Senator Jelinek asked and was granted unanimous consent to make a statement and moved that the statement be printed in the Journal.

Senator Jelinek's statement is as follows:

This budget increases K-12 spending \$34,379,900 over the Senate recommendations which are \$52 million over the May revenue estimates. That makes a total shortfall of over \$86 million. I like and I support K-12 education, but let's be honest. Are each one of you in this chamber willing to cut an additional \$86 million out of the other General Fund budgets to make this happen? Are you willing to fund less State Police, less DCH, less DHS, less higher education, and less revenue sharing to make this happen?

In that case, you must vote not to concur with this budget, and send it to conference.

My commitment is to bring fairness to the Michigan insurance industry. My commitment is to see justice in the way insurance is provided to Michigan homeowners and drivers. Like Dr. King, I won't have a lot of fine and luxurious things to leave behind, but I hope that these statements, along with my other efforts, would be a testimony to my committed life—that, along with my passionate plea to move my bills.
