A bill to amend 1947 PA 336, entitled "An act to prohibit strikes by certain public employees; to provide review from disciplinary action with respect thereto; to provide for the mediation of grievances and the holding of elections; to declare and protect the rights and privileges of public employees; to require certain provisions in collective bargaining agreements; to prescribe means of enforcement and penalties for the violation of the provisions of this act; and to make appropriations," by amending sections 9, 10, and 15 (MCL 423.209, 423.210, and 423.215), as amended by 2014 PA 414.

The bill was read a first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Government Operations.

Reps. Elder, Chirkun, Sabo, Sowerby, Cambensy, Stone, Hertel, Shannon, Peterson, Anthony, Hope, Tate, Whitsett, Robinson, Neeley, Pagan, Koleszar, Cherry, Pohutsky, Garza, Rabhi, Jones, Cynthia Johnson and Lasinski introduced

House Bill No. 4034, entitled

A bill to amend 1939 PA 176, entitled "An act to create a commission relative to labor disputes, and to prescribe its powers and duties; to provide for the mediation and arbitration of labor disputes, and the holding of elections thereon; to regulate the conduct of parties to labor disputes and to require the parties to follow certain procedures; to regulate and limit the right to strike and picket; to protect the rights and privileges of employees, including the right to organize and engage in lawful concerted activities; to protect the rights and privileges of employers; to make certain acts unlawful; to make appropriations; and to prescribe means of enforcement and penalties for violations of this act," by amending sections 1, 2, 8, 14, 17, and 22 (MCL 423.1, 423.2, 423.8, 423.14, 423.17, and 423.22), as amended by 2012 PA 348.

The bill was read a first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Government Operations.

Reps. Ellison, Frederick, Kuppa, Sneller, Kennedy, Cambensy, Hertel, Brixie, Gay-Dagnogo and Crawford introduced

House Bill No. 4035, entitled

A bill to prohibit a local unit of government from enacting or enforcing an ordinance, policy, resolution, or rule that regulates a dog based upon the breed or perceived breed of the dog; and to provide for the powers and duties of certain local governmental entities.

The bill was read a first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Local Government and Municipal Finance.

Rep. Lightner introduced

House Bill No. 4036, entitled

A bill to create the criminal justice data collection and management program act; to describe the criminal justice data collection and management program; to provide for certain grants; and to provide for the powers and duties of certain state and local governmental officers and entities.

The bill was read a first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

A bill to amend 1949 PA 300, entitled "Michigan vehicle code," by amending section 801b (MCL 257.801b), as amended by 1986 PA 311.

A bill to amend 1967 PA 281, entitled "Income tax act of 1967," (MCL 206.1 to 206.713) by adding sections 277 and 677.

The bill was read a first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Tax Policy.

A bill to amend 1915 PA 31, entitled "Youth tobacco act," by amending the title and sections 1, 2a, and 4 (MCL 722.641, 722.642a, and 722.644), the title and sections 1 and 4 as amended by 2006 PA 236 and section 2a as added by 1992 PA 272, and by adding section 3a; and to repeal acts and parts of acts.

The bill was read a first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Regulatory Reform.

House Bill No. 4040, entitled

A bill to amend 1993 PA 327, entitled "Tobacco products tax act," by amending the title and sections 2,3,6,6a,7,8,9, and 11 (MCL 205.422, 205.423, 205.426, 205.426a, 205.427, 205.428, 205.429, and 205.431), the title and sections 2 and 6a as amended by 2012 PA 188, sections 3 and 6 as amended by 1997 PA 187, sections 7 and 11 as amended by 2016 PA 86, section 8 as amended by 2008 PA 458, and section 9 as amended by 2004 PA 474.

The bill was read a first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Regulatory Reform.

Reps. Calley, Brann and Sabo introduced

House Bill No. 4041, entitled

A bill to amend 1931 PA 328, entitled "The Michigan penal code," by amending sections 42b and 470 (MCL 750.42b and 750.470), section 42b as added by 1992 PA 273 and section 470 as amended by 1998 PA 38.

The bill was read a first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Regulatory Reform.

Reps. Whiteford and Brann introduced

House Bill No. 4042, entitled

A bill to amend 1978 PA 368, entitled "Public health code," by amending section 17201 (MCL 333.17201), as amended by 2016 PA 499, and by adding sections 16190, 17225, and 17225a.

The bill was read a first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Health Policy.

Rep. Whiteford introduced

House Bill No. 4043, entitled

A bill to amend 1976 PA 331, entitled "Michigan consumer protection act," by amending sections 2 and 3 (MCL 445.902 and 445.903), section 2 as amended by 2018 PA 189 and section 3 as amended by 2018 PA 211. The bill was read a first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Health Policy.

Rep. Hoitenga introduced

House Bill No. 4044, entitled

A bill to amend 1956 PA 218, entitled "The insurance code of 1956," by amending sections 1205 and 1239 (MCL 500.1205 and 500.1239), section 1205 as amended by 2008 PA 422 and section 1239 as amended by 2008 PA 423.

The bill was read a first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Insurance.

Reps. Hope, Brixie, Kennedy, Stone, Cherry, Anthony, Slagh, Frederick, Hammoud and Whitsett introduced

House Bill No. 4045, entitled

A bill to amend 1927 PA 175, entitled "The code of criminal procedure," by amending section 19 of chapter XVI (MCL 776.19).

The bill was read a first time by its title and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

House Bill No. 4046, entitled

A bill to amend 2006 PA 110, entitled "Michigan zoning enabling act," (MCL 125.3101 to 125.3702) by adding section 206b.

House Joint Resolution A, entitled

A joint resolution proposing an amendment to the state constitution of 1963, by amending section 13 of article IV, to limit the legislative session.
