



SENATE BILL No. 245

February 21, 2001, Introduced by Senators BENNETT, NORTH, GOUGEON, JOHNSON, MC MANUS and GAST and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

EXECUTIVE BUDGET BILL

A bill to make appropriations for the department of environmental quality for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2002; to provide for the expenditure of those appropriations; to create funds and accounts; to require reports; to prescribe certain powers and duties of certain state agencies and officials; to authorize certain transfers by certain state agencies; and to provide for the disposition of fees and other income received by the various state agencies.

Sec. 201. Pursuant to section 30 of article IX of the state constitution of 1963, total state spending from state resources under part 1 for fiscal year 2001-2002 is \$266,403,000.00 and state spending from state resources to be paid to local units of government for fiscal year 2001-2002 is \$7,944,900.00. Sec. 203. As used in this bill:

(a) "CESARS" means chemical evaluation search and retrieval

2 (b) "CMI" means clean Michigan initiative.

3 (c) "Department" means the department of environmental quality.

4 (d) "DOC" means the United States department of commerce.

5 (e) "DOC-NOAA" means the DOC national oceanic and atmospheric
6 administration.

7 (f) "DOD" means the United States department of defense.

8 (g) "DOE" means the United States department of energy.

9 (h) "DOI" means the United States department of interior.

10 (i) "DOI-OSMRE" means the DOI office of surface mine reclamation.

11 (j) "DOI-USGS" means the DOI United States geological survey.

12 (k) "EPA" means the United States environmental protection agency.

13 (l) "EPA-GWDW" means the EPA groundwater drinking water.

14 (m) "EPA-LUST trust" means the EPA leaking underground storage
15 tank trust fund.

16 (n) "EPA, radon" means the EPA radon grants.

17 (o) "EPA-UST" means the EPA underground storage tank.

18 (p) "FEMA" means the federal emergency management agency.

19 (q) "FTE" means full-time equated.

29 Sec. 204. The department of civil service shall bill departments
30 and agencies at the end of the first fiscal quarter for the 1% charge

1 authorized by section 5 of article XI of the state constitution of
2 1963. Payments shall be made for the total amount of the billing by
3 the end of the second fiscal quarter.

4 Sec. 205. (1) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1,
5 there is appropriated an amount not to exceed \$30,000,000.00 for
6 federal contingency funds. These funds are not available for
7 expenditure until they have been transferred to another line item in
8 this bill under section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984
9 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

10 (2) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is
11 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$5,000,000.00 for state
12 restricted contingency funds. These funds are not available for
13 expenditure until they have been transferred to another line item in
14 this bill under section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984
15 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

16 (3) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is
17 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for local contingency
18 funds. These funds are not available for expenditure until they have
19 been transferred to another line item in this bill under section
20 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

21 (4) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is
22 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for private
23 contingency funds. These funds are not available for expenditure
24 until they have been transferred to another line item in this bill
25 under section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,
26 MCL 18.1393.

27 Sec. 206. Unless otherwise specified, the department shall use
28 the Internet to fulfill the reporting requirements of this bill. This
29 may include transmission of reports via electronic mail to the
30 recipients identified for each reporting requirement or it may include

1 placement of reports on an Internet or Intranet site. Quarterly, the
2 department shall provide to the appropriations subcommittee members,
3 state budget office, and the fiscal agencies an electronic and paper
4 copy listing of the reports submitted during the most recent 3-month
5 period along with the Internet or Intranet site of each report, if
6 any.

7 Sec. 207. (1) A hiring freeze is imposed on the state classified
8 civil service. State departments and agencies are prohibited from
9 hiring any new full-time state classified civil service employees and
10 prohibited from filling any vacant state classified civil service
11 positions. This hiring freeze does not apply to internal transfers of
12 classified employees from one position to another within a department.

13 (2) The state budget director shall grant exceptions to this
14 hiring freeze when the state budget director believes that the hiring
15 freeze will result in rendering a state department or agency unable to
16 deliver basic services, cause loss of revenue to the state, result in
17 the inability of the state to receive federal funds, or would
18 necessitate additional expenditures that exceed any savings from
19 maintaining a vacancy. The state budget director shall report by the
20 thirtieth of each month to the chairpersons of the senate and house
21 standing committees on appropriations the number of exceptions to the
22 hiring freeze approved during the previous month and the reasons to
23 justify the exception.

24 Sec. 208. (1) The negative appropriation for budgetary savings in
25 part 1 shall be satisfied by savings from the hiring freeze imposed in
26 Section 207 and, if necessary, by other savings identified by the
27 department director and approved by the state budget director.

28 (2) Appropriation authorizations shall be adjusted after the
29 approval of transfers by the legislature pursuant to section 393(2) of
30 the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

1 Sec. 209. (1) From funds appropriated under part 1, the
2 department shall prepare a report that lists all of the following
3 regarding grant or loan or grant and loan programs administered by the
4 department for the fiscal year ending on September 30, 2002:

5 (a) The name of each program.

6 (b) The goals of the program, the criteria, eligibility, process,
7 filing fees, nominating procedures, and deadlines for each program.

8 (c) The maximum and minimum grant and loan available and whether
9 there is a match requirement for each program.

10 (d) The amount of any required match, and whether in-kind
11 contributions may be used as part or all of a required match.

12 (e) Information pertaining to the application process, timeline
13 for each program, and the contact people within the department.

14 (f) The source of funds for each program, including the citation
15 of pertinent authorizing acts.

16 (g) Information regarding plans for the next fiscal year for the
17 phaseout, expansion, or changes for each program.

18 (h) A listing of all recipients of grants or loans awarded by the
19 department by type and amount of grant or loan.

20 (2) The reports required under this section shall be submitted to
21 the senate and house of representatives appropriations committees and
22 senate and house fiscal agencies by January 1, 2002.

23 Sec. 210. (1) The department shall report all of the following
24 information relative to allocations made in part 1 for the
25 environmental cleanup and redevelopment program, state cleanup,
26 emergency actions, superfund cleanup, the revitalization revolving
27 loan program, the brownfield grants and loans program, the leaking
28 underground storage tank cleanup program, the contaminated lake and
29 river sediments cleanup program, and the environmental protection bond
30 projects under section 19508(7) of the natural resources and

environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.19508, to the state budget director, the senate and house of representatives appropriations subcommittees on environmental quality, and the senate and house fiscal agencies:

(a) The name and location of the site for which an allocation is made.

(b) The nature of the problem encountered at the site.

(c) A brief description of how the problem will be resolved if the allocation is made for a response activity.

(d) The estimated date that site closure activities will be completed.

(e) The amount of the allocation, or the anticipated financing for the site.

(f) A summary of the sites and the total amount of funds expended at the sites at the conclusion of the fiscal year.

(g) The number of sites that would qualify as brownfields that were redeveloped.

(2) The report prepared under subsection (1) shall also include all of the following:

(a) The status of all state-owned facilities that are on the list compiled under part 201 of the natural resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.20101 to 324.20142.

(b) The report shall include the total amount of funds expended during the fiscal year and the total amount of funds awaiting expenditure.

(c) The total amount of bonds issued for the environmental protection bond program pursuant to part 193 of the natural resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.19301 to 324.19306, and bonds issued pursuant to the clean Michigan initiative act, 1998 PA 284, MCL 324.95101 to 324.95108.

(3) The report shall be made available by March 31 of each year.

SURFACE WATER QUALITY

Sec. 301. Of the funds appropriated in part 1 for surface water surveillance, a minimum of \$250,000.00 shall be designated for grants to local organizations for water quality monitoring activities.

ENVIRONMENTAL RESPONSE

Sec. 401. The unexpended portion of the appropriation in part 1 for the state cleanup program, environmental cleanup and redevelopment program, emergency cleanup action, contaminated site investigations, cleanup and revitalization, revitalization revolving loan program, and superfund cleanup projects is considered work project appropriations and any unencumbered or unallotted funds are carried forward into the succeeding fiscal year. The following is in compliance with section 451a(1) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a:

(a) The purpose of the projects to be carried forward is to provide contaminated site cleanup.

(b) The projects will be accomplished by contract.

(c) The total estimated cost of all projects is identified in each line-item appropriation.

(d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2006.

Sec. 402. Of the funds appropriated in part 1 as state match for the superfund cleanup program, an amount not to exceed \$250,000.00 shall be expended as state match for the hazardous substance research center.

STORAGE TANKS

Sec. 501. (1) The funds appropriated in part 1 from the Michigan underground storage tank financial assurance fund for the purpose of carrying out the duties and responsibilities as specified in part 215 of the natural resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.21501 to 324.21551, are considered work project

1 appropriations and any unencumbered funds are carried forward into the
2 succeeding fiscal year. The following is in compliance with section
3 451a(1) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a:

4 (a) The purpose of the projects to be carried forward is to carry
5 out the responsibilities of part 215 of the natural resources and
6 environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.21501 to 324.21551.

7 (b) The projects will be accomplished by contract and state
8 employees.

9 (c) The total estimated cost is identified in a line-item
10 appropriation.

11 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2006.

12 (2) The Michigan underground storage tank financial assurance
13 policy board shall allocate the amount of the underground storage tank
14 financial assurance fund to be distributed to the department. If the
15 amount recommended by the board is less than that appropriated in
16 section 112, expenditures shall be adjusted accordingly.

17 (3) Included in the amounts appropriated in part 1 from the
18 Michigan underground storage tank financial assurance fund are amounts
19 sufficient to pay debt service costs on the bonds or notes issued
20 pursuant to part 215 of the natural resources and environmental
21 protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.21501 to 324.21551.

22 Sec. 502. The department shall report to the state budget
23 director, the senate and house of representatives appropriations
24 subcommittees on environmental quality, and the senate and house
25 fiscal agencies no later than October 31, 2002 on the Michigan
26 underground storage tank financial assurance fund. The report shall
27 include the fund balance, estimate of available revenues, number and
28 dollar value of claims processed through September 30, 2001, and
29 total estimated claims liability through December 22, 2003.

30 Sec. 503. The unexpended portion of the appropriation in part 1

for the leaking underground storage tank cleanup program is considered work project appropriations and any unencumbered or unallotted funds are carried over into the succeeding fiscal year. The following is in compliance with section 451a(1) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a:

(a) The purpose of the projects to be carried over is to provide for redevelopment and contaminated site cleanup.

(b) These projects will be accomplished by contract.

(c) The total estimated costs of all projects is identified in each line-item appropriation.

(d) The tentative completion date for these projects is September 30, 2006.

ENVIRONMENTAL ASSISTANCE

Sec. 601. The appropriation in part 1 for low-income community wastewater assistance shall be provided to the Michigan community action agency association. This appropriation enables the association to maintain rural community assistance program services to all Michigan counties.

GRANTS

Sec. 701. If a certified health department does not exist in a city, county, or district or does not fulfill its responsibilities under part 117 of the natural resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.11701 to 324.11719, then the department may spend funds appropriated in part 1 under the septage waste compliance program in accordance with section 11716 of the natural resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.11716.

Sec. 702. Of the amount of money appropriated in part 1 for scrap tire grants, \$100,000.00 shall be available for grants to communities to cover scrap tire fire suppression costs, provided owner liability bonds and other available funding sources have been exhausted.
