A bill to amend 1978 PA 368, entitled "Public health code,"

by amending section 5474 (MCL 333.5474), as added by 1998 PA 219.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- 1 Sec. 5474. (1) The department shall establish a lead poisoning 2 prevention program that has the following components:
- (a) A coordinated and comprehensive plan to prevent childhood
 lead poisoning and to minimize exposure of the general public to
 lead-based paint hazards.
- 6 (b) A comprehensive educational and community outreach program





- 1 regarding lead poisoning prevention that shall, must, at a minimum,
- 2 include the development of appropriate educational materials
- 3 targeted to health care providers, child care providers, public
- 4 schools, owners and tenants of residential dwellings, and parents
- 5 of young children. These educational materials shall must be made
- 6 available, upon on request, to local and state community groups,
- 7 legal services organizations, and tenants' groups.
- 8 (c) A technical assistance system for health care providers to
- 9 assist those providers in managing cases of childhood lead
- 10 poisoning. As part of this system, the department shall require
- 11 that results of all blood lead level tests conducted in Michigan
- 12 this state be reported to the department as provided for in by rule
- 13 and that when the department receives notice of blood lead levels
- 14 above 10-5 micrograms per deciliter, it shall initiate contact with
- 15 the local public health department or the physician, or both, of
- 16 the child whose blood lead level exceeds 10-5 micrograms per
- **17** deciliter.
- 18 (2) The By January 1 of each year, the department shall report
- 19 to the legislature by January 1, 1999, and annually thereafter, the
- 20 number of children through age 6 who were screened for lead
- 21 poisoning during the preceding fiscal year and who were confirmed
- 22 to have had blood lead levels above 10 micrograms per deciliter.

- 25 department shall recommend methods for improving compliance with
- 26 quidelines issued by the federal centers for disease control and
