HOUSE BILL NO. 4829

August 27, 2025, Introduced by Rep. Schriver and referred to Committee on Education and Workforce.

A bill to amend 1976 PA 451, entitled "The revised school code,"

by amending sections 1278a and 1531 (MCL 380.1278a and 380.1531), section 1278a as amended by 2022 PA 105 and section 1531 as amended by 2023 PA 110, and by adding sections 1166d, 1174, and 1531k.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- 1 Sec. 1166d. (1) Beginning with pupils who enter high school in
- 2 the 2026-2027 school year, the board of a school district or
- 3 intermediate school district or board of directors of a public
- 4 school academy shall require a 2-semester course of study of 5

- 1 periods per week in constitutional literacy. A high school shall
- 2 not issue a diploma to a pupil described in this section who has
- 3 not successfully completed this course. All of the following apply
- 4 to the constitutional literacy course required under this section:
- 5 (a) The constitutional literacy course must provide
- 6 instruction on at least all of the following:
- 7 (i) The intellectual sources of the United States' founding
- 8 documents.
- 9 (\ddot{u}) The political and military narrative of the causes and
- 10 progress of the American Revolution.
- 11 (iii) The United States' founding documents and their original
- 12 intent.
- 13 (iv) The Constitution of the United States, including
- 14 instruction on all components of the Bill of Rights, and the state
- 15 constitution of 1963.
- 16 (v) The basic principles of the United States' republican form
- 17 of government.
- 18 (vi) The historical development of the United States'
- 19 republican form of government.
- 20 $(v\ddot{u})$ How the United States' republican form of government
- 21 compares to different forms of government including dictatorship,
- 22 monarchy, oligarchy, theocracy, communism, and autocracy.
- 23 (viii) The structure, function, and processes of government
- 24 institutions at the federal, state, and local levels.
- 25 (ix) Civic virtues exemplified in the lives of famous
- 26 Americans.
- 27 (x) What the oath of office entails for elected officials and
- 28 the consequences of violating it.
- 29 (xi) What separates the American flag from other flags.

- 1 (xii) Instruction on what makes a veteran, understanding the 2 difference between different types of veteran designations, and 3 holidays pertaining to veterans.
- 4 (xiii) The meaning behind the Pledge of Allegiance.
- 5 (xiv) Why diversity, equity, and inclusion initiatives were 6 removed from the United States military and other branches of the 7 federal government.
- 8 (xv) The dangers of communist and socialist forms of 9 government. The instruction provided under this subparagraph must 10 include all of the following:
- 11 (A) The foundational principles of communism developed by Karl
 12 Marx, Friedrich Engels, and later theorists, including class
 13 struggle, the abolition of private property, central economic
 14 planning, and collectivized ownership of the means of production.
- 15 (B) Historical examples of communist regimes including, but
 16 not limited to, the People's Republic of China under Mao Zedong,
 17 Cuba under Fidel Castro, North Korea under the Kim dynasty, and
 18 Cambodia under the Khmer Rouge. Emphasis must be placed on
 19 authoritarian practices, suppression of dissent, and loss of
 20 individual freedoms.
- (C) Evidence of political purges, censorship, religious
 persecution, forced labor camps, mass starvation, and other
 violations of human rights. Estimated death tolls and demographic
 impacts must be presented using reputable historical sources.
- 25 (D) An analysis of the difference between communist governance 26 and the core principles of the United States Constitution, 27 including individual liberty, the rule of law, private property 28 rights, limited government, federalism, and separation of powers.
- 29 (b) The constitutional literacy course may not require or

- 1 award credit to student work for, affiliation with, practicums in,
- 2 or service learning in association with any organization engaged in
- 3 lobbying for legislation at the state or federal level or in social
- 4 or public policy advocacy.
- 5 (c) No public school may permit content-based censorship in
- 6 the constitutional literacy course based on religious or cultural
- 7 references in a writing, document, or record pertaining to the
- 8 constitutional literacy course.
- 9 (d) No public school may permit a student to be prevented
- 10 from, or punished in any way for, using a religious or cultural
- 11 reference from a writing, document, or record pertaining to the
- 12 constitutional literacy course.
- 13 (e) The constitutional literacy course must interpret the
- 14 Constitution of the United States in its historical context.
- 15 (f) The constitutional literacy course must not teach that
- 16 Judeo-Christian thought had no influence on the creation of our
- 17 founding documents.
- 18 (g) No aspect of the 1619 Project may be taught in the
- 19 constitutional literacy course.
- 20 (2) The board of a school district or intermediate school
- 21 district or board of directors of a public school academy shall
- 22 ensure that no teacher instructs pupils in material contrary to
- 23 what the Constitution of the United States stands for. A teacher
- 24 that instructs pupils in material contrary to what the Constitution
- 25 of the United States stands for is guilty of a misdemeanor
- 26 punishable by a fine of \$5,000.00 and subject to both of the
- 27 following:
- (a) Immediate termination from employment at the public school
- 29 in which the teacher is employed.

- 1 (b) Suspension of the teacher's teaching certificate through 2 the process described in section 1535a.
- 3 (3) If the governing body of a public school determines that
 4 students were instructed in material contrary to what the
 5 Constitution of the United States stands for, the governing body
 6 shall ensure that a constitutional educator is provided to correct
 7 any misleading educational content.
 - (4) As used in this section:
- 9 (a) "Basic principles of the United States' republican form of government" means institutions and principles to preserve liberty 10 11 and prevent misuse of government power, including balance of power, 12 consent of the governed, the electoral college, federalism and the 13 division of powers between the federal government and the states, 14 individual liberties, rights of life, liberty, and property, 15 popular sovereignty, religious freedom, an educated citizenry, 16 representative government, civilian control of the military, rule 17 of law, control of faction, checks and balances, and separation of 18 powers among the executive, the legislature, and the judiciary.
- (b) "Civic virtues" means virtues including ambition, charity, cheerfulness, courage, curiosity, endurance, faith, forbearance, gratitude, hardiness, industry, initiative, patience, pluck, prudence, responsibility, self-control, self-reliance, temperance, and thrift.
- (c) "Famous Americans" means individuals including George
 Washington, Benjamin Franklin, Alexander Hamilton, Abigail Adams,
 Thomas Jefferson, Andrew Jackson, Frederick Douglass, Susan B.
 Anthony, Abraham Lincoln, Ulysses S. Grant, Ely Parker, Thomas
 Edison, Andrew Carnegie, Walter Reed, Theodore Roosevelt, Charles
 Curtis, Will Rogers, Jim Thorpe, Jackie Robinson, George Marshall,

- 1 Martin Luther King, Jr., Richard Feynman, and Neil Armstrong.
- 2 (d) "Historical development of the United States' republican
- 3 form of government" means events including the federalist and
- 4 antifederalist debates, the rise and role of political parties, the
- 5 rise of Jacksonian democracy, the expansion of the ideals and
- 6 institutions of liberty and republican self-government to include
- 7 all Americans, regardless of sex or race, the causes and the
- 8 constitutional consequences of the Civil War, the Thirteenth,
- 9 Fourteenth, Fifteenth, and Nineteenth Amendments, the rise of the
- 10 new deal administrative state, and Supreme Court cases including
- 11 Marbury v. Madison, McCulloch v. Maryland, Dred Scott v. Sandford,
- 12 Pembina Consolidated Silver Mining Co. v. Pennsylvania, Plessy v.
- 13 Ferguson, and Brown v. Board of Education.
- 14 (e) "Intellectual sources of the United States' founding
- 15 documents" means historical sources including documents that
- 16 illustrate the Greek, Hebrew, and Roman exemplars of liberty and
- 17 republican government; the Christian synthesis of Greek, Hebrew,
- 18 and Roman thought that emphasized the equal dignity of all
- 19 individual humans in the eyes of God; the medieval English
- 20 inheritance of common law, jury, local self-government, liberty,
- 21 and representative government; the early modern English inheritance
- 22 of Christian liberty, republicanism, militia, accountable
- 23 government, mixed government, parliamentary sovereignty, freedom of
- 24 the press, and the English Bill of Rights and Toleration Act; the
- 25 colonial American inheritance of Christian liberty, self-
- 26 government, and local government; and the Enlightenment theories of
- 27 Locke, Montesquieu, Smith, and their contemporaries that
- 28 universalized the European traditions of liberty.
- 29 (f) "Political and military narrative of the causes and

- 1 progress of the American Revolution" means events including the
- 2 French and Indian War; colonial American debates about and
- 3 resistance to increased British regulation and taxation; the Boston
- 4 Massacre, including the roles of John Adams and Crispus Attucks;
- 5 the Boston Tea Party; the military occupation of Boston; the
- 6 Intolerable Acts; the preparation of the colonists for armed
- 7 conflict; Patrick Henry's "Liberty or Death" speech; the
- 8 proceedings of the First and Second Continental Congresses; the
- 9 Battles of Lexington and Concord; the capture of Fort Ticonderoga
- 10 and the Noble Train of Artillery; the Siege of Boston and the
- 11 Battle of Bunker Hill; the drafting, signing, and publication of
- 12 the Declaration of Independence; the loss of New York City; the
- 13 victories at Trenton and Princeton; the victory at Saratoga; the
- 14 training and reorganization of the army at Valley Forge; Benjamin
- 15 Franklin's diplomacy and the French alliance; the Battle of
- 16 Monmouth; Benedict Arnold's attempted treason; successful American
- 17 resistance to British efforts to crush the Revolution in the south;
- 18 the Yorktown campaign; the disbanding of the Continental Army; the
- 19 Treaty of Peace; and Washington's resignation.
- 20 (g) "United States' founding documents" means texts including
- 21 the Mayflower Compact, Thomas Paine's Common Sense, the Declaration
- 22 of Independence, the Articles of Confederation, the Pennsylvania
- 23 Act for the Gradual Abolition of Slavery, the Virginia Statute of
- 24 Religious Freedom, the Northwest Ordinance, the Constitution of the
- 25 United States, the Federalist Papers, including, but not limited
- 26 to, Essays 10 and 51, George Washington's farewell address,
- 27 excerpts from Alexis de Tocqueville's "Democracy in America," the
- 28 first Lincoln-Douglas debate, the Emancipation Proclamation, and
- 29 the writings of the founding fathers of the United States.

- Sec. 1174. All of the following apply to classroom instruction provided under this act:
- 3 (a) No teacher shall be compelled by a policy of any state
- 4 agency, school district, intermediate school district, public
- 5 school academy, or school administration to affirm a belief in the
- 6 so-called systemic nature of racism, or like ideas, or in the so-
- 7 called multiplicity or fluidity of gender identities, or like
- 8 ideas, against the teacher's sincerely held religious or
- 9 philosophical convictions.
- 10 (b) A state agency, school district, or school shall not
- 11 teach, instruct, or train any administrator, teacher, staff member,
- 12 or employee to adopt or believe, and no teacher, administrator, or
- 13 other employee shall make use of, standards, curricula, lesson
- 14 plans, textbooks, instructional materials, or instructional
- 15 practices that serve to inculcate the following concepts:
- 16 (i) One race or sex is inherently superior to another race or
- 17 sex.
- 18 (ii) An individual, by virtue of the individual's race or sex,
- 19 is inherently racist, sexist, or oppressive, whether consciously or
- 20 unconsciously.
- 21 (iii) An individual should be discriminated against or receive
- 22 adverse treatment solely or partly because of the individual's
- 23 race.
- 24 (iv) Members of one race cannot or should not attempt to treat
- 25 others without respect to race.
- 26 (v) An individual's moral standing or worth is necessarily
- 27 determined by the individual's race or sex.
- 28 (vi) An individual, by virtue of the individual's race or sex,
- 29 bears responsibility for actions committed in the past by other

- 1 members of the same race or sex.
- 2 (vii) An individual should feel discomfort, guilt, anguish, or
- 3 any other form of psychological distress on account of the
- 4 individual's race or sex.
- 5 (viii) Meritocracy or traits such as a hard work ethic are
- 6 racist or sexist, or were created by members of a particular race
- 7 to oppress members of another race.
- 8 (ix) Fault, blame, or bias should be assigned to a race or sex,
- 9 or to members of a race or sex because of their race or sex.
- 10 (x) That the advent of slavery in the territory that is now
- 11 the United States constituted the true founding of the United
- 12 States.
- 13 (xi) That, with respect to their relationship to American
- 14 values, slavery and racism are anything other than deviations from,
- 15 betrayals of, or failures to live up to, the authentic founding
- 16 principles of the United States, which include liberty and
- 17 equality.
- 18 Sec. 1278a. (1) Except as otherwise provided in this section
- 19 or section 1278b, the board of a school district or board of
- 20 directors of a public school academy shall not award a high school
- 21 diploma to a pupil unless the pupil meets all of the following:
- 22 (a) Has successfully completed all of the following credit
- 23 requirements of the Michigan merit standard before graduating from
- 24 high school:
- (i) At least 4 credits in mathematics that are aligned with
- 26 subject area content expectations developed by the department and
- 27 approved by the state board under section 1278b, including
- 28 completion of at least algebra I, geometry, and algebra II, or an
- 29 integrated sequence of this course content that consists of 3

- 1 credits, and an additional mathematics credit, such as
- 2 trigonometry, statistics, precalculus, calculus, applied math,
- 3 accounting, business math, a retake of algebra II, or, for only
- 4 pupils entering grade 8 before 2023, a course in financial literacy
- 5 as described in section 1165. A pupil may complete algebra II over
- 6 2 years with 2 credits awarded or over 1.5 years with 1.5 credits
- 7 awarded for the purposes of this section and section 1278b. A pupil
- 8 also may partially or fully fulfill the algebra II requirement by
- 9 completing a department-approved formal career and technical
- 10 education program or curriculum, such as a program or curriculum in
- 11 electronics, machining, construction, welding, engineering,
- 12 computer science, or renewable energy, and in that program or
- 13 curriculum successfully completing the same content as the algebra
- 14 II benchmarks assessed on the department-prescribed state high
- 15 school assessment, as determined by the department. The department
- 16 shall post on its website quidelines for implementation of the
- 17 immediately preceding sentence. Each pupil must successfully
- 18 complete at least 1 mathematics course during his or her the
- 19 pupil's final year of high school enrollment. This subparagraph
- 20 does not require completion of mathematics courses in any
- 21 particular sequence.
- 22 (ii) At least 3 credits in social science that are aligned with
- 23 subject area content expectations developed by the department and
- 24 approved by the state board under section 1278b, including
- 25 completion of at least 1 credit in United States history and
- 26 geography, 1 credit in world history and geography, 1/2 credit in
- 27 economics, and the civics course described in section 1166(2). For
- 28 only pupils entering grade 8 before 2023, the 1/2-credit economics
- 29 requirement may be satisfied by completion of at least a 1/2-credit

- 1 course in personal economics that includes a financial literacy
- 2 component as described in section 1165, if that course covers the
- 3 subject area content expectations for economics developed by the
- 4 department and approved by the state board under section 1278b. The
- 5 1/2 credit in economics required under this subparagraph cannot be
- 6 fulfilled by completion of the 1/2 credit course in personal
- 7 finance described in subsection (3).
- 8 (iii) At least 1 credit in subject matter that includes both
- 9 health and physical education aligned with guidelines developed by
- 10 the department and approved by the state board under section 1278b,
- 11 or at least 1/2 credit in health aligned with guidelines developed
- 12 by the department and approved by the state board under section
- 13 1278b and at least 1/2 credit awarded by the school district or
- 14 public school academy for approved participation in extracurricular
- 15 athletics or other extracurricular activities involving physical
- 16 activity.
- 17 (iv) At least 1 credit in visual arts, performing arts, or
- 18 applied arts, as defined by the department, that is aligned with
- 19 quidelines developed by the department and approved by the state
- 20 board under section 1278b. A school district or public school
- 21 academy is strongly encouraged to offer visual arts and performing
- 22 arts courses.
- (v) The credit requirements specified in section 1278b(1).
- 24 (b) Meets the online course or learning experience requirement
- 25 of this subsection. A school district or public school academy
- 26 shall provide the basic level of technology and internet access
- 27 required by the state board to complete the online course or
- 28 learning experience. For a pupil to meet this requirement, the
- 29 pupil must meet either of the following, as determined by the

- 1 school district or public school academy:
- 2 (i) Has successfully completed at least 1 course or learning3 experience that is presented online, as defined by the department.
- 4 (ii) The pupil's school district or public school academy has
 5 integrated an online experience throughout the high school
 6 curriculum by ensuring that each teacher of each course that
 7 provides the required credits of the Michigan merit curriculum has
 8 integrated an online experience into the course.
 - (c) Beginning with pupils who enter high school in the 2026-2027 school year, has successfully completed the constitutional literacy course required under section 1166d.
- 12 (2) Except as otherwise provided in this section, and in 13 addition to the requirements under subsection (1), the board of a 14 school district or board of directors of a public school academy 15 shall not award a high school diploma to a pupil unless the pupil has successfully completed during grades K to 12 at least 2 credits 16 17 that are grade-appropriate in a language other than English or 18 course work coursework or other learning experiences that are 19 substantially equivalent to 2 credits in a language other than 20 English, based on guidelines developed by the department. A pupil 21 may partially or fully fulfill 1 credit of this requirement by 22 completing a department-approved formal career and technical 23 education program or curriculum or by completing visual or 24 performing arts instruction that is in addition to the requirements 25 under subsection (1)(a)(iv). The board of a school district or board 26 of directors of a public school academy is strongly encouraged to 27 ensure that all pupils complete at least 1 credit in a language 28 other than English in grades K to 6. For the purposes of this 29 subsection, both of the following apply:

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- (a) American Sign Language is considered to be a language
 other than English.
- 3 (b) The pupil may meet all or part of this requirement with4 online course work.coursework.
- (3) Beginning with pupils entering grade 8 in 2023, the board 5 6 of a school district or board of directors of a public school 7 academy shall not award a high school diploma to a pupil unless the 8 pupil completes a 1/2 credit course in personal finance that aligns 9 with subject area content expectations developed by the department 10 and approved by the state board under section 1278b. The 1/2 credit 11 course in personal finance must fulfill 1/2 credit of mathematics 12 required under subsection (1)(a)(i), 1/2 credit of visual arts, 13 performing arts, or applied arts required under subsection 14 (1) (a) (iv), or 1/2 credit of a language other than English required 15 under subsection (2), as determined by the board of the school district or board of directors of the public school academy in 16 17 which the pupil is enrolled. The 1/2 credit course in personal 18 finance required under this subsection may be fulfilled through a 19 department-approved formal career and technical education program 20 or curriculum that aligns with the subject area content 21 expectations developed by the department and approved by the state 22 board for the credit under section 1278b.
 - (4) The requirements under this section and section 1278b for a high school diploma are in addition to any local requirements imposed by the board of a school district or board of directors of a public school academy. The board of a school district or board of directors of a public school academy, as a local requirement for a high school diploma, may require a pupil to complete the Michigan merit examination under section 1279g or may require a pupil to

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- participate in the MIAccess assessments if appropriate for the
 pupil.
- (a) A pupil is considered to have completed a credit if the pupil successfully completes the subject area content expectations or guidelines developed by the department that apply to the credit. For a career and technical education credit, a school district or public school academy may supplement those content expectations and quidelines with additional guidelines developed by the school

district or public school academy.

- (b) A school district or public school academy shall base its determination of whether a pupil has successfully completed the subject area content expectations or guidelines developed by the department that apply to a credit at least in part on the pupil's performance on assessments developed or selected by the department or on 1 or more assessments developed or selected by the school district or public school academy that measure a pupil's understanding of the subject area content expectations or guidelines that apply to the credit.
- (c) A school district or public school academy shall also grant a pupil a credit if the pupil earns a qualifying score, as determined by the department, on assessments developed or selected for the subject area by the department or the pupil earns a qualifying score, as determined by the school district or public school academy, on 1 or more assessments developed or selected by the school district or public school academy that measure a pupil's understanding of the subject area content expectations or quidelines that apply to the credit.

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- 1 (6) If a high school is designated by the superintendent of
 2 public instruction as a specialty school and the high school meets
 3 the requirements of subsection (7), the pupils of the high school
- 4 are not required to successfully complete the 4 credits in English
- 5 language arts required under section 1278b(1)(a) or the 3 credits
- $\bf 6$ in social science required under subsection (1)(a)(ii) and the
- 7 school district or public school academy is not required to ensure
- 8 that each pupil is offered the curriculum necessary for meeting
- 9 those English language arts or social science credit requirements.
- 10 The superintendent of public instruction may designate up to 15
- 11 high schools that meet the requirements of this subsection as
- 12 specialty schools. Subject to this maximum number, the
- 13 superintendent of public instruction shall designate a high school
- 14 as a specialty school if the superintendent of public instruction
- 15 finds that the high school meets all of the following criteria:
- (a) The high school incorporates a significant reading andwriting component throughout its curriculum.
- 18 (b) The high school uses a specialized, innovative, and
 19 rigorous curriculum in such areas as performing arts, foreign
 20 language, extensive use of internships, or other learning
 21 innovations that conform to pioneering innovations among other
 22 leading national or international high schools.
 - (7) A high school that is designated by the superintendent of public instruction as a specialty school under subsection (6) is only exempt from requirements as described under subsection (6) as long as the superintendent of public instruction finds that the high school continues to meet all of the following requirements:
- (a) The high school clearly states to prospective pupils andtheir parents that it does not meet the requirements of the

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- 1 Michigan merit standard under this section and section 1278b but is
- 2 a designated specialty school that is exempt from some of those
- 3 requirements and that a pupil who enrolls in the high school and
- 4 subsequently transfers to a high school that is not a specialty
- 5 school meeting the requirements of this subsection will be required
- 6 to comply with the requirements of the Michigan merit standard
- 7 under this section and section 1278b.
- 8 (b) For the most recent year for which the data are available,
- 9 the mean scores on both the mathematics and science portions of the
- 10 applicable state assessment for the pupils of the high school
- 11 exceed by at least 10% the mean scores on the mathematics and
- 12 science portions of the applicable state assessment for the pupils
- 13 of the school district in which the greatest number of the pupils
- 14 of the high school reside.
- 15 (c) For the most recent year for which the data are available,
- 16 the high school had a graduation rate of at least 85%, as
- 17 determined by the department.
- 18 (d) For the most recent year for which the data are available,
- 19 at least 75% of the pupils who graduated from the high school the
- 20 preceding year are enrolled in a postsecondary institution.
- (e) All pupils of the high school are required to meet the
- 22 mathematics credit requirements of subsection (1)(a)(i), with no
- 23 modification of these requirements under section 1278b(5), and each
- 24 pupil is offered the curriculum necessary to meet this requirement.
- (f) All pupils of the high school are required to meet the
- 26 science credit requirements of section 1278b(1)(b) and are also
- 27 required to successfully complete at least 1 additional science
- 28 credit, for a total of at least 4 science credits, with no
- 29 modification of these requirements under section 1278b(5), and each

- 1 pupil is offered the curriculum necessary to meet this requirement.
- 2 Sec. 1531. (1) Except as otherwise provided in this act, the
- 3 superintendent of public instruction shall determine the
- 4 requirements for and issue all licenses, certificates, and
- 5 endorsements for teachers, including preprimary teachers and
- 6 teachers as counselors, in the public schools of this state.
- 7 (2) Except as otherwise provided in this act, the
- 8 superintendent of public instruction shall only issue a teaching
- 9 certificate or additional endorsement to an individual who has
- 10 passed appropriate available examinations. The superintendent of
- 11 public instruction may accept passage of an equivalent examination
- 12 approved by the superintendent of public instruction to meet this
- 13 requirement for an individual holding a teaching certificate from
- 14 another state, country, or federally recognized Indian tribe.
- 15 (3) Except as otherwise provided in this act, the
- 16 superintendent of public instruction shall only issue a teaching
- 17 certificate to an individual who has met the elementary or
- 18 secondary, as applicable, reading credit requirements established
- 19 under superintendent of public instruction rule. If an individual
- 20 holds a teaching certificate, notwithstanding any rule to the
- 21 contrary, the superintendent of public instruction shall not
- 22 advance the individual's certification to professional
- 23 certification unless the individual has successfully completed at
- 24 least a 3-credit course of study with appropriate field experiences
- 25 in the diagnosis and remediation of reading disabilities and
- 26 differentiated instruction. To meet this requirement, the course of
- 27 study should include the following elements, as determined by the
- 28 department to be appropriate for the individual's certification
- 29 level and endorsements: interest inventories, English language

- 1 learning screening, visual and auditory discrimination tools,
- 2 language expression and processing screening, phonemics, phonics,
- 3 vocabulary, fluency, comprehension, spelling and writing assessment
- 4 tools, and instructional strategies. An individual may complete the
- 5 course of study as part of his or her the individual's teacher
- 6 preparation program.
- 7 (4) Any revisions to existing reading standards must include
- 8 the recognition of reading disorders and enable teachers to make
- 9 referrals for instruction and support for pupils with reading
- 10 disorders.
- 11 (5) Subject to subsection (8), if an individual holding a
- 12 teaching certificate from another state, country, or federally
- 13 recognized Indian tribe applies to the superintendent of public
- 14 instruction for a Michigan teaching certificate and meets the
- 15 requirements of this subsection, the superintendent of public
- 16 instruction shall issue to the individual a Michigan teaching
- 17 certificate and endorsements comparable to those the individual
- 18 holds in the other state or country or with the federally
- 19 recognized Indian tribe without requiring the individual to pass
- 20 the appropriate examinations otherwise required under subsection
- 21 (2) or to complete the reading credit requirement established under
- 22 superintendent of public instruction rule as described in
- 23 subsection (3). To be eligible to receive a Michigan teaching
- 24 certificate under this subsection, an individual shall provide
- 25 evidence satisfactory to the department that he or she the
- 26 individual has taught successfully for at least 3 years in a

- 28 other state, country, or federally recognized Indian tribe was
- 29 valid.

- 1 (6) Subject to subsection (8), an individual holding a 2 teaching certificate from another state, country, or federally 3 recognized Indian tribe is eligible for a Michigan professional 4 education certificate if the individual meets both of the 5 following:
- (a) The individual has taught successfully for at least 3
 years in a position for which the individual's teaching
 certification from the other state, country, or federally
 recognized Indian tribe was valid.
- (b) The individual meets the elementary or secondary, as
 applicable, reading credit requirement established under
 superintendent of public instruction rule as described in
 subsection (3).
- 14 (7) Subject to subsection (8), if an individual holding a 15 teaching certificate from another state, country, or federally 16 recognized Indian tribe applies to the superintendent of public 17 instruction for an additional endorsement on a valid Michigan 18 teaching certificate and meets the requirements of this subsection, 19 the superintendent of public instruction shall issue the individual 20 an endorsement comparable to that which the individual holds in the 21 other state or country or with the federally recognized Indian tribe without requiring that the individual pass the appropriate 22 23 available examinations otherwise required under subsection (2). To 24 be eligible to receive an additional endorsement under this 25 subsection, an individual shall provide evidence satisfactory to 26 the department that he or she the individual has taught 27 successfully for at least 3 years in a position for which the 28 individual's teaching endorsement from the other state, country, or 29 federally recognized Indian tribe is valid.

- 1 (8) The superintendent of public instruction shall deny a
 2 Michigan teaching certificate or endorsement to an individual
 3 described in subsection (5), (6), or (7) for fraud, material
 4 misrepresentation, or concealment in the individual's application
 5 for a certificate or for a conviction for which an individual's
 6 teaching certificate may be suspended or revoked under section
 7 1535a.
- 8 (9) For the purposes of this section, the superintendent of 9 public instruction, based upon criteria recommended by a committee 10 of teachers, representatives of approved teacher education 11 institutions, Michigan education organizations and associations, 12 and experts in measurement and assessment, shall develop, select, 13 or develop and select 1 or more subject area examinations. In 14 addition, the superintendent of public instruction, based upon 15 criteria recommended by the committee described in this subsection, 16 shall approve a reading subtest to be taken and passed by 17 individuals seeking pre-K to grade 3 or grade 3 to grade 6-level 18 endorsement. If the department develops for use under this 19 subsection an examination that had previously been contracted for 20 using a competitive bid process, then the department shall not expend on the development of that examination an amount that 21 22 exceeds the amount that the department expended on procurement of 23 the most recent competitively-bid version of that examination. The 24 competitive bid process must address validity, reliability, and 25 other technical standards of the examinations and of the appropriate administration and use of those examinations. 26
 - (10) Not later than November 30 of each year, the superintendent of public instruction shall submit in writing a report on the development or selection and use of the subject area

- 1 examinations to the house and senate education committees. The
- 2 report must also contain a financial statement regarding revenue
- 3 received from the assessment of fees levied under subsection (12)
- 4 and the amount of and any purposes for which that revenue was
- 5 expended.
- 6 (11) The examinations required by this section may be taken at
- 7 different times during an approved teacher preparation program, but
- 8 the examinations, as applicable, must be passed before an
- 9 individual is recommended for certification.
- 10 (12) The department, or if approved by the superintendent of
- 11 public instruction, a private testing service, may assess fees for
- 12 taking the appropriate available examinations described in
- 13 subsection (2). The fees, which must be set by the superintendent
- 14 of public instruction, must not exceed the actual cost of the
- 15 examination and of administering the examination. Fees received by
- 16 the department must be expended solely for administrative expenses
- 17 that it incurs in implementing this section. If the superintendent
- 18 of public instruction increases a fee charged for an examination
- 19 under this subsection, at least 1 year before implementing the fee
- 20 increase, the department shall notify each approved teacher
- 21 education institution of the amount of the fee increase. An
- 22 approved teacher education institution shall notify each of its
- 23 affected students of the timing and amount of such a fee increase.
- 24 (13) If an individual holding a teaching certificate from
- 25 another state, country, or federally recognized Indian tribe
- 26 applies for a Michigan teaching certificate and meets all
- 27 requirements for the Michigan teaching certificate except passage
- 28 of the appropriate available examinations under subsection (2) or
- 29 the reading credit requirement under subsection (3), the

- 1 superintendent of public instruction shall issue a nonrenewable
- 2 temporary teaching certificate, good for 1 year, to the individual.
- 3 The superintendent of public instruction shall not issue a Michigan
- 4 teaching certificate to the individual after expiration of the
- 5 temporary teaching certificate unless the individual has met the
- 6 requirements of this section.
- 7 (14) Beginning with the 2026-2027 school year, the
- 8 superintendent of public instruction shall issue a teaching
- 9 certificate only to an individual who meets both of the following:
- 10 (a) Has demonstrated proficiency and understanding of the
- 11 Constitution of the United States and the state constitution of
- 12 1963.
- 13 (b) Has signed a document informing the individual of the
- 14 consequences of instructing material contrary to what the
- 15 Constitution of the United States stands for as described in
- 16 section 1166d.
- 17 (15) $\frac{(14)}{}$ As used in this section:
- 18 (a) "Additional endorsement" means an endorsement added to a
- 19 Michigan teaching certificate after initial issuance of the
- 20 certificate.
- 21 (b) "An individual holding a teaching certificate from another
- 22 state, country, or federally recognized Indian tribe" means an
- 23 individual with a valid teaching certificate or an individual who
- 24 is eligible for a teaching certificate in the state or country or
- 25 with the federally recognized Indian tribe in which or with which
- 26 the individual is certificated or eligible for certification.
- (c) "Subject area examination" means an examination related to
- 28 an endorsement area for the purpose of demonstrating the
- 29 applicant's knowledge and understanding of the subject matter and

- determining whether or not an applicant is eligible for a Michigan 1 2 teaching certificate or endorsement.
- (16) (15) The superintendent of public instruction shall 3 4 promulgate rules for the implementation of this section.
- (17) (16) Not later than January 1, 2019, the superintendent 5 6 of public instruction, in consultation with the department of labor 7 and economic opportunity and groups or individuals representing 8 employers, economic development agencies, trade unions, secondary 9 school principals, middle and elementary school principals, 10 teachers, school district and intermediate school district
- superintendents, and others as determined appropriate by the department, shall promulgate rules to allow an individual to use 12
- time spent engaging with local employers or technical centers 13
