- 1 A resolution to reaffirm our support for the Twenty-Second
- 2 Amendment to the United States Constitution, establishing a two-
- 3 term limit for the office of President of the United States.
- Whereas, The United States has had a strong norm of a two-term
- 5 limit for President since our founding days, which we have since
- 6 codified as the Twenty-Second Amendment to the United States
- 7 Constitution. Only one United States President, Franklin Delano
- 8 Roosevelt, has ever served for more than two terms, and it was his
- 9 unprecedented election to third and fourth terms of office that

prompted the creation of the Twenty-Second Amendment. As a result, 1 our Constitution now provides: 2 No person shall be elected to the office of the President 3 more than twice, and no person who has held the office of 4 President, or acted as President, for more than two years 5 6 of a term to which some other person was elected President 7 shall be elected to the office of the President more than 8 once. 9 ; and 10 Whereas, All Presidents have respected the two-term limit since it was ratified in the mid-20th century; and 11 Whereas, Term limits act as a crucial barrier to the 12 consolidation of power by would-be autocrats. One of the more 13 14 common forms of democratic backsliding today is executive 15 aggrandizement, whereby elected executives weaken checks on their power. Presidential systems are inherently more vulnerable to 16 17 democratic backsliding than parliamentary systems, especially given 18 the tremendous power concentrated in the office of the president. 19 Term limits are an important constitutional safequard in 20 presidential systems, as has been recognized by many nations across 21 the globe. According to data from the Comparative Constitutions Project, as of 2023, the constitutions of 108 countries imposed 22 23 term limits on the office of president; now, therefore, be it 24 Resolved by the House of Representatives, That we reaffirm our 25 support for the Twenty-Second Amendment to the United States Constitution, establishing a two-term limit for the office of 26 27 President of the United States; and be it further 28 Resolved, That we reject any claim by any individual intended

to undermine the Twenty-Second Amendment, or any attempt by any
