## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO.23

Senators Hertel, McCann, Bayer, Irwin, Bullock, Geiss, Chang, Alexander, Moss, McMorrow, Wojno, Ananich, McBroom, Brinks, Polehanki, Santana and Hollier offered the following concurrent resolution:

- 1 A concurrent resolution to urge the United States Congress to
- 2 oppose recommendations to privatize the United States Postal
- 3 Service.
- 4 Whereas, The USPS is a core governmental function recognized
- 5 by our Founding Fathers in the U.S. Constitution. Article I,
- 6 Section 8, Clause 7 of the U.S. Constitution grants Congress the
- 7 power to establish post offices and post roads. Enacting the
- 8 President's proposal would require Congress to neglect its
- 9 constitutional responsibility; and
- 10 Whereas, The USPS provides high-quality universal service
- 11 without taxpayer funding. The USPS receives no tax dollars and
- 12 funds its operations through the sale of postage products and
- 13 services. Even without taxpayer funding, the USPS provides

- 1 excellent service and consistently receives the highest approval
- 2 ratings of federal departments and agencies; and
- 3 Whereas, The USPS is a source of decent and dignified jobs in
- 4 the United States. The USPS employs workers of all nationalities
- 5 from diverse backgrounds of all kinds. The USPS has more than
- 6 500,000 employees at the center of the \$1.4 trillion mailing
- 7 industry that employs 7.5 million Americans. It is also the
- 8 nation's second-largest employer of military veterans; and
- 9 Whereas, Privatizing the USPS would limit service and increase
- 10 prices for Michigan's 32 rural counties. A privatized postal
- 11 service will be driven by profit and would lead to increased rates
- 12 and lost service for rural areas where delivery is more expensive.
- 13 This will enrich a few private companies at the expense of rural
- 14 communities in Michigan and across the country; now, therefore, be
- **15** it
- 16 Resolved by the Senate (the House of Representatives
- 17 concurring), That we urge the United States Congress to oppose
- 18 recommendations to privatize the United States Postal Service; and
- 19 be it further
- 20 Resolved, That copies of this resolution be transmitted to the
- 21 President of the United States, the President of the United States
- 22 Senate, the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives,
- 23 and the members of the Michigan congressional delegation.
