A bill to make, supplement, and adjust appropriations for various state departments and agencies for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2021; to provide for certain conditions on appropriations; and to provide for the expenditure of the appropriations.

PROVISIONS CONCERNING APPROPRIATIONS

GENERAL SECTIONS

22 Sec. 201. Pursuant to section 30 of article IX of the state
23 constitution of 1963, total state spending from state sources under
24 part 1 for fiscal year ending September 30, 2021 is \$0.00 and total
25 state spending from state sources to be paid to local units of
26 government is \$0.00.

27 Sec. 202. The appropriations made and expenditures authorized
28 under this part and part 1 and the departments, commissions,
29 boards, offices, and programs for which appropriations are made



1 under this part and part 1, are subject to the management and
2 budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1101 to 18.1594.

3 Sec. 203. If the state administrative board, acting under
4 section 3 of 1921 PA 2, MCL 17.3, transfers funds from an amount
5 appropriated under this act, the legislature may, by a concurrent
6 resolution adopted by a majority of the members elected to and
7 serving in each house, inter-transfer funds within this act for the
8 particular department, board, commission, office, or institution.

9 Sec. 204. Funds appropriated in part 1 are subject to
10 applicable federal audit and reporting requirements. Prompt action
11 shall be taken if instances of noncompliance are identified,
12 including noncompliance identified in an audit finding. If any
13 instance of noncompliance is identified, including noncompliance
14 identified in an audit finding, the state budget director shall
15 take necessary and immediate action to rectify it. The state budget
16 director shall notify the senate and house appropriations
17 committees and the senate and house fiscal agencies when an
18 instance of noncompliance is identified.

19 Sec. 205. The state budget director shall report on the status
20 of funds appropriated in part 1, and all funds appropriated related
21 to the coronavirus relief effort, to the senate and house
22 appropriations committees and the senate and house fiscal agencies
23 on a monthly basis until all funds are exhausted.

24 Sec. 206. Any department, agency, board, commission,
25 subdivision, or other executive branch entity or official of this
26 state that receives funding in part 1 shall not do the following:

27 (a) Require as a condition of accessing any state services or
28 facilities that an individual provide proof he or she has received
29 a COVID-19 vaccine.



1 (b) Produce, develop, and issue a COVID-19 vaccine passport
 2 for the purpose of certifying that an individual has received a
 3 COVID-19 vaccine.

4 (c) Provide information of an individual's COVID-19 vaccine
 5 status to any person, company, or governmental entity for inclusion
 6 in a COVID-19 vaccine passport.

 8 **DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION**

9 Sec. 301. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for COVID-19
 10 child care public assistance, \$95,600,000.00 shall be used to
 11 adjust the income entrance eligibility threshold under the
 12 following guidelines:

13 (a) From October 1, 2020 to December 31, 2020, the income
 14 entrance eligibility threshold for the child development and care
 15 program is set to 130% of the federal poverty guidelines.

16 (b) From January 1, 2021 to April 30, 2021, the income
 17 entrance eligibility threshold for the child development and care
 18 program is set to 150% of the federal poverty guidelines.

19 (c) From May 1, 2021 to September 30, 2022, the income
 20 entrance eligibility threshold for the child development and care
 21 program is set to 180% of the federal poverty guidelines.

22 (d) From October 1, 2022 to September 30, 2023, the income
 23 entrance eligibility threshold for the child development and care
 24 program is set to 160% of the federal poverty guidelines.

25 Sec. 302. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for COVID-19
 26 child care public assistance, \$518,350,000.00 shall be used for the
 27 following purposes:

28 (a) To increase the provider reimbursement rates for child
 29 care centers under the following guidelines:



1 (i) Increase the reimbursement rate for providers with an empty
2 star rating by \$3.00 per hour for each child not more than 2-1/2
3 years of age, by \$2.15 per hour for each child more than 2-1/2
4 years of age but not more than 5 years of age, and by \$2.10 per
5 hour for each child more than 5 years of age.

6 (ii) Increase the reimbursement rate for providers with a 1-
7 star rating by \$3.00 per hour for each child not more than 2-1/2
8 years of age, by \$2.15 per hour for each child more than 2-1/2
9 years of age but not more than 5 years of age, and by \$2.10 per
10 hour for each child more than 5 years of age.

11 (iii) Increase the reimbursement rate for providers with a 2-
12 star rating by \$3.20 per hour for each child not more than 2-1/2
13 years of age, by \$2.30 per hour for each child more than 2-1/2
14 years of age but not more than 5 years of age, and by \$2.25 per
15 hour for each child more than 5 years of age.

16 (iv) Increase the reimbursement rate for providers with a 3-
17 star rating by \$3.55 per hour for each child not more than 2-1/2
18 years of age, by \$2.65 per hour for each child more than 2-1/2
19 years of age but not more than 5 years of age, and by \$2.60 per
20 hour for each child more than 5 years of age.

21 (v) Increase the reimbursement rate for providers with a 4-
22 star rating by \$3.70 per hour for each child not more than 2-1/2
23 years of age, by \$2.85 per hour for each child more than 2-1/2
24 years of age but not more than 5 years of age, and by \$2.80 per
25 hour for each child more than 5 years of age.

26 (vi) Increase the reimbursement rate for providers with a 5-
27 star rating by \$4.05 per hour for each child not more than 2-1/2
28 years of age, by \$3.20 per hour for each child more than 2-1/2
29 years of age but not more than 5 years of age, and by \$3.15 per



1 hour for each child more than 5 years of age.

2 (b) To increase the provider reimbursement rates for group
3 home providers under the following guidelines:

4 (i) Increase the reimbursement rate for providers with an empty
5 star rating by \$2.45 per hour for each child not more than 2-1/2
6 years of age, by \$2.10 per hour for each child more than 2-1/2
7 years of age but not more than 5 years of age, and by \$2.00 per
8 hour for each child more than 5 years of age.

9 (ii) Increase the reimbursement rate for providers with a 1-
10 star rating by \$2.45 per hour for each child not more than 2-1/2
11 years of age, by \$2.10 per hour for each child more than 2-1/2
12 years of age but not more than 5 years of age, and by \$2.00 per
13 hour for each child more than 5 years of age.

14 (iii) Increase the reimbursement rate for providers with a 2-
15 star rating by \$2.60 per hour for each child not more than 2-1/2
16 years of age, by \$2.25 per hour for each child more than 2-1/2
17 years of age but not more than 5 years of age, and by \$2.20 per
18 hour for each child more than 5 years of age.

19 (iv) Increase the reimbursement rate for providers with a 3-
20 star rating by \$2.95 per hour for each child not more than 2-1/2
21 years of age, by \$2.60 per hour for each child more than 2-1/2
22 years of age but not more than 5 years of age, and by \$2.55 per
23 hour for each child more than 5 years of age.

24 (v) Increase the reimbursement rate for providers with a 4-
25 star rating by \$3.15 per hour for each child not more than 2-1/2
26 years of age, by \$2.80 per hour for each child more than 2-1/2
27 years of age but not more than 5 years of age, and by \$2.70 per
28 hour for each child more than 5 years of age.

29 (vi) Increase the reimbursement rate for providers with a 5-



1 star rating by \$3.50 per hour for each child not more than 2-1/2
2 years of age, by \$3.15 per hour for each child more than 2-1/2
3 years of age but not more than 5 years of age, and by \$3.05 per
4 hour for each child more than 5 years of age.

5 (c) To increase the provider reimbursement rates for
6 registered family homes under the following guidelines:

7 (i) Increase the reimbursement rate for providers with an empty
8 star rating by \$2.45 per hour for each child not more than 2-1/2
9 years of age, by \$2.10 per hour for each child more than 2-1/2
10 years of age but not more than 5 years of age, and by \$2.00 per
11 hour for each child more than 5 years of age.

12 (ii) Increase the reimbursement rate for providers with a 1-
13 star rating by \$2.45 per hour for each child not more than 2-1/2
14 years of age, by \$2.10 per hour for each child more than 2-1/2
15 years of age but not more than 5 years of age, and by \$2.00 per
16 hour for each child more than 5 years of age.

17 (iii) Increase the reimbursement rate for providers with a 2-
18 star rating by \$2.60 per hour for each child not more than 2-1/2
19 years of age, by \$2.25 per hour for each child more than 2-1/2
20 years of age but not more than 5 years of age, and by \$2.20 per
21 hour for each child more than 5 years of age.

22 (iv) Increase the reimbursement rate for providers with a 3-
23 star rating by \$2.95 per hour for each child not more than 2-1/2
24 years of age, by \$2.60 per hour for each child more than 2-1/2
25 years of age but not more than 5 years of age, and by \$2.55 per
26 hour for each child more than 5 years of age.

27 (v) Increase the reimbursement rate for providers with a 4-
28 star rating by \$3.15 per hour for each child not more than 2-1/2
29 years of age, by \$2.80 per hour for each child more than 2-1/2



1 years of age but not more than 5 years of age, and by \$2.70 per
 2 hour for each child more than 5 years of age.

3 (vi) Increase the reimbursement rate for providers with a 5-
 4 star rating by \$3.50 per hour for each child not more than 2-1/2
 5 years of age, by \$3.15 per hour for each child more than 2-1/2
 6 years of age but not more than 5 years of age, and by \$3.05 per
 7 hour for each child more than 5 years of age.

8 (d) To increase the provider reimbursement rates for licensed
 9 exempt providers under the following guidelines:

10 (i) Increase the reimbursement rate for licensed exempt
 11 providers with a tier 1 rating by \$1.25 per hour for each child not
 12 more than 2-1/2 years of age, by \$1.25 per hour for each child more
 13 than 2-1/2 years of age but not more than 5 years of age, and by
 14 \$1.25 per hour for each child more than 5 years of age.

15 (ii) Increase the reimbursement rate for licensed exempt
 16 providers with a tier 2 rating by \$2.10 per hour for each child not
 17 more than 2-1/2 years of age, by \$1.85 per hour for each child more
 18 than 2-1/2 years of age but not more than 5 years of age, and by
 19 \$1.85 per hour for each child more than 5 years of age.

20 (e) Rate increases funded under this subsection are effective
 21 from April 1, 2021 to September 30, 2023.

22 Sec. 303. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for COVID-19
 23 child care public assistance, \$2,820,000.00 shall be used by the
 24 department for implementation costs associated with COVID-19 child
 25 care public assistance.

26 Sec. 304. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for COVID-19
 27 child care public assistance, \$19,500,000.00 shall be used to pay
 28 on a family's behalf the child development and care program's
 29 required family contribution from April 1, 2021 to September 30,



1 2022.

2 Sec. 305. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for COVID-19
3 child care public assistance, \$74,842,500.00 shall be used to make
4 payments to child care providers, beginning on April 1, 2021 and
5 ending on December 31, 2021, for eligible children in the child
6 development and care program based on enrollment rather than based
7 on attendance.

8 Sec. 306. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for COVID-19
9 child care public assistance, \$55,000,000.00 shall be used for
10 grant opportunities to Michigan child care providers to help ensure
11 they remain open and are able to meet the child care needs of
12 Michigan families.

13 Sec. 307. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for COVID-19
14 child care public assistance, \$1,500,000.00 shall be used by the
15 department to work in collaboration with the Michigan department of
16 health and human services to continue the network of infant and
17 early childhood mental health consultation, which provides mental
18 health consultation to child care providers, through the fiscal
19 year ending September 30, 2022.

20 Sec. 308. The unexpended funds appropriated in part 1 for
21 COVID-19 child care public assistance are designated as a work
22 project appropriation. Any unencumbered or unallotted funds shall
23 not lapse at the end of the fiscal year and shall be available for
24 expenditures for projects under this section until the projects
25 have been completed. The following is in compliance with section
26 451a(1) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL
27 18.1451a:

28 (a) The purpose of the project is to provide COVID-19 child
29 care public assistance funding to families and child care



1 providers, provide mental health services to children, and provide
2 funding for the department to administer the program.

3 (b) The project will be accomplished by the department of
4 education and the department of health and human services.

5 (c) The estimated cost of this project is \$767,612,500.00.

6 (d) The tentative completion date for this work project is
7 September 30, 2023.

8 Sec. 309. The unexpended funds appropriated in part 1 for
9 COVID-19 child care stabilization fund are designated as a work
10 project appropriation. Any unencumbered or unallotted funds shall
11 not lapse at the end of the fiscal year and shall be available for
12 expenditures for projects under this section until the projects
13 have been completed. The following is in compliance with section
14 451a(1) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL
15 18.1451a:

16 (a) The purpose of the project is to provide grants to child
17 care providers.

18 (b) The project will be accomplished by the department of
19 education.

20 (c) The estimated cost of this project is \$702,513,900.00.

21 (d) The tentative completion date for this work project is
22 September 30, 2022.

23 Sec. 310. Funds appropriated in part 1 for COVID-19 child care
24 public assistance and COVID-19 child care stabilization fund must
25 not be spent or otherwise distributed unless House Bill No. 4082 of
26 the 101st Legislature is enacted into law.

27 Sec. 311. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for COVID-19
28 child care public assistance and for COVID-19 child care
29 stabilization fund, any department, agency, board, commission,



1 subdivision, or other executive branch entity or official of this
 2 state that receives funding under part 1 shall not stipulate to the
 3 use of masks or equivalent face coverings for children 2 to 4 years
 4 of age.

5 Sec. 312. The funds appropriated in part 1 for institute of
 6 museum and library services are appropriated for the purpose of
 7 reopening and providing in-person activities.

8

9 **DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES**

10 Sec. 351. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for community
 11 substance use disorder prevention, education, and treatment and for
 12 federal mental health block grant, to the extent allowed by federal
 13 law and regulations, the department of health and human services
 14 shall prioritize funds to appropriately fund crisis services. As
 15 used in this section, "crisis services" include, but are not
 16 limited to, crisis stabilization units, mobile crisis services, and
 17 the Michigan crisis and access line established in section 165 of
 18 the mental health code, 1974 PA 258, MCL 330.1165.

19 Sec. 352. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for federal
 20 COVID-19 epidemiology and laboratory capacity, not more than
 21 \$300,799,300.00 is available for school testing. The funds
 22 appropriated in this section shall not be expended for mandatory
 23 school and school athletics testing once 70% of the eligible
 24 statewide adult population has been fully vaccinated or has tested
 25 positive for COVID-19.

26 Sec. 353. The funds appropriated in part 1 for federal COVID
 27 immunization and vaccine grant shall not be used to vaccinate an
 28 individual for the COVID-19 virus under a mandatory vaccination
 29 program of his or her employer or of state government.



1 Sec. 354. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for federal
 2 COVID immunization and vaccine grant, \$4,121,400.00 of federal
 3 immunization cooperative agreements for COVID-19 vaccine
 4 administration and distribution for children must not be expended,
 5 encumbered, or allotted until the United States Food and Drug
 6 Administration authorizes the use of a COVID-19 vaccine for
 7 children below the age of 16.

8 Sec. 355. A recipient of a COVID-19 vaccine administered from
 9 the funds appropriated in part 1 for federal COVID immunization and
 10 vaccine grant shall be provided with information or informed if and
 11 in what manner the development of the vaccine utilized aborted
 12 fetal tissue or human embryonic stem cell derivation lines.

13 Sec. 356. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for federal
 14 COVID immunization and vaccine grant, not less than \$2,000,000.00
 15 shall be allocated by the department of health and human services
 16 to reimburse local host COVID-19 vaccine sites. By May 1, the
 17 department of health and human services shall develop and post on
 18 its internet site an application form for local host COVID-19
 19 vaccine sites to use to request reimbursements for hosting costs.
 20 Eligible reimbursements from the funds appropriated in this section
 21 must include, but are not limited to, facility costs, utility
 22 costs, and personnel or volunteer costs directly related to hosting
 23 a COVID-19 site. The department of health and human services shall
 24 reimburse each local host COVID-19 vaccine site that submits an
 25 application the lesser of their cost to host or \$10,000.00.

27 **DEPARTMENT OF LABOR AND ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY**

28 Sec. 401. (1) Funds appropriated in part 1 for emergency
 29 rental assistance shall be administered by the terms set forth in



1 section 501(a) of Division N of the Consolidated Appropriations
2 Act, 2021, Public Law 116-260, authorizing the United States
3 Department of Treasury to make payments to certain recipients to be
4 used to provide emergency rental and utility assistance.

5 (2) The department of labor and economic opportunity shall
6 collaborate with the department of health and human services, the
7 judiciary, local community action agencies, local nonprofit
8 agencies, and legal aid organizations to create an emergency rental
9 assistance program.

10 (3) The emergency rental assistance program will operate in
11 accordance with rules and guidance published by the United States
12 Department of Treasury to serve eligible renter households with
13 rental and utility assistance to preserve their housing and avoid
14 eviction.

15 (4) The unexpended funds appropriated in part 1 for emergency
16 rental assistance are designated as a work project appropriation.
17 Any unencumbered or unallotted funds shall not lapse at the end of
18 the fiscal year and shall be available for expenditures for
19 projects under this section until the projects have been completed.
20 The following is in compliance with section 451a(1) of the
21 management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a:

22 (a) The purpose of the work project is to create an emergency
23 rental assistance program, which includes rental and utility
24 assistance payments, housing stability services, and case
25 management to eligible renter households impacted by COVID-19.

26 (b) The projects will be accomplished by utilizing state
27 employees or by contracts.

28 (c) The total estimated cost of the work project is
29 \$378,324,900.00.



1 (d) The tentative completion date is March 31, 2022.

2 Sec. 402. The funds appropriated in part 1 for national
3 endowment of the arts are appropriated for the purpose of reopening
4 and providing in-person activities.
5

6 **DEPARTMENT OF STATE POLICE**

7 Sec. 451. In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1,
8 there is appropriated an amount not to exceed \$150,000,000.00 of
9 federal authorization. This authorization is only available for
10 emergency and disaster response and mitigation. These funds are not
11 available for expenditure until they have been transferred to
12 another line item in part 1 under section 393(2) of the management
13 and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

14 Sec. 452. As a condition of receiving funds appropriated in
15 part 1, the department of state police shall not identify specific
16 employers by name in communications distributed to the press with
17 respect to citations issued and enforcement actions taken for
18 violations of emergency rules and orders by any state department,
19 agency, board, commission, subdivision, or other executive branch
20 entity or official.
