

## YOUTH WORK PERMITS

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**Senate Bill 910 (S-1) as passed by the Senate**

## SUMMARY:

Senate Bill 910 would amend the Youth Employment Standards Act to remove provisions that now require a minor applying for a work permit to do so in person and also require certain permits to be printed on distinctively colored paper.

The act requires a minor (someone under 18 years old) to have a work permit or temporary permit issued by the minor's school district, intermediate school district (ISD), public school academy (PSA, or charter school) or nonpublic school) in his or her school file and on file with his or her employer before being employed in an occupation regulated under the act.

Under the act, an issuing officer can issue a work permit only if the minor applies in person. The bill would remove the "in person" requirement.

Additionally, the act requires that the color of work permits for minors under 16 years of age be distinct from those for minors 16 years of age and over. Instead, the bill would require that a permit issued to a minor under 16 years of age clearly indicate that fact.

## BACKGROUND:

Effectively, the bill would codify the provisions in a succession of executive orders (EOs) temporarily suspending strict compliance with sections 5 and 6 of the Youth Employment Standards Act. Those sections require in-person application for a work permit and a different color of paper for work permits for minors under 16 years of age.

The latest applicable EO, Executive Order 2020-157,<sup>1</sup> was issued July 27, 2020, and expired August 31, 2020. It followed identical orders in May (EO 2020-79<sup>2</sup>) and June (EO 2020-116<sup>3</sup> and EO 2020-140<sup>4</sup>).
