## HOUSE RESOLUTION NO.210

Rep. Dievendorf offered the following resolution: 1 A resolution to declare April 2024 as Second Chance Month in 2 the state of Michigan. 3 Whereas, Every human being is worthy of respect and dignity; 4 and 5 Whereas, Redemption and rehabilitation are core to our beliefs 6 and commitment to one another; and 7 Whereas, Second chances and opportunities to rebuild one's 8 life after an arrest or incarceration are pivotal to not only individuals, but also to strong and healthy communities in 9 Michigan; and 10 Whereas, More than four million Michiganders have some type of 11 12 arrest or conviction history; and

Whereas, People with conviction histories face immense 1 barriers when returning to our communities, such as challenges to 2 obtaining safe and stable housing, finding employment, accessing 3 education, reuniting with family, and navigating restrictions on 4 5 their mobility; and 6 Whereas, The barriers faced by people with conviction 7 histories are disproportionately felt by people of color and people 8 experiencing poverty; and 9 Whereas, People who are formerly incarcerated are almost ten 10 times more likely than the general public to be unhoused; and 11 Whereas, Removing barriers and increasing access to stable housing and meaningful employment is linked to decreased crime and 12 improved public safety; and 13 14 Whereas, Michigan has made great strides with historic clean 15 slate legislation to expunge Michiganders' records, breaking down barriers to housing, employment, and other essential needs; and 16 17 Whereas, Continued efforts must be made to ensure that all 18 Michiganders have access to second chances and opportunities to build a healthy life for our collective communities to be whole and 19 20 strong; now, therefore, be it Resolved by the House of Representatives, That the members of 21 22 this legislative body declare April 2024 as Second Chance Month in 23 the state of Michigan. We recognize the importance of second

chances and removing barriers for people with conviction histories.
