offered the following resolution:

- 1 A resolution calling for transparency, due process, and
- 2 further case-by-case review in the immigration cases of Hmong and
- 3 Laotian refugees in Michigan.
- 4 Whereas, In July 2025, U.S. Immigration and Customs
- 5 Enforcement (ICE) detained approximately 16 Hmong and Laotian
- 6 refugees in Michigan. Most of these individuals were summoned to
- 7 what they believed were routine immigration check-ins, only to be
- 8 unexpectedly taken into custody upon arrival. Since these

- 1 individuals were taken into custody, there have been urgent appeals
- 2 from their family and community for their release; and
- 3 Whereas, ICE transferred several of these detainees from
- 4 Michigan to facilities in Texas and Louisiana, and ultimately
- 5 deported them to Laos in mid-August. The treatment of these
- 6 individuals, particularly their rapid movement across several
- 7 sites, has raised serious due process and oversight concerns. When
- 8 detainees are quickly moved from one site to another, they may not
- 9 have sufficient time to obtain legal counsel and raise potential
- 10 defenses to detention and deportation before they are removed from
- 11 the country. Furthermore, the speed with which some of these cases
- 12 are processed can make it difficult to conduct effective oversight
- 13 of individual cases; and
- 14 Whereas, The manner in which these detentions and deportations
- 15 were carried out has deeply terrified the Hmong and Laotian
- 16 communities in Michigan, who are longtime residents and
- 17 contributors to our state, the descendants of U.S. allies in the
- 18 Vietnam War. The situation has raised questions about justice and
- 19 the appropriate treatment of immigrants and refugees; and
- 20 Whereas, The United States has no memorandum of understanding
- 21 or repatriation agreement with Laos under which the Laotian
- 22 Government has agreed to accept immigrants deported from the United
- 23 States. This means that the United States government needs to
- 24 obtain travel documents for individuals who are to be deported to
- 25 Laos. Given that it must take time to obtain these travel
- 26 documents, the federal government could provide advance notice to
- 27 individuals it intends to deport, rather than detaining them with
- 28 no warning; and
- Whereas, Several Michigan state legislators, community

- 1 leaders, and advocacy organizations have publicly demanded greater
- 2 transparency, oversight, and humane treatment for those detained.
- 3 We must ensure that our values of fairness, compassion, and respect
- 4 for human dignity are upheld; now, therefore, be it
- 5 Resolved by the House of Representatives, That we demand
- 6 transparency from federal authorities regarding the legal basis,
- 7 procedural handling, and current conditions of the Hmong and
- 8 Laotian individuals detained and deported by U.S. Immigration and
- 9 Customs Enforcement, including confirmation of whether due process,
- 10 such as proper warrants and notice, was respected; and be it
- 11 further
- 12 Resolved, That we urge U.S. Immigration and Customs
- 13 Enforcement and the U.S. Department of Homeland Security to provide
- 14 immediate access to legal counsel, timely family notification, and
- 15 humane treatment for detainees, including access to medical care
- 16 and communication with loved ones; and be it further
- 17 Resolved, That we encourage federal authorities to allow
- 18 sufficient time for further case-by-case review of each
- 19 individual's circumstances in immigration cases, especially for
- 20 individuals with deep Michigan roots, community ties, or
- 21 humanitarian histories, to assess relief options or alternatives to
- 22 detention; and be it further
- 23 Resolved, That copies of this resolution be transmitted to the
- 24 United States Secretary of Homeland Security and the members of the
- 25 Michigan congressional delegation.
