

## **SENATE BILL No. 245**

February 21, 2001, Introduced by Senators BENNETT, NORTH, GOUGEON, JOHNSON, MC MANUS and GAST and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

### EXECUTIVE BUDGET BILL

A bill to make appropriations for the department of environmental quality for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2002; to provide for the expenditure of those appropriations; to create funds and accounts; to require reports; to prescribe certain powers and duties of certain state agencies and officials; to authorize certain transfers by certain state agencies; and to provide for the disposition of fees and other income received by the various state agencies.

- 3 state budget office, and the fiscal agencies an electronic and paper
- 4 copy listing of the reports submitted during the most recent 3-month
- 5 period along with the Internet or Intranet site of each report, if
- 6 any.
- 7 Sec. 207. (1) A hiring freeze is imposed on the state classified
- 8 civil service. State departments and agencies are prohibited from
- 9 hiring any new full-time state classified civil service employees and
- 10 prohibited from filling any vacant state classified civil service
- 11 positions. This hiring freeze does not apply to internal transfers of
- 12 classified employees from one position to another within a department.
- 13 (2) The state budget director shall grant exceptions to this
- 14 hiring freeze when the state budget director believes that the hiring
- 15 freeze will result in rendering a state department or agency unable to
- 16 deliver basic services, cause loss of revenue to the state, result in

- 24 Sec. 208. (1) The negative appropriation for budgetary savings in
- 25 part 1 shall be satisfied by savings from the hiring freeze imposed in
- 26 Section 207 and, if necessary, by other savings identified by the
- 27 department director and approved by the state budget director.
- 28 (2) Appropriation authorizations shall be adjusted after the
- 29 approval of transfers by the legislature pursuant to section 393(2) of
- 30 the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

- 1 Sec. 209. (1) From funds appropriated under part 1, the
- 2 department shall prepare a report that lists all of the following
- 3 regarding grant or loan or grant and loan programs administered by the
- 4 department for the fiscal year ending on September 30, 2002:
- 5 (a) The name of each program.
- 6 (b) The goals of the program, the criteria, eligibility, process,
- 7 filing fees, nominating procedures, and deadlines for each program.
- 8 (c) The maximum and minimum grant and loan available and whether
- 9 there is a match requirement for each program.
- 10 (d) The amount of any required match, and whether in-kind
- 11 contributions may be used as part or all of a required match.
- 12 (e) Information pertaining to the application process, timeline

- 15 of pertinent authorizing acts.
- (g) Information regarding plans for the next fiscal year for the
- 17 phaseout, expansion, or changes for each program.
- 18 (h) A listing of all recipients of grants or loans awarded by the
- 19 department by type and amount of grant or loan.
- 20 (2) The reports required under this section shall be submitted to
- 21 the senate and house of representatives appropriations committees and
- 22 senate and house fiscal agencies by January 1, 2002.
- 23 Sec. 210. (1) The department shall report all of the following
- 24 information relative to allocations made in part 1 for the
- 25 environmental cleanup and redevelopment program, state cleanup,
- 26 emergency actions, superfund cleanup, the revitalization revolving
- 27 loan program, the brownfield grants and loans program, the leaking
- 28 underground storage tank cleanup program, the contaminated lake and
- 29 river sediments cleanup program, and the environmental protection bond
- 30 projects under section 19508(7) of the natural resources and

- 1 environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.19508, to the state
- 2 budget director, the senate and house of representatives
- 3 appropriations subcommittees on environmental quality, and the senate
- 4 and house fiscal agencies:
- 5 (a) The name and location of the site for which an allocation is
- 6 made.
- 7 (b) The nature of the problem encountered at the site.
- 8 (c) A brief description of how the problem will be resolved if the
- 9 allocation is made for a response activity.
- 10 (d) The estimated date that site closure activities will be
- 11 completed.
- 12 (e) The amount of the allocation, or the anticipated financing for
- 13 the site.
- 14 (f) A summary of the sites and the total amount of funds expended
- 15 at the sites at the conclusion of the fiscal year.
- 16 (q) The number of sites that would qualify as brownfields that
- were redeveloped.
- 18 (2) The report prepared under subsection (1) shall also include
- 19 all of the following:
- 20 (a) The status of all state-owned facilities that are on the list
- 21 compiled under part 201 of the natural resources and environmental
- 22 protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.20101 to 324.20142.
- 23 (b) The report shall include the total amount of funds expended
- 24 during the fiscal year and the total amount of funds awaiting
- 25 expenditure.
- 26 (c) The total amount of bonds issued for the environmental
- 27 protection bond program pursuant to part 193 of the natural resources
- 28 and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.19301 to
- 29 324.19306, and bonds issued pursuant to the clean Michigan initiative
- 30 act, 1998 PA 284, MCL 324.95101 to 324.95108.

1 (3) The report shall be made available by March 31 of each year.

#### 2 SURFACE WATER QUALITY

- 3 Sec. 301. Of the funds appropriated in part 1 for surface water
- 4 surveillance, a minimum of \$250,000.00 shall be designated for grants
- 5 to local organizations for water quality monitoring activities.

#### 6 ENVIRONMENTAL RESPONSE

- 7 Sec. 401. The unexpended portion of the appropriation in part 1
- 8 for the state cleanup program, environmental cleanup and redevelopment
- 9 program, emergency cleanup action, contaminated site investigations,
- 10 cleanup and revitalization, revitalization revolving loan program, and
- 11 superfund cleanup projects is considered work project appropriations
- 12 and any unencumbered or unallotted funds are carried forward into the
- 13 succeeding fiscal year. The following is in compliance with section
- 14 451a(1) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a:
- 15 (a) The purpose of the projects to be carried forward is to
- 16 provide contaminated site cleanup.
- 17 (b) The projects will be accomplished by contract.
- 18 (c) The total estimated cost of all projects is identified in each
- 19 line-item appropriation.
- 20 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2006.
- 21 Sec. 402. Of the funds appropriated in part 1 as state match for
- 22 the superfund cleanup program, an amount not to exceed \$250,000.00
- 23 shall be expended as state match for the hazardous substance research
- 24 center.

#### 25 STORAGE TANKS

- Sec. 501. (1) The funds appropriated in part 1 from the Michigan
- 27 underground storage tank financial assurance fund for the purpose of
- 28 carrying out the duties and responsibilities as specified in part 215
- 29 of the natural resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA
- **30** 451, MCL 324.21501 to 324.21551, are considered work project

1 appropriations and any unencumbered funds are carried forward into the

- 2 succeeding fiscal year. The following is in compliance with section

- 22 Sec. 502. The department shall report to the state budget

- 26 underground storage tank financial assurance fund. The report shall
- 27 include the fund balance, estimate of available revenues, number and
- 28 dollar value of claims processed through September 30, 2001, and
- 29 total estimated claims liability through December 22, 2003.
- 30 Sec. 503. The unexpended portion of the appropriation in part 1

#### ENVIRONMENTAL ASSISTANCE

- 14 Sec. 601. The appropriation in part 1 for low-income community
- 15 wastewater assistance shall be provided to the Michigan community
- 16 action agency association. This appropriation enables the association
- 17 to maintain rural community assistance program services to all
- 18 Michigan counties.

#### 19 GRANTS

- 20 Sec. 701. If a certified health department does not exist in a
- 21 city, county, or district or does not fulfill its responsibilities
- 22 under part 117 of the natural resources and environmental protection
- 23 act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.11701 to 324.11719, then the department may
- 24 spend funds appropriated in part 1 under the septage waste compliance
- 25 program in accordance with section 11716 of the natural resources and
- 26 environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.11716.
- 27 Sec. 702. Of the amount of money appropriated in part 1 for scrap
- 28 tire grants, \$100,000.00 shall be available for grants to communities
- 29 to cover scrap tire fire suppression costs, provided owner liability
- 30 bonds and other available funding sources have been exhausted.
