of government that we create for tomorrow is precisely the sort of bureaucracy that we should be eliminating today.

We have learned nothing from our present fiscal challenge. Our priorities remain abysmal, and we invite future failure.”

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House:

The Mackinac Center has done some excellent work on why government and arts don't mix. Here is some of what they have learned:

Art subsidy supporters often argue that public funding of the arts is needed to support artists and art patrons who would otherwise not have the resources to enjoy art. The truth is evidence suggests that government art subsidies flow from the poor and middle classes to wealthier citizens, and not vice versa. Consider just one example.

In 1998, the State of Michigan appropriated over \$21 million for 'arts and cultural affairs.' The money was distributed to 38 of Michigan's 83 counties, according to Michigan Council for Arts and Cultural Affairs documents obtained by Michigan Privatization Report. Of the initial 38 grant recipients, the county of Alpena received the smallest grant of \$2,500. The largest grant, a hefty \$12,944,237 (or 61% of the total) went to Wayne County.

One result of this grant process is that wealth is often taxed from lower-income Michigan workers and families and given for the enjoyment of higher-income workers and families. Wayne County, for example, has a population of 2,127,000 and a per-capita income of \$22,900. Alpena, in contrast, has a population of 30,638 and a per-capita income of \$20,000. As a ratio of grant funds to population, Wayne County received back from the state \$6.09 per citizen while Alpena will get back only \$0.80 per citizen.

Supporters of government art subsidies should explain why it makes sense to tax people who do not voluntarily patronize the Detroit Symphony Orchestra (DSO) for the purposes of subsidizing those who do patronize the DSO.

Art and culture are too important to be left to the whims of politics. Michigan should rebuild the wall of separation between art and state by eliminating state funding of the arts."

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Rep. Gosselin, having reserved the right to explain his protest against the passage of the bill, made the following statement:

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House:

We should not create a centralized 'Ministry of Art and Culture' because Michigan has gotten along just fine without such a ministry in the past. Michigan can boast of a many great authors and artists who made their way without a special government arts department. They include Nobel Prize-winning novelist Ernest Hemingway, Pulitzer Prize-winning poet Theodore Roethke, the late blues musician John Lee Hooker, and many, many others. As Hemingway himself noted, writers 'have to do it alone.' He believed that an author who relied on the state of advance his career might 'get to be an ambassador or have a million copies of his book printed by the government,' but he betrays his craft. Historian Burton Folsom, formerly of the Mackinac Center for Public Policy in Midland, gave some important reasons to oppose government arts funding: 'Art is an inherently private enterprise. Good art, music, and literature portray human emotions in such a way that people understand themselves and their lives in new and better ways. To do this, an artist must communicate effectively with an audience, and only the consumers of the art can really measure whether this communication has taken place. 'Government subsidies break the connection between artist and consumer. Instead, politicians, their appointees, or an arts elite decide what art forms and what artists will be given money and which ones will not. These select few, not the public, become the judge of whether effective communication has taken place, will take place, or should take place between artists and audience.' Government should not spend public money to support some peoples' private tastes. Tax money collected is taken from everyone, but the appeal of museums, concerts, and symphonies is mainly to college graduates and the wealthy. Economist Paul Samuelson calls art subsidies highbrow pork barrel, a transfer of income from blue collar to white collar workers, and from farms to cities. 'Art funded by taxpayers is divisive, politicized, and inevitably unbalanced within the state. In the past, more 'arts' money has gone to the Detroit Police Crime Lab than to the symphonies of Grand Rapids, Lansing, and Kalamazoo combined. In the past, more has gone to the Detroit Zoo and the Detroit Police Special Events Division—which has little or nothing to do with art—than to 78 of Michigan's 83 counties. Almost half the counties in the state receive no arts subsidy at all; they only pay taxes to subsidize art for other counties. Such controversial spending has angered critics for many years. Just because something is 'good' doesn't mean that it must be supported by government. The arts are very important to the lives of our citizens, but they belong within the domain of voluntary individual and social action, not the domain of politics. The state should end its involvement in our citizens' personal tastes and cultural affairs, not expand its reach."

Reps. Spade, Zelenko, Murphy, Adamini, Reeves, Whitmer and Gielegem, having reserved the right to explain their nay vote, made the following statement:

“Mr. Speaker and members of the House:

I voted no on concurring in the Senate’s changes to House Bill 4965 for a number of reasons, including the definition of “county breaks” contained in the bill.

We have heard from the Republicans repeatedly how ‘fair,’ ‘neutral’ and ‘nonpartisan’ the so-called Apol criteria are. The Republicans have claimed that the Apol criteria are ‘mechanical’ in their application and not subject to partisan manipulation. If all these things are true, why have the Republican changed their definition of ‘county breaks’ under the Apol criteria at least 3 times? Is there not only one immutable nonpartisan definition?

In 1992 the Republicans argued to the Michigan Supreme Court that “county breaks” are defined by how many districts break county lines. If another definition or no definition suited their partisan purposes, as it did in 1992 and 1996, respectively, I have no doubt that that definition or that no definition would have been included in the bill.

This repeated changing of the rules and definitions belies any claim that the Republicans are using fair, neutral or nonpartisan criteria. The rules and definitions are being manipulated by the Republicans for partisan advantage.”

“Mr. Speaker and members of the House:

Shamefully, the abuse of power by the Republicans in this process comes at a high cost to the people of the state of Michigan, who deserve to have a legitimate, representational system of government and a voice in the workings of it.”

Rep. Thomas, having reserved the right to explain his nay vote, made the following statement:

“Mr. Speaker and members of the House:

I voted no on concurring in the Senate’s changes to House Bill 4965 because of its failure to disclose whether and how it complies with all the guidelines of 1996 PA 463.

Sections 1 and 1A of PA 463 contain 13 guidelines for state legislative redistricting. Unlike the Congressional Redistricting Act, PA 463 does not prioritize the guidelines—all of them are equally important and all of them must be considered when evaluating a redistricting plan. The bill fails to disclose how or even whether its redistricting plans for the State House and Senate comply with all of the guidelines in PA 463. Instead, the bill selectively discloses only a few measurements under the PA 463 guidelines.

The silence of the bill as to all of the other guidelines is revealing. If the plans comply with all of the guidelines of PA 463, why does not the bill so state? We know that the Richner Plan contained in House Bill 4965 as it passed the House last week failed miserably to comply with PA 463's guidelines of equalization of population between districts and compactness. It is no surprise then that it's supporters such as Representative Patterson were very selective in their use of guidelines to evaluate the Richner Plan. They ignored the several guidelines the Richner Plan failed to satisfy. Without full disclosure of all the guidelines, how do we know that this bill is not worse than last week's bill? Without full disclosure of all the guidelines, one cannot know whether the bill complies with PA 463."

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House:

The abuse of power by the republicans in this process comes at a high cost to the people of the state of Michigan, who deserve to have a legitimate, representational system of government and a voice in the workings of it.

Lastly, it is wrong that the republicans excluded the public out of the process. It is not known why the process was accelerated from the time frame that had been told the members of the chambers by the Republican leadership.”

Rep. Richner, having reserved the right to explain his nay vote, made the following statement:

“Mr. Speaker and members of the House:

As the sponsor of House Bill 4965 it is my intention to adopt a redistricting plan that satisfies the Apol criteria, federal and state constitutions, the Voting Rights Act and all other applicable law.

The plan before us today consists of 110 single member House districts and 38 Senate districts. The Senate has amended House Bill 4965 as originally passed by this Chamber. I urge members to NOT concur in the Senate amendments and allow House Bill 4965 to be referred to conference committee for further deliberation and reconciliation of the two versions of this legislation.

The Apol criteria were codified in a statute (1996 PA 463 as amended by 1999 PA 223). These Apol criteria provide us a statutory mechanical framework by which the plan is to be drawn. These criteria were designed to prevent political gerrymandering. The statute also requires compliance with Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act. I am pleased that this body has proceeded in an open and bi-partisan fashion. We have followed the recognized legislative process, had thoughtful and vigorous debate and even adopted bi-partisan amendments. I am confident that all interested parties can continue to work together as this bill moves through the conference committee.

I urge my colleagues to vote NO on the Senate substitute for House Bill 4965.”

Rep. Lipsey, having reserved the right to explain his nay vote, made the following statement:

“Mr. Speaker and members of the House:

I voted no on concurring in the Senate’s changes to House Bill 4965 because the redistricting plan for the Michigan House of Representatives set forth in this bill is an unfair and politically gerrymandered plan, and because it does not comply with the requirements of state and federal law.

As the Republicans have hurriedly maneuvered their house and Senate redistricting plans through the Legislature in the past week, their interpretations of key criteria in our state redistricting statute have been moving targets. When HB 4965 was before the House last week, Democrats offered an H-1 substitute that should have been passed by the full House because it was, and remains, the best plan that has been put before the Legislature to date.

Nevertheless, as of Tuesday, June 21, the majority party of this Legislature added its own, select interpretations of certain criteria from MCL 4.261 to the text of HB 4965(S-1). In response, Democrats today offered a floor amendment to HB 4965 that would have made use of the specific definitions of criteria now included in Section 4 of the bill to create a House redistricting plan that again beats Republican plan in HB 4965(S-1) in all ways. The Republicans defeated that amendment in partisan lockstep.

The House redistricting plan contained in today’s Democratic floor amendment would meet the criteria set forth in MCL 4.261 better and more strictly than does the House plan in HB 4965(S-1). It must also be noted that Michigan statute—not to mention federal law—also sets forth a number of additional criteria that the Republicans neglected to mention in describing their plan. But again, the House plan set forth in today’s Democratic amendment is superior to the Republican plan in HB 4965(S-1) in all these other regards.

Instead, by today rejecting yet another fair, neutral, and legally compliant plan, the Republicans have again demonstrated that their guiding intent in this process has been to draw a politically gerrymandered plan to protect their own political self interest.

In fact, the Republican plan splits Kalamazoo township into two districts while adding Oshtemo township to the 60th District.

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Rep. Patterson moved that House Committees be given leave to meet during the balance of today’s session. The motion prevailed.

Whereas, We join with the family, friends, students, and fans of Harold McKinney in honoring his life. He was a talented and energetic composer, performer, and educator of the American art form of jazz; and

Whereas, Harold McKinney brought more than hard work and readiness to each performance. His inextinguishable energy and will to promote the knowledge of jazz, in all of its styles, was as impressive as his composing and performance skills; and

Whereas, Harold Walton McKinney was born in Detroit on July 4, 1928, to Bessie Walton McKinney and Clarence Howard McKinney. He credited his mother with introducing him to music. In his youth, he began to play be-bop and classical music. After graduating from Northwestern High School, he attended Morehouse College in Atlanta. Harold McKinney didn't like Morehouse College's bias toward European music, so he returned to Detroit and fully embraced the jazz scene. He studied briefly at Wayne State University and served in the Army in Germany during the early 1950's. While in the Army, he began writing music and became director of a 14 to 16 piece jazz band; and

Whereas, Jazz was the motivating core of Harold McKinney's life. Knowledgeable about all styles of jazz going back to ragtime, he performed and composed electrifying pieces. He held his audiences spellbound with tales from jazz history, many of which he had personally witnessed. Harold McKinney led workshops for young people desiring to be jazz musicians and for those who wanted to be introduced to such music. He recorded with such musicians as Paul Winter, Kenny Burrell, John Coltrane, Wes Montgomery, Gene Krupa, and Carmen McCrae. He produced and played for the Montreux Detroit Jazz Festival, which is now the Detroit International Jazz Festival. He conducted jazz workshops as far away as Dakar, Senegal. In 1990, Harold McKinney received the Jazz Master Award for lifetime achievement from Arts Midwest. In 1995, he toured Africa and the Middle East with a band called the Michigan Jazz Masters, which included other Arts Midwest honorees such as Marcus Belgrave, Teddy Harris Jr., Roy Brooks, and Wendell Harrison. His poise under the pressure of a full schedule serves as an example to all young people struggling for recognition in any field of endeavor; and

Whereas, Harold McKinney was hospitalized, in late May of this year, after a stroke. Just a short week later, he managed to lead his weekly jazz workshop at the SereNgeti Ballroom in Detroit. On June 10th, he gave his final performance at his semiannual "Jam & Bread" student showcase. A day later, he suffered the first of another series of strokes and was in need of surgery. After this episode, he never regained consciousness and died Wednesday night, June 20th, at Henry Ford Hospital at the age of 72. Harold Walton McKinney was the beloved husband of Jahra Michelle McKinney and proud father of daughters Maia, Sienna, Jore, and drummer Gayelynn McKinney. Besides his daughter, Gayelynn, Harold McKinney's talented musical family includes, his brother, euphonium player Kiane Zawadi (born Bernard McKinney) and his nephew, pianist Carlos McKinney. Harold McKinney lived life to the fullest, and was heard to say, "The older I grow, the more I know that, yeah, if I do not live another day, I have had a very blessed life.". He also blessed the lives of those he touched with his magic and his gifts; now, therefore, be it

The cuts are drastic and unnecessary. One should note that the budget as originally drafted generated a \$96.6 million surplus next year. There are many reasons I can not support this budget, but the cuts targeted to Muskegon are the main ones. The early education cuts are devastating to Muskegon - 125 children in our community will not have access to Head Start because the Republicans have eliminated our Head Start grants. I think it is foolish to make cuts as far reaching as 2003, when we have no idea what the economy will be like then. It's wrong to sacrifice early education initiatives like Head Start just so we can have some extra money in the bank next year. Studies show investments in early childhood programs like Head Start pay huge dividends. For every dollar we spend in Head Start, \$7 are ultimately saved. The investment in early childhood programs produces healthier children, lower crime rates, and higher graduation rates.
