Vaughn—excused Young—present Senator Christopher D. Dingell of the 7th District offered the following invocation:

Resolutions

Senator Hammerstrom moved that consideration of the following concurrent resolution be postponed for today: Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 11

The motion prevailed.

Senators Hammerstrom, Shugars, Bullard, Stille, Gougeon, Gast, McCotter, Sikkema, Johnson, McManus, Van Regenmorter, Steil, North, Schuette, Garcia and Goschka offered the following resolution:

Senate Resolution No. 120.

A resolution to memorialize the Congress of the United States to fund special education at the level provided for in federal law.

Whereas, In 1975, the Individuals with Disabilities Act was enacted into law by Congress to outline the services to education that the states must provide to guarantee the rights of students with disabilities. This legislation also called for the federal government to provide 40 percent of the cost of funding the special education services; and

Whereas, In reality, however, the federal government has not funded special education at anything near 40 percent of the true cost. Instead, Congress generally appropriates between 6 and 15 percent per year. The money coming from Washington to fund this mandate is clearly inadequate. As special education needs continue to rise, this underfunding takes a larger toll on state resources for the education of all students; and

Whereas, Providing services for special education students requires a significant commitment of resources. The annual costs for educating a student with a disability can sometimes be as much as \$25,000—far beyond the funding provided for a student in regular education. The strain of paying for these services, especially as the number of students in need of special education services rises, threatens the quality of education in our state and nation; and

Whereas, There is legislation pending in Congress to set a formula for federal funding increases to reach the 40 percent threshold. Several educators have noted that the enactment of such legislation could be the most effective move that could be made to strengthen education in this country; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Senate, That we memorialize the Congress of the United States to fund special education at the level provided for in federal law; and be it further

Resolved, That copies of this resolution be transmitted to the President of the United States Senate, the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, and the members of the Michigan congressional delegation.

Pending the order that, under rule 3.204, the resolution be referred to the Committee on Government Operations, Senator Hammerstrom moved that the rule be suspended.

The motion prevailed, a majority of the members serving voting therefor.

The question being on the adoption of the resolution,

Senator Hammerstrom moved that the resolution be referred to the Committee on Education.

The motion prevailed.

Senator Young was named co-sponsor of the resolution.
